Notes from a Lay Leader

PREPARING FOR PENTECOST

Its coming on June 8th and you are invited!!!! Send out invitations, order the cake, get out the party favors, and strike up the band—the church is having a birthday! Tell everyone to wear red, for it is the Day of Pentecost, the birth of the church, and the celebration of the Holy Spirit.

Imagine entering to the sound of music filling the sanctuary, children waving red streamers, and the worship leaders processing through the crowd.

Worship on Pentecost has many possibilities for the church. It is the great climax of the Easter-Pentecost season, for on this day we realize and remember the fullness of God's promise in Jesus Christ, which has been the theme throughout Lent, Holy Week, and Easter. Regardless of worship choices, the service should focus as a witness to God who has "poured out his Spirit upon all flesh" (Acts 2:17).

Pentecost is believed to be the oldest festival in the church, dating back to the first century. The early Christians adapted the Jewish Feast of Weeks, which occurs fifty days after the Passover, commemorating Hebrew freedom from Egyptian bondage and the giving of the Ten Commandments to Moses. Today, among Christian churches, Pentecost is most often celebrated fifty days after Easter, ten days after the Ascension (see Acts 1:6-11).

The story of Pentecost comes from Acts 2:1-42, as 120 worshipers, including the disciples, were fasting and praying in an upper room in Jerusalem. The Holy Spirit descended upon them in a violent rushing wind. Small flames of fire rested upon their heads, and they began to speak in other languages. As crowds came to investigate the commotion, the apostle Peter spoke to them about Jesus and exhorted them to repent. From the crowd of Jews and converts, three thousand heard his message, were baptized, and became followers of Jesus.

Pentecost is a time of renewal for Christian believers. Through studying the story of Pentecost, many seek and pray for spiritual gifts for the church during this time of holy celebration. There is a renewed focus on evangelism, empowerment from the Holy Spirit, deeper intimacy with God, and fellowship. For Christians, the celebration of Pentecost imparts faith, hope, a sharing of community, and an awareness of a purpose much greater than ourselves.

Indeed, Pentecost Sunday is a day to celebrate hope, a hope born by the knowledge that God through the Holy Spirit is at work in the church. The church's birthday calls us to consider our purpose, mission, and work as God's people. Yet this calling is not a sober reflective time, (remember, we did that in Lent), but rather a grand and glorious gathering with smiles and laughter and praises to God!

The Washington Cooperative Parish 7 Last Sayings service was held on Good Friday, April 18, at Halesford UMC



Wayne Loomis spoke on Luke 23:24, saying the suffering Jesus experienced is a profound challenge to all Christians to forgive. His standing there was a radical act. Most people's instincts when wronged is to get revenge, or hold a grudge. Jesus sees the bigger picture, and is an example for us, to commit ourselves to see the potential of what all can become.



Chris Mosig spoke on Luke 23:39-43, and pointed out that 3 men died that day, one in rebellion, one entering eternal life by his belief in Jesus. One man died for all our sin, became sin, to give us salvation.



Betty Johnson had John 19:25-27, which tells of Jesus, even in His agony and suffering, looking out for His mother. She said she couldn't imagine what Mary was feeling, watching her son die, and could only be there. Sometimes being there is all we can do.



George Wilson stated that Jesus was human, had emotions, needed to eat and drink. When He was on the cross, Jesus took on the past, present and future sins of mankind. He felt alone, asking God "Why did you forsake me?" (Matthew 27:45-46). We are blessed that God says He will never leave us or forsake us!



Mike Goad explained "I thirst" (John 19:28), that none of the soldiers, Pilate, witnesses, criminals or anyone there knew that they were fulfilling Scripture. They didn't know that Jesus was thirsting for us, thirsting for our spirits, suffering for our sins, so that one day, we could say to Christ, "I thirst for you".



Jennifer White asked, "Have you ever finished a project? Paid off a mortgage?" If so, you know the burden that is lifted off you. In John 19:30, "It is finished", Jesus is triumphant, He hadn't given up, but He wrapped it all up, cancelled our debts, broken every yoke that we have. We don't have to carry guilt or shame, He shut the door on death. However, your story is just beginning.



Marques Wilson pointed out that Jesus was fully human but divine. He wept at the tomb of Lazarus, walked the Earth showing the Will of the Father. Marques said that he was looking at the Hands of Christ. Hands are often taken for granted, they represent strength. His granddaughter knows that if she gets a bump, if she can make it into his hands, all will be well. The woman that needed healing reached out her hand to touch the hem of Jesus' cloak. Jesus touched so many, as He fulfilled His divine assignment. Luke 23: 45 says Jesus cried out, "Father, I entrust my spirit into your Hands"! I believe, Marques said, that the Father led Jesus into Heaven saying, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased." When the road gets tough on this Earth, we, too, can reach out and find shelter in God's unchanging Hands.

The Washington Cooperative Parish enjoyed Shrove Tuesday, was somber on Ash Wednesday and through the Lenten Season, and rejoiced mightily on Easter Sunday!!!
