"Deep Reflection into Psalm 23"

To all who are in Christ Jesus,

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. I pray that you and your families are well and that this correspondence finds you in perfect peace.

"The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want..."

These familiar words from Psalm 23 have comforted hearts for generations. In just six verses, David paints a portrait of deep trust in God's provision, protection, and presence.

As your pastor, I invite you to slow down and reflect on each line of this beloved psalm. In times of uncertainty, we are reminded that God is not distant, He is our Shepherd, intimately aware of our needs and lovingly guiding us through both green pastures and dark valleys.

"He makes me lie down in green pastures; He leads me beside still waters."

God doesn't just lead us to busy tasks; He also leads us to rest. In a world of constant motion, the Shepherd reminds us to pause, to breathe, and to be renewed.

"Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil..."

The valley is real—but so is His presence. We are never alone, even in our darkest moments. His rod and His staff are symbols not of punishment, but of guidance and comfort.

"Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life..."

God's blessings are not fleeting. His goodness pursues us, even when we're too tired to notice. And His mercy picks us up when we fall short.

This week, whether you are resting in green pastures or walking through a valley, remember: The Shepherd is near. Let Psalm 23 remind you that your life is held in the hands of a faithful, loving God.

Let us continue to work toward ministries of excellence as we make disciples for Christ for the transformation of the world.

Notes from a Lay Leader

IT'S BACK!!!

"Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts." Acts 2:46

For many years prior to the Pandemic, Epworth was known as the Little White Church on the Hill—Home of the Community Breakfast. The first Saturday of the month, the community was invited to come to Epworth for a buffet breakfast. There was no specific charge for the meal, but attendees were encouraged to give a free will offering. Anything collected was used to cover expenses and any money left over went to the designated charity for that month. It was a great way to meet people in the community—and a wonderful way to feed a houseful of weekend guests!!!

We all know what the pandemic did to community gatherings. And when the "all clear" sounded, we were leery of getting back into it—it is a lot of work. Luckily, we have extensive notes, instructions and recipes from the founder of the breakfast, Tina Rex, so we have a road map to follow. But why should we bother?

This verse from Acts illustrates the early Christian community's commitment to fellowship through shared meals. Breaking bread together signifies unity and mutual support. Their glad and sincere hearts show that fellowship is about more than food—it's about shared joy, hospitality, and a sense of belonging in the body of Christ.

So, what can we learn from examples of hospitality in the Bible? First and foremost, we can see the value of welcoming strangers and treating them with kindness. Extending hospitality to others can help break down barriers and create a sense of unity in a world that often feels divided and polarized.

Second, we can see the importance of sharing food and fellowship. Eating together is a powerful way to build relationships and create community. It allows us to connect with others deeper and share in each other's joys and struggles. As Christians, we gather together to eat, both with people we know and people we don't know, because Jesus did. If you read through any of the Gospels, you will find <u>Jesus eating</u> with all kinds of people, in all kinds of situations. Jesus <u>eats in homes</u>, Jesus <u>eats with crowds</u>, and <u>Jesus eats with his close friends</u>.

In all of those situations, Jesus is sharing the good news of the gospel by being present with people, by engaging in some of life's most basic and essential activities with them, and by spending time with them. If we follow Jesus's example, we'll probably be part of all kinds of community meals too. Food ministry is as wonderful a way to share the gospel and build community today as ever.

Hospitality is a theme throughout the Bible and is just as relevant today as it was thousands of years ago. By welcoming strangers, sharing food and fellowship, and extending kindness and generosity to others, we can help create a more just, compassionate, and connected world.

So, on August 16th, we are going to give it a try. We have a great Kitchen Committee and folks from Halesford are helping as well. And we have Tina's instructions. The menu will be the same: sausage, eggs, biscuits, gravy, pancakes, potato casserole and baked apples. We have 15 volunteers signed up, but we can certainly use more. There are jobs for all kinds of abilities---even things you can do sitting down!! The committee is meeting on July 14th to finalize plans and then there will be a training meeting for the volunteers the week before. And certainly, plan on coming to eat, and bring your friends. We'll have lots of food and love to share!



Halesworth UWF was represented by Renee, Sue, George and Betty at the recent Potato Drop, held in Roanoke

There were 36,000 pounds of potatoes, more than I have ever seen! We joined other volunteers as well as Roanoke Police Department 's graduates from their police academy to bag, sort by organization, and assist organizations in the picking up of the potatoes. Some of the recruits showed off their traffic directing skills! The potatoes that were a little soft, (okay, and the few that were yucky), went to the Mill Mountain Zoo for the animals to eat. Water, snacks, and lunch were provided, as volunteers filled each bag with approximately 10 pounds of potatoes, creating 160,000 helpings for neighbors in need throughout the area. A hot day but we felt blessed!















Virginia United Methodist Church Annual Conference

Annual Conference is a time praising God, conducting Church business, learning from teaching sessions, fellowshipping, having early morning Communion and understanding more of the connectional ministries of the Virginia United Methodist Church (VAUMC). Pastor Jeff, Jennifer and I attended, representing the Washington Cooperative Parish. Bishop Sue gave a powerful sermon to open the conference, speaking from Ezra about rebuilding the temple, as we now are rebuilding the UMC. The sessions were emotional, as the participants mourned the closure of churches and death of leaders, and rejoiced in the beginning of new ministries and the ordination of new leaders. We voted on the issue of regionalization of the church, which is the restructuring of the worldwide UMC, and wrestled with new technology as we voted. This wrestling with glitches in the voting system prompted Bishop Sue to remark that this situation is what Paul wrote about, that as one person suffers, we all suffer, leading to laughter which brought down the level of annoyance.
