Tell of Where We've Been

Philosopher, poet, and novelist **George Santayana** is perhaps best known for his haunting caution that "those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it" (*The Life of Reason*, 1905). The sentiment in recent months is one of unsteadiness and division. It seems more important than ever to be aware of our collective human story – to be critical and reflective, calling out the

troublesome stories of our history in an effort to avoid repeating our mistakes. By understanding our past, we can begin to speak out against ignorance and chart a more informed, compassionate, and inclusive course forward.

As the Music Ministry of First Congregational Church wraps up our program year, we are reminded of just how powerful a tool music can be. Through music you can find peace, hope, and light. In music you can find joy, sorrow, and longing. And with music you can find refuge, community, and courage. Our year-end "Music Celebration Sunday" is inspired by music's unique ability to inform,

inspire, and encourage. This special Sunday is set for June 1, and as a centerpiece for that morning, we are excited to announce the world premiere of *Tell of Where We've Been*... a piece written especially for our choir by **Philip Crumpton**. Philip is a member of FCUCC and sings in the bass section of the Chancel Choir. Like Santayana, Philip's work encourages us to wrestle with our challenging human history so that we might come away as advocates to resist repeating it. I'd like to give Philip the floor to talk more about this special composition:

Tell of Where We've Been was written specifically for the FCUCC Chancel Choir, organist **David Acton**, and pianist **Sandi Shroads**. Its central message is simple and impactful, sung by the choir throughout the piece: *'Let us tell of where we've been so we won't go there again.'*

The work features the poetry of **Frances Ellen Watkins Harper** (1825-1911), a Black American woman, poet, author, lecturer, and civil rights activist. Her poetry speaks of longing for freedom, the tragedies of slavery and racism, and also hope for a better future when we unite together. The poems will be read verbatim on top of a musical backdrop by the FCUCC musicians, who then offer a musical response that reflects and amplifies the emotions and message of each poem.

The three featured poems are "Bury Me in a Free Land," "The Slave Mother," and "The Burdens of All." "Bury Me in a Free Land" speaks of the yearning to see freedom before the poet's death and to 'bury me not in a land of slaves.' "The Slave Mother" describes a painful scene of a child being forcibly taken

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from his slave mother and her heart 'breaking in despair.' The final poem, "The Burdens of All" encourages us with the possibility of all races uniting, clasping hands together, and sharing one another's burdens.

It is my hope that this work will educate and inspire the listeners. Take a moment and let yourself be transported to our very real history, understanding that not long ago the words of these poems were pinned as a harsh and present reality. Let us be emboldened to keep pressing forward, standing and fighting for freedom and equality, and let us tell of where we've been so we won't go there again." - Philip Crumpton

In addition to the exciting premiere of Philip's piece, the Chancel Choir and Bells of St. Vrain will offer music from this past program year; favorite pieces that encourage us to rise up in solidarity, listen with love and acceptance, and stand strong in the face of injustice. I hope you will join us in worship on June 1 to celebrate music at First Congregational Church. In a time when the world around us feels fractured and the future feels unsure, we can turn to music as a refuge. Music shines light into the darkness and reminds us that, even in the most uncertain moments, there is still unity, healing, and hope. We look forward to entering a space together that revitalizes the spirit and emboldens courage.

Our building was alive with color and energy from the Atrium Art Display to kids' crafts to 3D art installations and sales, to a variety performance that highlighted the many creative gifts of our members and friends. Throughout the year, our **Creation Justice Earth Holders** group has gathered every other Tuesday for meditation, creative writing, discussion, and reflection. Rooted in spiritual practice and grounded in Earth-centered wisdom, this group has nurtured both our souls and our shared commitment to climate justice. We've also started a new vegetarian **9-To-Dine** group and hosted meaningful book studies and film screenings that helped us learn, question, and grow.

As we reflect on this first year, we are grateful for how far we've come—and how energized we are for all that lies ahead. We are committed to continuing this journey by

further shrinking our carbon footprint, expanding our educational offerings, and deepening our partnerships in the wider community.

