

ROOT for Justice: A New Grove

Root for Justice is a "branch" of FCUCC's Creation Justice ministry whose primary mission is to plant trees in low-canopy areas of our city. Since its founding in October 2024, we have received profoundly generous donations from these sources:

- \$3,500 FCC members
- \$5,000 The Caruthers Philanthropy
- \$10.000—The Santa Fe Community Foundation
- \$12,000— The Colorado Tree Coalition's Community Forest Grant

April is a big planting month for our church!

Named in honor of our formative members, Marge and Bob Murray, THE MURRAY GROVE of six deciduous trees will be planted on the 1300 block of Wood Avenue. Garrett Tree Service has volunteered to auger the holes, then stake and mulch the new trees. We'll celebrate with hot coffee and buttery cardamon bread on a date to be announced, and we welcome everyone from the church and the neighborhood to watch a historic median transformed by thousands of fresh leaves!

Our first FCUCC forest for a low-canopy area will be at **HUNT FAMILY HOUSING** at the former Helen Hunt Elementary School. This multi-family retrofit project is owned by Catholic Charities, and will be used to house and support women and children as they transition out of homelessness. (https://www.ccharitiescc.org/hunt-family-housing-capital-campaign/) The twenty-four apartments are each designed to be trauma-sensitive and ADA compliant. Occupancy will begin in July.

Our church is gifting the 2.8 acre property, which surrounds the building, with twenty-five trees and the planting will be overseen by teams of arborists from both the Colorado Tree Coalition and

Colorado Springs City Forestry who will collaborate on soil analysis, species selection, and irrigation. We want our forest to thrive and serve this community for a century. When we have the planting date, you'll all be invited to celebrate.

HERE'S THE KICKER:

Helen Hunt was orphaned as a teenager, lost her young husband and sons in quick succession, and wrote angrily and effectively about crimes against indigenous people. She understood dispossession. And now the school named for her will become, for the dispossessed, a home. She would have loved this.

The success of our project is not based on the number of trees planted. Rather, the survival rate of those trees is of

primary importance, so adequate irrigation, soil health, and maintenance are key considerations for site selection. We want FCUCC's groves to serve and thrive!

Peek in the Past: The Builders

The artisans that built our sanctuary between 1887 and 1888 had very different backgrounds and skills.

The architect, Henry Rutgers Marshall born in 1853, came from New York and had stumbled upon FCC's request for proposals, because he was trying to get his wife **Julia**, who had tuberculosis, settled in Colorado Springs. FCC accepted his submission in the ebullient Richardsonian Romanesque style over one from local architect Louis A. Pease, who would become supervising architect after, when Julia died,

Marshall withdrew to New York. There Henry touted the project and parlayed it into a profitable architect business, designing another church, a school, a library, and Rudyard Kipling's house Naulakha in Vermont. He lectured at Columbia, Harvard, and Yale on Aesthetics and turned to Psychology. He died in 1927.

The contractor **Joseph Dozier** had been a carpenter in William Stratton's contracting business, which he took over around 1877, when Stratton started prospecting. Dozier, born from French ancestors in North Carolina in 1842, came to Colorado Springs in 1873 via Baltimore and Missouri. He had built Cutler Hall at Colorado College, among others and went way over budget building our church. Joseph would continue to work on projects like the Burgess House, Nicola Tesla's laboratory, and many more. His grandson Frank Waters tells in the novel "Pikes Peak,"



how he later built his own large family dwelling near Shooks Run and got obsessed with gold mining until his death at 83.

Master stonemason Francis "Frank" Finnigan (also Finegan), born in Ireland in 1835, had fought in the Civil War with the Pennsylvania Volunteers. In 1879 he donated land at 924 W. Pikes Peak for the Washington Catholic Cemetery, which was relocated to Evergreen after 1886. He worked the church's Rhyolite stone exterior, quarried near Castle Rock. Frank, later also a city Alderman, died in 1914.

Hugh Black Copeland designed and installed the church's stained glass windows. Born in Scotland in 1862,

he moved to Denver sometime after 1881. Copeland later conceived and put in the sixteen windows above the rotunda of Denver's State Capitol. Copeland & Walker was a successful stained glass business in

Denver for many years. Copeland died in 1920.

Are We Safe in Church?

