



A Year in Review

This has been a year of stepping back to step forward. In June, I stepped away from my pastoral responsibilities and took a three-month sabbatical.

During that time, I rested and strengthened myself in body, mind, and soul, by attempting to summit Mt. Shasta, spending two weeks studying ancient Greek in Greece, and playing with my family. My time away allowed faces both new and old to step forward. We were blessed to have sabbatical pastors who know our congregation well, most notably, the Rev. Carl Wilfrid who served Faith Lutheran for 20 years during the 80s and 90s. Six members of the congregation also stepped into the pulpit and boldly proclaimed how God's Word was alive in their lives. Faith members led classes over the summer on Dietrich Bonhoeffer, spirituality in the wilderness, the power of water, and the sacred architecture of Greece.



In the summer and fall, the congregation rallied together around the children of Faith. Under the leadership of Cindy Kampf, many of you kept Sunday school going during our staff transition. We even sent one youth to the national youth gathering!

Upon my return, the energy of a refreshed pastor and reaffirmed congregation combined for an outburst of activity! We celebrated the ministries of Faith at Rally Day, renovated the playground at Rosedale Elementary for God's Work, Our Hands, and remembered those who have lived out God's love at All Saints Day. In the winter, we held a coat drive, and this has inspired an on-going ministry to collect goods for organizations doing good work in our



community and lay those goods in a manger at the foot of the altar. We've also launched two new Bible studies, and GriefShare, a ministry to support people grieving the death of a loved one.

After a careful search, in November we hired Joshua Edwards to be our new Director of Children and Youth Ministry. Josh has shown time and time again the power of loving children in Christ's name. He has started weekly children's sermons, modernized checking in and out students to Sunday school, and launched a middle school youth group. His collaboration with Emily Puerta has meant that we've been blessed with Faith's own children's choir. His organizational skill put together an Easter Egg Hunt and Trunk festival which drew hundreds of families and got Faith Lutheran on the front page of the Enterprise Record.

Thanks to his work and your ministry, our average Sunday school attendance has gone from 11 to 20 in the past year. The growth in Sunday school has been matched by the growth in attendance during worship. In 2023, our average in-person attendance was 122. In 2024, it was 142. Our attendance for the first four months of 2025 is up by 23 compared to the first four months of 2024; that's an increase of 17.5%.



This increased attendance is both an affirmation of our shared ministry and an invitation to ponder how we can reach more people in Butte County with the message of God's unconditional love in Christ. As we look to the year ahead we are planning how to more effectively share the good news of Jesus through three goals:

1) Improve our facilities.

After 35 years, our buildings need some tender loving care. We will be asking you to support a capital campaign to maintain the ministry of our campus.

2) Develop a second service.

We are starting to fill the sanctuary and parking lot each Sunday. But more importantly, a second service give us the opportunity to create a time and space for worship to connect with people who, for whatever reason, don't connect with our current service. We do not yet have a time, style, or start date picked out for this service. We do have a great team of individuals visiting other congregations in the areas to learn what works well that we might incorporate and what is lacking that we might offer.

3) Strengthen small groups.

As the congregation grows, we will need to be more intentional about keeping people connected to each other and to the Holy Spirit in their lives. Small groups, in which 6-10 people meet regularly to share what's happening in their lives, help each other see God in their midst, and pray for one another, are consistently the most effective way to help congregations feel connected as they grow. In the coming year, if you're not already part of a small group, I will be inviting you to join one to strengthen your walk with Christ.

I am so excited for the year to come. The Holy Spirit is doing incredible things at Faith. I am excited to journey into God's future together with you.

2025-2026 Proposed Budget

The proposed budget for July 2025 - June 2026 reflects our growing congregation. In four key areas our budget will increase: 1) staff salaries, 2) increased costs for a second service, 3) Inflation, and 4) Expanding ministry to our community.

