The Revolution is real.

So, why doesn't everyone just "get along"? Why can't I just be happy?

What we have to do is to respond to the love poured out on the cross with love of our own: love for the one who died, yes, but also love for those around us, especially those in particular need. And part of the challenge of putting that into practice is that the powers, in whatever form, will be angry. They want to keep the world in their own grip. They will fight back."

While in Christ we are freed from having to play only to harm and destruction (the "old music"), the old music still has power – people everywhere are daily tempted by it, and some do not understand there is a different music which can be played, one of life and love. We can be weak and fall. Even though Aphrodite, Mars, Mammon, etc. are defeated by God the Creator of All through Jesus' death and resurrection, people continue to give them life – and they jealously grasp.

"One of the things that surprised me when I first read the New Testament seriously was that it talked so much about a Dark Power in the universe—a mighty evil spirit who was held to be the Power behind death and disease, and sin. The difference is that Christianity thinks this Dark Power was created by God, and was good when he was created, and went wrong. Christianity agrees with Dualism that this universe is at war. But it does not think this is a war between independent (or equal) powers. It thinks it is a civil war, a rebellion, and that we are living in a part of the universe occupied by the rebel.

"Enemy-occupied territory—that is what this world is. Christianity is the story of how the rightful king has landed, you might say landed in disguise, and is calling us all to take part in a great campaign of sabotage. When you go to church you are really listening--in to the secret wireless from our friends: that is why the enemy is so anxious to prevent us from going. He does it by playing on our conceit and laziness and intellectual snobbery. I know someone will ask me, 'Do you really mean, at this time of day, to re-introduce our old friend the devil—hoofs and horns and all?' Well, what the time of day has to do with it I do not know. And I am not particular about the hoofs and horns. But in other respects my answer is 'Yes, I do. I do not claim to know anything about his personal appearance. If anybody really wants to know him better I would say to that person. 'Don't worry. If you really want to, you will. Whether you'll like it when you do is another question.'"

Day 213: Some things to consider.

- 1.) Jesus' greatest criticisms were for the leadership of the church of his day. He called them hypocrites ("actors"). He told people
 - a. "... do not do what they do, for they do not practice what they teach." He said to them
 - b. "Woe to you, (church leaders), hypocrites! You keep locking people out of the kingdom of heaven! For you neither enter nor permit those trying to enter to go in."
 - c. "Woe to you, (church leaders), hypocrites! You cross land and sea to make one convert, and when you get one, you make him twice as much a child of hell as yourselves!"
 - d. "on the outside you look righteous to people, but inside you are full of hypocrisy and lawlessness."

And leveled many other accusations against them as well.

Why would Jesus be so accusatory against the church leadership of his day? Do you have examples of accusations He may level against the church leadership of today? Of your specific church community? Of you?

Jesus' students had found someone who was following the Path of Christ, even though that person wasn't part of their group.


How is it possible to follow Christ even if you've never formally been introduced to Him?