MAY | JUNE 2025 ROOT for Justice: The Mission

The mission of Root for Justice, a "branch" of FCC's Creation Justice Ministry, is to plant trees in low-canopy neighborhoods of our city. The munificent donations we've received since our founding in October, 2024 enable us to plant trees this May in two areas identified as needing canopy the most.

• **HUNT FAMILY HOUSING** is a project in the historically Black Hillside neighborhood, and it's spear-headed by Catholic Charities, which describes the

renovation of the former 1901 brick schoolhouse into twenty-four apartments to "serve families on the verge of homelessness, couch-surfing, living in their cars, in a shelter, or on the street."

Our church is gifting the Hunt Family Housing project with twenty-four trees—serviceberry, apricot, redbud, apple, among other species—to fully plant the 2.8 acre property. The thousands of leaves, blossoms, and fruits will give the nourishment of food and beauty to the whole neighborhood.

• FOOD TO POWER is also located in the Hillside neighborhood, a few blocks south of Hunt

Family Housing. Its mission is *"To cultivate a healthy, equitable food system in the greater Colorado Springs community."* They've launched *"The Hub"* on the tippy-top of the hill as a 3.5 acre *"space for urban farming, compost production, micro-enterprise development, educational workshops, and fresh grocery distribution."*

This May, our church is gifting Food to Power a hedgerow—a short, dense canopy of trees and shrubs—which protect their gardens from the wind, offer pest-control, and provide habitat for burrowing, winged, and footed creatures. When the dates are set, we invite everyone to come celebrate!

MAY | JUNE 2025 **Together in the Wilderness**

In an effort to provide a safe place to process feelings in the complexity of our times and with support from **Rev. Lee Ann** who suggested we "not shy away from feelings," a team of BE-Coming enthusiasts met to create a plan for Lent. Led by **Del Hokanson**,

Julie Garbus, Madeline Stanger, Lisa November, and Henrika Layton, a vision evolved acknowledging it is so helpful to BE **TOGETHER** as we walk through our surrounding and internal wilderness experiences. Segments of inspiration were threaded

into our conversations, from Bishop Mariann Budde's sermon of truth to power at the President's inauguration service and a 2023 interview on State of the Nation with Bishop Budde and Cardinal Gregory. The Be-Coming team shared the five weeks of leadership with the following sessions:

- **1. From Ashes We Rise** 4. Walking the Talk 5. Micah 6 - and Faith that life is real and can be trusted
- 2. God's Beloveds
- 3. Politics and Faith

After welcomes, viewings, meditations, and conversations, attendees were invited each week to add their personal response to that week's question, by adding a "rock" to the wall mural. If you have visited the Gregg Library, you may have witnessed the group art project that represented an evolution of hope and faith through the wilderness. Starting at the base was a representation of solid ROCK as Bishop Budde referred to building national unity on rock



and not on sand. On top of that base we had our first layer of difficult things that we were carrying (cynicism; what would our children's world look and feel like; bigotry; indifference; fear of others). Then the layers lightened as we worked our way upwards each week (help the Afghan community; hopefulness; keep trusting; curiosity; ask questions and listen) to things we could DO to alleviate the darkness (golf,



knitting, SING, pick up trash, be friendly to all, share peace, send and make cards, BE). At the start of Lent, the mural itself started with a single voice of Bishop Budde's sermon, like Jesus confronting the empire. I could not help but feel the hope and faith of our process as we noted the multiple voices across the nation that rallied in protest against the "empire" the Saturday before our final Be-Coming Lenten session.

Using the words of Cardinal Gregory, we selected one of the "rocks" from the base of the mural for our final meditation, imagining we too were walking towards the tomb with the women - "what are the stones in our own lives that

cover up the tomb? How can we remove them and be resurrected with the Lord."

BE-Coming returns in May for three more sessions: May 4: A poem to change your life – led by Victoria Hansen May 11: An intergenerational conversation with Rev. Josh and the FCUCC Youth May 18: Closing rituals, celebration and community potluck before summer break. MAY | JUNE 2025 Mobile Clothing Program

"Do you need help?" asked the Bangladesh woman, who had just received clothes from the Mobile Clothing project that provides and delivers gently-used clothing to immigrants. This recipient, now a volunteer, regularly helps sort clothing and packages that the program receives to fill orders received from other immigrants at the Mobile Clothing Center, located in Beth-El Mennonite Church of Colorado Springs. Around fifty volunteers, including members of

the Immigrant Advocacy Team of FCUCC, work with **Vicki Witte**, the organization's leader, to sort, fill orders for clothing, and deliver it to applicants who are a part of the immigrant community.