Our staff work hard to coordinate our ministry at Faith Lutheran. In recognition of that work, the council is proposing a 5% raise for all four staff members starting January 1st. In addition to the base 5% raise, we are also proposing an additional 5% raise for our Director of Worship and Music, Luke Nicolay whenever we begin a second worship service. While all the staff will have increased responsibilities with a second service, Luke will take on the most additional work through his role overseeing all worship leaders and musicians. We are grateful for our faithful musicians who give freely of their skills as an offering to God. Sometimes, in Luke's absence, we pay individuals to lead music. For special services like Christmas and Easter, we also hire additional musicians to help us express the grandeur of God's work. As we increase the number of services, we recognize that we will need to pay more for these substitute musicians. The total increase to the budget for all staff wages comes to 12,331.76

Raising staff salaries also means an increase to staff benefits, such as social security and retirement contributions. This combined with an increase in medical insurance costs means our budget for staff benefits also will increase by \$9,196.56

This past year, I challenged members of the congregation to prayerfully consider increasing their tithe to Faith Lutheran by .5% of their income as they pursue a biblical tithe of 10%. Faith Lutheran is practicing what I preach, by increasing our congregation's contribution to the larger denomination by .5% of our budget, meaning an increase of \$3,100.

There are several areas where more members and increased use of our facilities combine with inflation to increase our budget. These mostly appear in the categories of Business Finance and Facility Management and Maintenance. You'll see increased Bank Charges/Tithely reflecting the small amount that credit

card companies take from online giving. As more people give online, this number increases. The cost of paper, postage, printing, and software have all gone up. Our custodial service has increased its prices. And, like for each of our homes, the cost of insurance and utilities continues to increase. This means that in Business Finance we are proposing a total increase of \$3,965. In Facility Management and Maintenance we propose an increase of \$6,840.

We pay composers and publishers royalties to play music in worship. We also purchase supplies like candles, communion wine, and baptismal certificates for worship. As we look to add a second service, we expect a modest increase to Worship and Music of \$1,200.

Every month, we feed people staying at the Torres Shelter. The number of people who stay at the Torres Shelter has increased significantly in the past couple of years at the same time that the cost of food has increased. This, in addition to materials that we use for fixing up schools in God's Work Our Hands, would add \$3,150 to our Social Ministry budget.

We aren't just serving the wider community. Our Equipping Ministry helps members of Faith identify their spiritual gifts and put those gifts into service of God's Kingdom. Throughout the year, Equipping Ministry holds events like Rally Day and All Saints Day to celebrate the ministries at Faith and the people who do them. The Equipping Ministries hopes to expand the ways in which they invite people into ministry and this is reflected in a proposed \$2,500 increase to their budget.

In total, the council proposes a 7% or 42,433.32 increase to Faith Lutheran's operating budget. With two months to go in our current fiscal year, Faith Lutheran is solidly in black, with your generous offerings exceeding our expenses by about \$27,000. This, combined with steady growth in worship attendance, gives us confidence that we can meet this proposed budget that invests in our dedicated staff and expands worship and ministry as we live out Christ's call to be a community reflecting God's love with a place at the table for everyone.



I am surrounded and supported by people who want what is best for Faith Lutheran and do the work to make it happen. It is time to “hand over the reins” to the next president and her council and I am looking forward to exploring new opportunities at Faith Lutheran. I am thankful for all the council members but want to say a special thanks to Steve Hall, Alyssa Manes, Elaine Lund, Leanne Chrisman, and Mary Schweder for their dedication over the past two and three years to the council as they also move on.

Finally, I am grateful to Pastor Ben for his knowledge, his wisdom, and his support. It has truly been a pleasure to get to know you better. I have enjoyed our many conversations and appreciate all that I have learned from you and for all of your encouragement.

When the Constitution was updated the Endowment for Faith became part of the Constitution. The purpose of the endowment fund is to provide for mission work beyond the operational budget of this congregation.

The Endowment Fund will provide support for mission work at home and around the world, The fund is called to strengthen and extend God’s mission through Faith Lutheran Church, reaching out in response to human need, by making grants to promote and support education for Christian life and service. It will provide ways for members who have the desire to benefit Faith Lutheran Church through charitable giving that is consistent with its mission of witnessing to the message of salvation through Jesus Christ on both a local and global level.

The Faith Lutheran Endowment Fund is managed by Thrivent Charitable Impact and Investing.

