

From Rev. Beth Kerr Who Joins Us Sept. 2 As Our New Minister

I am delighted to have this opportunity to introduce myself briefly and look forward to getting to know all of you starting in September when I begin ministry with you.

I was commissioned to Diaconal Ministry in the United Church of Canada in 2002 and Trinity-Collingwood will be the fourth Trinity Church I have served and my fifth pastoral relationship. I have served churches in Terrace Bay and Schreiber on the North Shore of Lake Superior, Elkhorn Manitoba, Portage la Prairie Manitoba and am currently wrapping up my ministry with two congregations in Listowel and Atwood Ontario. Each of those contexts has been unique and taught me something about what God is up to in the world. I have no doubt that Trinity-Collingwood will prove to be the same.

My deepest passion in ministry is for nurturing soulful living which enables us to connect deeply with God, with ourselves, and with one another. Soulful living is becoming increasingly challenging in our busy, often divisive world. Yet, it is my firm belief that our lives and our world are richer when we create space for the holy. When we listen to our own souls, our ability to love others and to work for justice in the world is strengthened.

My household includes my wife, Sarah, who is also a United Church minister currently working for the national church in the Office of Vocations and two crazy cats (look for lots of photos of cats if you follow me personally on social media). My ideal nice day involves a lovely hike or bike ride in some beautiful part of God's creation followed by a great meal. My ideal stormy day includes a good book, a big cup of herbal tea (ideally vanilla or raspberry rooibos), a warm blanket and snuggles from the cat with chocolate or delicious baking being an extra bonus. Both Sarah and I are looking forward to new opportunities to explore beautiful places once we move to Collingwood.

Rev. Lesley's Retirement Message To Regional Conference

Looking at my submitted photos, you'll likely think "Lesley is not your average minister" not that there is a specific mold out there but if I had a nickel for every time someone said "you don't look like your average United Church Minister a minister" I could have retired a lot earlier.

As a narrative preacher, let me begin with a story. I spent a large portion of my career in military chaplaincy. One day I was travelling via bus from Riga, Latvia to Tallinn, Estonia. Upon arrival in Tallinn, I spent my time visiting my Canadian members and also the British soldiers.

I happened upon one of the Estonian chaplains who was very excited to see me, since he thought I had arrived specifically for their special anniversary celebration. He invited me to an Orthodox service downtown, and I pleaded with him to get back to the hotel to change, but he said there was no time. It was a stunningly inspirational service highlighted with 7 Orthodox priests in tow, fully vested in a lot of black and gold, and yes, also at the front, representing Canada, was the sole female, a Canadian chaplain, in her blue jeans, her winter toque, red parka, and a pair of heavy Sorel boots. My motto in ministry, thus, has always been, "expect the unexpected."

In my 37 ½ years of vocational ministry, I have been honoured to work with the good people of Valley Pastoral Charge, Niverville Pastoral Charge, Alton Pastoral Charge, St. Andrew's River Heights United in Winnipeg, Trinity United in Collingwood, as well as our Canadian Armed Forces Members at CFB Wainwright, 17 Wing Winnipeg, CFB Borden, and NATO members overseas. I have been honoured to receive both the Special Service Medal (NATO), and the Vice Chief of Defense Staff Commendation for supporting not just Canadian members, but also our allies from the United Kingdom and the United States during those horrific pandemic years.

My hardest times in ministry have been dealing with tragic deaths, military notifications, accidents, and ongoing bouts of sexism and ageism. But my greatest joys have been sitting on the ground with children for children's moments, representing Canada at Vimy Ridge for the Remembrance Day Service, clowning and doing puppet shows in worship, study groups and evocative Lenten services, representing Canada at the St. James Palace Advent Service, flying a helicopter, and conducting a committal service from the back of a Hercules plane.

Let me offer my heartfelt thanks to my children, Talitha and Graham, who have been a constant source of support in my ministry, and as a result of mom's job are the most gifted public speakers in their chosen professions with a high sense of social justice and compassion! Thank you to my husband, Rob, he has been my rock and listening post. And thank you to everyone whom I have met along the journey. I look forward to mentoring the next generation of United Church ministers, and to continuing my art career and my love of volunteering. I will be retiring in Brighton, Ontario, so do pop in for a tea (as my British hubby would say) if you happen to be in the area.

Concert #3 by Beaver Valley Concert Band on Sunday, 13 July 2025

It has been a long tradition in smaller communities for musicians to gather and share their love of music and their talents by forming small groups and bands. The Meaford Citizen's Band was a fixture from the late 1800s until the very early 1970s. There are pictures in the Meaford Museum of the band from 1967 and 1968 concerts plus the band was resurrected in 1974 to play for the Meaford Centennial. Charlie Strimas was the last director of the band, late 60s into the 70s. There are still a couple of that group around, one of whom is Kevin Knight.

The current incarnation is the Beaver Valley Concert Band which started in 1990 when a few musicians in the Blue Mountains got together to jam. Originally called the Valley Concert Band, the group had a name change and became the Beaver Valley Concert Band 15 or 20 years ago to identify with the larger area the current musicians are drawn from. The band was originally based in Thornbury where it rehearsed until 2020 when the pandemic shut the world down. When the band was able to restart in Sept 2022, the decision was made to locate in Collingwood, a more central location for band members and, the move provided a larger catchment of potential players. The band is well on the rebound and anxious to carry on a long-standing tradition of local musicians enjoying music and performing for the entertainment of their neighbours and friends. Rehearsals are at Trinity United Church in Collingwood on Monday evenings from 6 to 7:30 under the direction of Lesley Joosten. The move has been very rewarding and has resulted in a significant increase in musicians.
