Dear Friends in Christ,

It is hard to believe as January is behind us we will soon welcome Ash Wednesday and the Lenten Season.

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on February 14, 2024 and so does our emphasis on Moses' book called Exodus. In it, Moses asks Pharaoh to let God's people go seven times (Exodus 5:1; 7:16; 8:1, 20; 9:1, 13; 10:3) and Pharaoh finally does it! When he does, God's salvation is so amazing that the event becomes the Gospel of the Old Testament. Israel's Scriptures mention the exodus 125 times!

Throughout the book of Exodus God reveals who he is through his absence and his presence, through his silence and his speech, through his wrath and his mercy, and through his judgment and his amazing grace. In doing so, the book paints a beautiful portrait of *Jesus*. I will be doing a sermon series on Exodus starting with Ash Wednesday and finishing on Easter Sunday. Lent one through five will be during our Wednesday service starting at 10:30am.

Sermon plans are as follows:

Ash Wednesday "Big Things with Small Stuff" (Exodus 2:1-10)

Lent One "How God Changes Us" (Exodus 3:1–14)

Lent Two "Stop Trying and Start Trusting" (Exodus 14:1-29)

Lent Three **"Strike the Rock!"** (Exodus 17:1–7)

Lent Four "Mine!" (Exodus 20:1–17)

Lent Five "Digging Ourselves into a Hole" (Exodus 32:1–14)

Palm Sunday "A New Beginning!" (Exodus 34:1-8)

Maundy Thursday "Access!" (Exodus 24:1-11)

Good Friday "Agnus Dei" (Exodus 12:1–13)

Easter "Against all Odds!" (Exodus 15:1–18)

The Sunday Morning Bible Class will look at the exciting history and theology connected with the book of Exodus. *It will all be very practical and useful!* There is also a Lenten devotional booklet based on Exodus. I can send out a link to those who are interested. I will also have some available in print for if needed. Dr. Reed Lessing of Concordia Seminary Saint Louis put the devotional and series together so many thanks to God for him and all involved.

You will find this series very enlightening and inspirational as we begin our Lenten season. Lent gives us an opportunity to reflect on what God has done for us, even though we are in a sinful condition. Ashes can symbolize "dust-to-dust" and remind worshipers of the need for cleansing, scrubbing and purifying. If they are applied during an act of kneeling, "the very posture of defeat and submission expresses humility before God."

QCD Your RMD To BLC

Are you aware that you can make a tax-free gift to the church from your 401k or IRA?

If you are 72 or older the IRS requires that you to withdraw a minimum amount from your IRA/401k annually. This is known as a required minimum distribution or RMD. The IRS computes this annually at the beginning of the year based on your IRA/401k balance. You are taxed on this withdrawal at your regular tax rate. If you fail to withdraw this amount, the tax penalty is 50% each year.

However, if you contribute to a charity (Bethlehem Lutheran) as part of your RMD, you are not taxed on this amount. The contribution is known as a qualified charitable distribution or QCD. It helps ease the burden of weekly giving while also being a benefit to Bethlehem. Please consider this in helping the church and in reducing your taxes.

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

What is the significance of Lent?

Early in the Church's history, the major events in Christ's life were observed with special observances, such as His birth, baptism, death, resurrection, and ascension.

As these observances developed, a period of time was set aside prior to the major events of Jesus' birth and resurrection as a time of preparation. During Lent, the Church's worship assumes a more penitential character. The color for the season is purple, a color often associated with penitence. The "Hymn of Praise" is omitted from the liturgy. The word "Alleluia" is usually omitted as well.

By not using the alleluia — a joyful expression meaning "Praise the Lord" — until Easter, the Lenten season is clearly set apart as a distinct time from the rest of the year.

Additionally, it forms a powerful contrast with the festive celebration of Jesus' resurrection when our alleluias ring loud and clear.

Finally, the penitential character of Lent is not its sole purpose. In the ancient Church, the weeks leading up to Easter were a time of intensive preparation of the candidates who were to be baptized at the Easter vigil on Holy Saturday.

This time in the Church's calendar was seen as an especially appropriate time for Baptism because of the relationship between Christ's death and resurrection and our own in Holy Baptism (see Rom. 6:1-11).

This focus would suggest that the season of Lent serves not only as a time to meditate on the suffering that Christ endured on our behalf but also as an opportunity to reflect upon our own Baptism and what it means to live as a child of God.

Ash Wednesday

Lutheran Worship: History and Practice, a commentary on Lutheran Worship, one of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod's hymnals, says this about ashes on Ash Wednesday: "Other customs may be used, particularly the imposition of ashes on those who wish it. This ancient act is a gesture of repentance and a powerful reminder about the meaning of the day.

Ashes can symbolize dust-to-dustness and remind worshipers of the need for cleansing, scrubbing, and purifying. If they are applied during an act of kneeling, the very posture of defeat and submission expresses humility before God."

The use of ashes on Ash Wednesday is a more recent custom among most LCMS congregations, although some have done it for decades.

Usually, the pastor takes the ashes on the end of his thumb and makes the sign of the cross on the forehead of each worshiper, saying these words: "Remember: you are dust, and to dust you shall return." This follows most effectively prior (or as part of) the Service Corporate Confession and Absolution on pages 290-291 of the *Lutheran Service Book*.