There have been no distributions from the Endowment fund this year.

As of April 23, 2025 the endowment fund value was \$91,74992.

We accomplished several projects over the past year that benefited our church plant. As always, a detailed overview of all projects, projections, costs, and maintenance notes are available to you. If you have any questions about specific projects, we invite you to ask Joel or Michael about them.

Our work this past year included:

- Replacement of all the lights and light activation sensors inside and outside the church. Approximately 300 bulbs were replaced with LED lighting. Thank you to Bob Bay, Rick Bentler, and Alex Jia for help on this.
- Completion of our education wing bathroom installation and the remodeling of the preschool room. This included new walls, two toilets, ADA access, and new flooring in the preschool room. *(Pictures on next page.)*
- A new fire hood system in the kitchen per fire marshal mandate.
- A new keying system for the facility.
- Two workdays to take care of tree pruning and general cleanup.
- Several bids on roofing, parking lot maintenance, painting, flooring, kitchen appliances, building repairs, solar expansion, and HVAC replacement in anticipation of future needs.

Lots of folks help weekly with our upkeep. In addition to twelve professionals from various companies in Chico, Bob Bay, Rick Bentler, Judy Struck, and Michael Nicholson have been never-ending sources of help in our work. Bill Kehoe is stepping up to help with bid assessments. And of course, many of you are there when we have cleanup days. Stay tuned for future announcements of our work.

Church of the Homeless Jesus does not meet on site, but uses our kitchen so that we can supply Pr. Fred Bowdy, facilitator, with water for his food truck which he uses to feed and nourish those without access to basic meals.

Worship and Music

“Rise up, follow me,
Come away is the call,
With the love in your heart
As the only song;
There is no such beauty
As where you belong:
Rise up, follow me,
I will lead you home.”

-From *The Road Home* by Stephen Paulus with text by Michael Dennis Browne

Stephen Paulus composed the piece *The Road Home* in 2001. He found inspiration from a folk tune called “The Lone Wild Bird” found in a larger compilation of tunes called *The Southern Harmony Songbook* of 1835. For many of you reading this, you might recognize these words from a post that I made to honor our good friend and parishioner, Meridith Mason Woods, who died in the Fall of 2024. Over this last several months, I’ve come back to this song over and over again. The tune, the text, and it’s general feeling gave and continue to give me a sense of peace. Each time I listen to it, I feel God’s comforting hand reminding that though there is pain, the love that she shared with all people will be forever present with each of us.

The composing of this piece, by Stephen Paulus, reminds me that with all things in life it takes a village to accomplish. As you read above, the tune came from a compilation of songs that were composed by another musician (or passed down rather), the text came from a dear friend, and the piece itself was written for a choir of several people who, in turn, used their voices to help give life to Paulus’ new song. Just in this short paragraph, we read that Stephen Paulus didn’t do this alone. There is always a large group of people helping us along, sharing new ideas with us, and inviting us into something beautiful. I see this in the ministries

of Faith Lutheran—in the beauty of worship that we share together and in our experiences together with the wider community.

This year has been extra productive as we see new groups using the church, more music being made in numerous groups, and more. It's always a thrill to see groups such as Synergism, De Colores String Ensemble, the Chico Children's Choir, and countless other groups using our spaces to create music and to see how they minister and spread love and beauty to the greater community of Chico.

Along with the groups that use our church spaces for rehearsals and performances, I'm also ecstatic to have so many wonderful ensembles to work with at Faith such as the Sanctuary Choir, the Handbell Choir, brass ensembles, chamber ensembles, and the contemporary team as well as seeing Emily Puerta and others working with the children to nurture them in song.

The music groups at FLC continue to amaze and surprise with their level of dedication, musicianship, and willingness to try new things (even if they may seem difficult and daunting at the outset). Everyone rises to the occasion and is always coming with creative ideas and ways to learn.