Since its beginning in 2021, the program has helped people in need of clothing. In 2024, the program provided clothing to 888 clients from 197 households. During the first three months of 2025, 294 orders were filled for households representing twelve countries. The program has clients from

thirty-two different countries; from North, Central, and South America, the Caribbean, Europe, Asia, the Middle East, and Africa. To participate in the program, clients fill out an application form available in six languages from the Mobile Clothes website (*mobileclothes.org*).

The program, founded by the Beth-El Mennonite Church, helps families who are in need of help as they settle into life in a new country. Children develop self-esteem, a sense of belonging, and an opportunity to participate in school activities. Adults gain appropriate clothing for work and safety

in jobs. Because of the clothing, they can free up money for food and rent. The church/program does not proselytize. In addition, there are benefits to volunteers such as purpose in life, knowledge about people different from them, and living the "*Do unto others as you would have them do unto you.*"



The clothing drive at FCUCC will run from May 18 through June 16. Gently-used summer clothing is needed, along with men's jeans, sizes 30-30, 32-30, 34-30 (waist and length), casual T-shirts, sizes small and medium, men's sneakers, sizes 8 and 9. ALL gentlyused clothing donations are welcome and needed! However, underwear and socks must be new. The clothing may be dropped off in the Anderson Atrium.

Peek in the Past: Hospice

Flora Jean White was born in 1919 in Chicago, Illinois, but grew up in nearby Winnetka. The upscale community's elementary schools featured the Washburne progressive education, developing "the whole child." After obtaining her Bachelor of Science from the University of Wisconsin, she went to teach Physical Education at Ohio State University in Columbus, Ohio, where she met and in 1941 married

James Vernon Carris. The couple had two children, **Craig** and **Lynne**, and in 1949 the family moved to Colorado Springs, where James started a medical practice. They joined First Congregational Church that same year.

Once the children were grown, Flo Carris looked for a non-professional career, which she found as volunteer in the medical field. She served among others on the boards of Penrose Hospital and the El Paso County Health Department and in those functions came across the need for dedicated end-of-life care. With her good friend **Susan Langstaff** she launched *Pikes Peak Hospice and Palliative Care*, a non-profit, in 1980. The first of its kind in El Paso County, it meant to ensure a compassionate, comfortable, and dignified life closure for terminally ill people and their loved ones.

The first facility was a residence in Holland Park in 1987, unique in the state, followed by

"Residence on the Mount" (at Mount St. Francis) in 1990. They were replaced by the Central Residence at St. Francis Health Center on East Pikes Peak in 1995. First Congregational members **Christine Hall, Wilma Steenbergen,** and **Ruth Koenigsamen** were among the staff at these facilities. PPHPC would grow not just in facility size, later including the Unit at Penrose Hospital, but also in home services and services at local licensed nursing homes were


offered. For years, FCUCC Associate Minister, **Rev. Dr. Jacque Franklin** served as its chaplain.

Flo's other major effort was the 1990 start, with **Sister Myra James Bradley**, chief executive of the Penrose-St. Francis Healthcare System, of the (recently closed) Namaste Center for patients with Alzheimer's disease. She was Volunteer of the Year for El Paso County in 1981 and received the Sword of Hope Award from the Penrose Cancer Program and the Distinguished Service Award by the University of Colorado Board of Regents.

After James died in 1992, Flo kept the large house at Culebra Avenue for some time, but as the children had long moved away in 2000 she decided to retire to a home in Boothbay Harbor, Maine near her daughter. She died at the Gosnell Hospice in Scarborough, Maine in 2010. Please note, The Communicator will take





Each letter in the phrase has been replaced with a random letter or number. Try to decode the message.





JUNE 3: Marcelo Baca presents "Italian Cuisine"


