When the blood was splattered on that increasingly bloodied gold lid, it became a mercy seat. It became the seat of mercy because it was there that God was satisfied. And this symbolized and represented a sacrifice that would satisfy God.

But none of those sacrifices ever paid for one single, solitary sin. They just all _____ to the sacrifice that would.

God will only be satisfied when all sins have been paid for, and the wages of sin is death.

Satisfaction must be brought to God before our sins can be removed from us.

Another point in our look at propitiation, the _____ of propitiation.

Jesus _____ Himself the propitiation.

The Lord has caused the iniquity of us all to fall on Him.

God demanded to be satisfied, and God determined that the death of His Son would be that satisfaction.

Jesus' death was not just an example of love, and it was not just an example of humility, and it was not just an example of self-sacrifice; it was an actual payment to satisfy the justice of God.

Jesus did what all those Temple sacrifices never did. He satisfied God.

Even the people who lived under the first covenant weren't saved by the blood sacrifices. Those who were genuinely believers, those who repented and believed, were saved by the sacrifice of Jesus Christ which was pictured in those blood sacrifices.