This year, the Sanctuary Choir was hard at work preparing for the major seasons of the church year as well as for the 4th annual Festival of Lessons and Carols with St. John's Episcopal Church. In the summer of 2024, we said 'see you later' to some of our dear choir members as they made their way to other parts of the state for work opportunities. With the sadness of saying our farewells to friends, we also welcomed some new faces to the choir and that's been another great joy of the year. As we look forward to the next year, both the choir members and I invite you to come and join us for a rehearsal or for several. We are ALWAYS looking for new folks who are interested in singing. There's lots of great rep, laughs, and wonderful community in the choir. In addition to singing, we also have a good party or two throughout the year. In addition, if you feel called to give to the music ministry, please feel free to make donations to the music dedicated fund or to the visiting musicians fund. Donations help support all of the music ministries at Faith and help us to maintain our instruments such as the bells, purchase new music, pay our visiting musicians, and more.



Along with the choir, the handbell group has had another wonderful and successful year. They, too, participated in a joint bell choir with St. John's Episcopal for the Annual Festival of Lessons and Carols. The event came together thanks to amazing volunteers who helped make everything run smoothly. From the moment it started, our parking lot was

packed with families, kids, and tons of smiling faces. Every decorated trunk had games, prizes, and activities, and kids loved running from car to car collecting treats.



The local organizations that joined in brought something extra special. The Mobile Library Bus let kids pick out free books (about 200 were given out), and the fire truck was a huge hit. Plenty of kids got to hop in for an experience that they will remember forever. We also had a bounce house and some great food from Pita Pit, Lili's Brazilian Bistro, and Antojitos De Los Buenos. There was something for everyone.



And then there was the egg hunt. Before we even said "go," there were kids lined up and ready. Over 4,000 eggs were hidden inside and outside the church, and watching the excitement on their faces made all the work totally worth it.



What really made the day special was seeing how many new families came out to experience Faith Lutheran for the first time. It was a great reminder that our church is for everyone, and events like this help us connect with the wider community in a meaningful way.

Small Groups

Just Older Youth, Seniors (JOYS) ***Nola Dosch, Facilitator***



J.O.Y.S. is one of our book-study-related small groups. This lively and spirited group of seniors met in the Fall, Winter and Spring months on the second and fourth Mondays in room 7/8. They read and discussed two very different books.

The first book was *The Last Lecture* which was a 2008 New York Times best selling book coauthored by Randy Pausch and Jeffrey Zaslow. This book is known for its witty humor, despite being Randy's farewell to his loved ones due to his terminal pancreatic cancer. Through his past experiences, Randy attempts to give advice to his young children that they may need once he has passed.

The second was *Traveling Mercies* a book by Ann Lamott where she explores the many moments in her life where her sense of faith drastically changed. She documents her journey of faith as a Christian convert after many years of drug and alcohol abuse where she eventually finds a small quiet church for herself and her son. The book is personal, warmhearted and very humorous.

GriefShare

GriefShare is a Christ centered support group that is a safe and welcoming place to help adults who are grieving the loss of a family member or friend. While everyone's response to loss and grief is unique, people will experience many of the same challenges.

For people who've lost a loved one, the Thanksgiving and Christmas season can be daunting. We held a 2-hour Surviving the Holidays event, one in November and one in December. This event provided a warm and supportive place to help the bereaved navigate through the difficult holiday season.

In April we began another 13-week GriefShare program where a video is shown each week featuring practical advice, guidance, and encouragement from experts in grief recovery from people who have experienced the loss of a loved one. Featured topics include Loneliness, Sadness, Fear, Anger, Regrets, Relationships, Self-Care, Hope and Resilience and much more. Afterwards the group discusses what they have learned and how it applies to their situation.

Hearing what others are going through can be meaningful and supportive. A comprehensive Participant Guide workbook is provided and serves as a road map through the grief journey. This workbook helps the participant process emotions and experiences and cope with the loss. They will apply what they have heard in the group and gain tools to deal with complicated grief. Between meetings, participants will find personal help and encouragement as they go through the short exercises, journaling prompts and scriptures provided in the workbook.

