In today's deeply polarized society, where divisions seem to grow wider with each passing day, the call of the United Methodist Social Principles is more urgent than ever. We find ourselves living in an "inbetween" space — between a broken world and God's coming reign, between division and unity, between injustice and peace.

As Christians, how do we navigate this space faithfully? The answer lies in the core practices that have always defined the Church: preaching the Gospel, studying Scripture, breaking bread together, and witnessing to the power of redemption.

The Apostle Paul's words in 1 Corinthians remind us that despite our differences — be they political, social, or ideological — we are all part of the same body of Christ. This truth is especially challenging in a time when it's easier to retreat into echo chambers, to label others as "them" instead of "us." Yet, the Gospel calls us to something higher: to live out radical love and unity, even when it's difficult.

Living in the in-between means embracing the tension. It means standing as a witness to the transformative power of the Gospel by engaging in acts of mercy, advocating for justice, and being peacemakers in a world rife with conflict. It calls us to listen more deeply, love more fully, and extend grace more freely.

As we look to Lent and Easter, we will be exploring this in-between space. We will journey through the Narrative Lectionary as it follows the Gospel of Luke, beginning with Jesus setting his face toward Jerusalem. We will move through Lent with familiar stories: The Good Samaritan, Mary and Martha, the fruitless fig tree, the Lost Sheep, Zacchaeus, and more. We will explore how these stories invite us to Jesus invites us into the spaces in-between. We will lean into the ways in which the weekly themes have often been opposites. We will engage in artwork and poetry. We will spend time in daily prayer. We are invited and encouraged to be open to the discomfort, the urging of the Holy Spirit, and the diversity of the body of Christ.

Notes & Thoughts

From United Women in Faith (UWF)

We had 33 members on January 1, 2024 - two died, six members moved (two from a disaffiliated church), two attending different church, nine inactive as are in their 90's or in rehab facilities, and 16 actives. We had two new members join in November leaving us with a total of 27 members at the beginning of January, 2025.

Money we took in for the year was \$585 for a pancake supper in March, and our big project in 2024 was to gather recipes for a new cookbook and we did have to pay \$275 for everything up front and sent the recipes off in July to be put into the cookbook. We ordered the minimum of 100 books and received 110 books in September to start selling. We did sell around 55 or 60 books at \$10 each and still have more at the church to sell.

- The following was paid out:
 - ➤ Pledges \$600 -this is sent to National for Mission work
 - Call to Prayer and Self Denial \$97
 - > World Thank Offering \$30 Birthday \$ Scholarship for Bethlehem Centers of Nashville
 - ➤ In memory of \$35
 - Baby blankets and diapers to Hope Pregnancy Center- also baby blankets for newborns and other family members of ladies in the church
 - Provided food for Ann's Closet rather than money
 - Money for following Loaves and Fishes, Urban Ministries, Manna Cafe, Helping Hand Fund, FUEL Program, and Camp Rainbow
 - Christmas goody bags given to 10 of our elderly ladies, homebound, and those in nursing and rehab facilities filled with fruits, candies, crackers, cookies, homemade soups furnished by the ladies and lap blankets, and warm fuzzy socks which were purchased.
- The total paid out for local missions was \$1,532.