Time Out for Art

This small group facilitated by Sherrill Heinz, Caryl Quinones, and Alynn Brutsman has been meeting for almost a year now every Monday afternoon from 1:00-4:00PM and will continue throughout the summer. Participants are welcome to bring whatever creative project they are working on or choose to create from materials we have on hand. The group has a devotional near the

beginning of our meeting time. Every other week or so they offer opportunities to learn a new art form together. Sometimes they have guest artists as well.

Time Out for Art has been excited to learn how to tie-dye t-shirts, design and paint shopping bags, make Christmas



ornaments, create with alcohol inks, make gelli prints, and carve their own block prints. Some of them are into making art journals, a way of recording their thoughts, experiences or spiritual sayings with pictures from magazines or their own artwork. It's not about being an accomplished artist; you do not need to have any art experience to come to this group. It's about having fun with creativity! Most of all, it has been a joy for this group and for the church to build community together while doing art.

Men's Breakfast

Men's Breakfast is every Friday at 8:00 a.m. at the Farmer's Skillet on Rio Lindo. Engage in fellowship over breakfast!



Dungeons and Dragons

Dungeons & Dragons (5e) takes place on the second Sundays of the month. We enjoy doing "one-shots," games that are started and finished in the same session. Food Bank

Dear Faith Lutheran Church,

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you deeply and share with you the gratitude of myself, our team of volunteers and most importantly the community members we serve.

January 8, 2021 was our first food distribution at Faith Lutheran Church. We were keeping track of those we served who had been detrimentally affected by the Campfire (33%) and those detrimentally affected by Covid (30%).

In 2021 each distribution two times per month - we averaged 120 Households to 170 Households. Individuals served ranged from 300 to 500. These distributions were drive thru due to Covid and despite a few traffic issues this process was going well.



By 2023 Households served jumped up to an average of 300 – 400 Households and 600 – 700 Individuals at each distribution. October 6, 2023 the distribution was switched to a park and walk up model. The time was also changed to 3:00 – 5:00 pm.

2024 was very consistent in service to our community members with averaging 300 Households and 600 - 800 individuals. We did spend the summer of 2024 in the courtyard and only saw a big drop in service when temperatures reached over 105 degrees.

There are volunteers that support our clients that are unable to stand in line - I affectionately call them “runners” as they are packing up food for our clients that are staying in their vehicles and need assistance.

2025 and we are maintaining the same service counts as 2024.

Our volunteers make this distribution a wonderful and beautiful opportunity for those in our community that are needing a little reprieve from the stress of always worrying about what and when they are having their next meal.

Yes – Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano is supplying the food but the volunteers are showing the community God’s love and the peace that comes with loving our neighbors.

This food bank takes into account the usability of food; those who have access to a kitchen will be provided with food that can be cooked, and those without often receive quick and easy-to-eat food items. This food bank also distributes healthy produce whenever they can. The volunteers at the food bank and our church believe that no one should have to choose between making ends meet or a meal. The food bank takes place on the 1st and 3rd Fridays of the month between 3:00-5:00 p.m., and we encourage everyone to consider volunteering!

This last fiscal year, our long-time coordinator retired and we lost all but two of our teams. We have been struggling to keep this ministry going but we have done it and have not missed a month!

Many folks feel this is a positive ministry for our community and we would like to keep this going but we need your help! Just a few extra people would give folks a break and keep things going on a monthly basis. If you were able to sign up for one or two months it would be a great help! We shop for, prepare, cook and serve dinner for the guests at the shelter on the first Tuesday of each month.

We serve between 120 to 130 people on those nights, it is not a difficult task but it does take your time and energy. It’s best to have a team of 4 to 5 people, we have made it much easier with a booklet of specific how to’s and recipes. If you need a little more help than this there is always time with myself or another team



for training. You do not need to use your own money the churches credit card is available for pickup the day of the event, we have a budget of \$5-5.25 per person, all recipes take this into account. It's a fun and rewarding ministry that helps our community beyond measure! Just give me a call if you would like to get involved.

Steve Troester Memorial Blood Drive ***Marge Troester, Facilitator***

Every two seconds someone in the US needs a blood transfusion. Blood is vital for life. It delivers oxygen and nutrients to all the cells of the body. The brain, heart, kidneys, and all the other essential parts of the body need it to survive. When people lose blood in surgery or due to trauma, blood saves lives. When cancer patients become severely anemic or don't have enough platelets to form clots to stop bleeding, blood saves lives.

Thanks to the many people who donated blood or helped out at registration or after-care tables during our two blood drives this year we collected 25 units of blood potentially impacting the lives of 75 people. We plan to continue with an annual springtime blood drive next year. Thank you for your generosity.



Stephen Ministry

Stephen Ministry provides distinctively-Christian, confidential, free, one-on-one weekly spiritual support to people going through difficult times. Since 1975, more than 600,000 people from more than 13,000 congregations and other organizations have been trained as Stephen Ministers.

Stephen Ministers and Leaders are lay congregation members trained to provide one-to-one care to those in crisis or experiencing a difficult time in life such as grief, divorce, job loss, chronic or terminal illness, caregiver fatigue, relocation and more.

As of this report, Faith Lutheran has 7 Stephen Ministers: Mark Chrisman, Dottie Erhardt, Candy Munson, Cyla Nelson, Linda Rice, Charlaine Sandberg, and Dianna Snyder. The Stephen Leaders are Gen Brink-Capriola who handles referrals, and Jamie Holmes who handles continuing education. We share supervision, recruiting, and congregational awareness responsibilities.

Care Receivers are individuals in the congregation or community who are going through a crisis or life difficulty. Potential care receivers often first meet with Pastor Ben but referrals can come from anyone including congregants, staff, or care receivers themselves. Once referred, Stephen Leader Gen then assesses their needs and appropriateness for care; she and Jamie match them with a Stephen Minister. The caring relationship lasts for as long as the need continues. During the past twelve months, we ministered to a total of eleven people.

Stephen Ministry Training – The newest Stephen Ministers have received the required 50 hours of weekly in-class training. The remaining post-class training modules are being completed now in separate continuing education sessions. These are in addition to the continuing education provided in our twice-monthly Stephen Ministry meetings.

Mercy House

Mercy House is a collaboration with Chico Housing Action Team (CHAT) to provide housing and support to medically fragile women who would otherwise be unhoused. Mercy House volunteers from FLC provide friendship and oversee weekly house meetings with the residents to support them in their journey to stability and security.

Safe Space Winter Shelter and Cooling Center ***Michael Nicholson Dick, Office Manager***

Faith Lutheran Church continues to host Safe Space Winter Shelter and Cooling Center on site during the coldest and hottest weeks of the year. For two weeks in the winter and two weeks in the summer, we shelter approximately 60 guests at a time in our Fellowship Hall.

In the winter (usually January), guests arrive at about 6pm and are served hot meals. These meals are often prepared by Faith Lutheran Church teams, however, other community members and organizations step in to cook too not only here at Faith, but at other host facilities. Last winter, we had to ‘fight’ for dates because so many community teams were called to cook. It was the best ‘problem’ to have! After dinner, guests are provided cots and blankets and may sleep here overnight. In the morning they are served coffee and breakfast, then break for the day before returning around 6pm again.

In the summer, we open our Fellowship Hall during the afternoons and evenings. Guests can come and relax whether they want to sleep, get a snack, hydrate, or watch a movie. During the summer, donations of water, drinks, fruit, and similar nutritious, hydrating items are encouraged.

During either shelter, Safe Space staffs and monitors our building. In recent years, Executive Director Hilary Crosby, along with coordinators Quin Troester and Ali McMorrow, have helped us maintain a space of kindness, compassion, welcome, and care. We would like to thank them for all of their hard work.

In American and certainly in Chico, we are facing housing crises, homelessness, a lack of access to food and hygiene, and a severe lack of access to mental and behavioral health care. This shelter offers temporary reprieve for those who need these things most. We encourage you to prayerfully consider how you can help, both by serving at Safe Space and similar programs, and by communicating your feelings to those in leadership like city council members, congressmen, and so on.

God's Work, Our Hands Sunday ***Mary Schweder, Facilitator***

Faith's annual day of community service was on October 13th at Rosedale Elementary school. The planning team worked for months to plan the details. Volunteers came the day before to prep the area by sweeping, blowing, and washing picnic tables. Then on Sunday morning at 8:30 am 97 volunteers gathered for communion and a blessing at the school and cool weather to begin our work. Painting the blacktop, backboards, painting and repairing 12 picnic tables, weeding, and doing paperwork inside to help the teachers with their lessons. Young children as well as older adults were able to participate in the 13 different projects. Rosedale school benefited, but just as important our community of Faith came together and connected with one another showing how God's work is done with the hands of volunteers.





Christmas Gifts

Holiday giving is a big part of Christmas here at Faith Lutheran Church. Last Christmas we put up our giving tree and collected items for low-income families at Rosedale Elementary School. About 25 kids received at least 2 presents, including clothes, shoes, and toys. We're open to ideas, so if you have one for this year's giving tree, feel free to share!

Eucharistic Ministry

Eucharistic Ministers have the privilege of sharing Christ's presence by bringing Communion to the homebound. These ministers often develop deep friendships

with the people they visit and learn stories from the elders of our community. We have a handful of wonderful ministers who would like to see more people partake in this ministry, getting to know the parishioners who can't necessarily make it to church on Sundays but still long for participation, Communion, and companionship.

Sanctuary Art

This past year has brought with it several opportunities for artwork in Equipping Ministry and Worship. Rally Day's track pointed the way. The Greatest Gifts Project

In Genesis 12:2-3, God tells Abraham, “I will bless you and you will be a blessing; I will make your name great, and you will be a blessing to all people on earth.” In other words, we are blessed so that we can be a blessing to others!

The idea began in January of this year with 25 people feeling called to attend an informational meeting following worship and several others indicated interest but were unable to attend the initial meeting. A small idea for a new way to look at community ministries in and around Chico by looking to expand Faith's footprint, began in April. It was originally the thought to have a month-long campaign 2 or 3 times per year. We are happy to report that even though a few months remain open for other campaigns, we have many months calendared



into 2026. Faith Lutheran has been blessed with so many people who are showing their great leadership as well as many who just want to fulfill their passions by helping the various leaders. As of this writing, we have successfully completed the first campaign gathering durable goods for the 6th Street Center for Youth. The campaign for May will benefit Chico 2025 Special Olympics with June benefiting “Path Scholars”. Other community

centered campaigns are planned ranging from “Back to School” to “Blue Bags” to the Chico Animal Shelter and others in between. Some of the questions?

What is “The Greatest Gift” you ask? We as Christians believe that God sent his Son, Jesus, so that He might pay the price for us to inherit eternal life...the Greatest Gift. We receive this gift not to keep it to ourselves but rather endeavor to be more like Christ and give to others. With these thoughts in mind, the thought of “what if the Faith community was to raise the awareness of underserved groups or organizations in and around the Chico area and attempt to make a small dent with our neighbors in tangible ways?” With that simple thought as the inspiration behind “The Greatest Gift Project” became a reality.

What we do: The original idea was to gather durable goods for 3 organizations in 3 separate months of the calendar year. The level of interest and the passions of our people rendered the limitation to 3 obsolete. As of this writing, 9 months for 9 separate projects are spoken for between now and April 2026 (yes, not a typo, 2026!)

What is needed: Over several group meetings, discussion with Pastor Ben, and meetings between Kate Ory and Kim Schweder, it seemed best and easiest to use each calendar month for a different need. A “Position Guide” (Equipping Ministry way to say job description) was assembled (copies available upon request). Plenty of openings for anyone who wishes to be part of the different areas.

Volunteer in the Office Starting This Summer!

Database Help

Again, we've grown. Elvanto is our member database, and includes everything from contact information to worship scheduling to demographics to groups. When I receive a contact information form that's been filled out at church, I enter that person's info into Elvanto. But after some time has passed, that information will change. By then, they may have been baptized, become rostered, started serving as an usher, or may have joined several groups.

I am looking for a handful of people to help me enter and proofread information to make sure it's correct. This can be done from your own homes at your

convenience, and I reckon it'll take about an hour to two hours of your time a month. If you try it out and it's not your thing, that's okay too.