Recent events that have targeted First Congregational Church as well as incidents that we frequently hear about in the nation and world may cause some to wonder how safe we are in church. The FCUCC Safety

Team addresses the constant tension between keeping our congregation safe from the potential danger that lurks outside our doors and offering an extravagant welcome to all who enter and assuring that people can feel renewed and uplifted.

We recognize that safety is never guaranteed anywhere and there is always a potential for some catastrophic event. But we accept the charge from our Lead Minister and our Church Council that we don't wish to live in fear, but rather we feel called to live in courage.

The Safety Team meets twice monthly to evaluate safety risks, determine best practice responses, and then recommend to the Council proposed actions to mitigate those risks.



Here are a few of the key efforts that have been implemented:

- Most are probably aware that all of the exterior doors of the church are locked shortly after the start of the worship service on Sundays. This directs any late arriving traffic to a single, locked point of entry via the glass Atrium doors. An "Atrium Greeter" is stationed there to observe those who approach the glass doors and can unlock the doors to allow entry.
- This same system keeps the doors locked during the week but also gives the office staff the ability to see and talk to anyone who seeks to enter. This is a vast improvement in safety for our staff and our facilities over the past when the glass doors were unlocked during the day allowing unfettered access to the building.
- Most Sunday mornings, as well as during some other events, an additional highly visible
 outside greeter is on the sidewalk in front of the church. This position provides another set
 of eyes and another layer of security on the outside of the church to observe anything out of
 the ordinary.

• The Safety Team has developed and periodically revised a comprehensive risk assessment for FCUCC using a template designed specifically for houses of worship. This risk



assessment is a tool to assess and prioritize the risks we face and to guide the recommendations we make to the Church Council regarding means to mitigate those risks.

On March 23, the Safety Team will be the presenters at The Forum after worship. This will be an opportunity to learn more about the efforts described above as well as the steps that may be taken in the future to increase our security during worship services and other events.

On behalf of the entire Safety Team, I encourage you to put March 23 on your calendar and plan to attend The Forum presentation at 11:15 a.m.

Stephen Ministers at FCUCC

First Congregational Church has a strong, cohesive Stephen Ministry that is trained and dedicated to the call of offering spiritual support to congregants during life changes and transitions. In a 2014 issue of *The Communicator*, a Stephen Minister noted, "The very heart of the Stephen Ministry program at First Congregational Church is to provide a listening presence to someone

who is going through a crisis or tough time, such as an illness, divorce, loss of job, or a death in the family."

It was also noted that this presence is called soulful listening and that a Stephen Minister listens "from the depths of (their) soul" so that the essence of the conversation, including feelings, intentions, values and the history behind words can be expressed. In their fifty hours of training, Stephen Ministers have learned how to listen.

Another touchstone of the Stephen Ministry program at First Congregational Church is confidentiality. Names of care receivers are not revealed in any way, even during monthly supervision sessions, when Stephen Ministers discuss their relationships with their Care Receiver. Supervision is designed to get feedback, support and encouragement from other Stephen Ministers and Stephen

Leaders, all who have been through the same training.

One of the non-profits which received an MG&O grant in 2024 was **We Fortify**. It is a non-profit land development and human services organization dedicated to building villages of tiny homes that provide affordable housing and support services to help young adults (ages 18-25) escape homelessness and break the cycle of poverty.





Their 2024 Colorado Springs project, Working Fusion at Mill Street, consists

of eighteen tiny homes and offers counseling, education, and workforce support for its residents. Many of the young

adults are still in high school completing GEDs or taking college courses. Two residents have already graduated from the program, going on to college or securing jobs and becoming financially independent. Two more will graduate this year with Associate's Degrees.

The 2025 "Cooking School" calendar is ready and starting in March! We meet five times between the beginning of Lent and Harvest Season, always on Tuesdays, always in the Kitchen or Founders' Room at First Congregational Church, depending on the preference of the presenter. We start at 11:00 a.m. and conclude around 1:00 p.m., give or take a little.

Our presenters come from within our congregation this year with one guest chef from the community. We encourage our presenters to tell us their stories as they share recipes and ideas from their mothers and grandmothers with the hope this will encourage us to return to our own kitchens and try some of these recipes for our own families and friends. The presenters will demonstrate the recipes they are featuring, provide us with tastes of each recipe, and take plenty of time for questions and audience interaction. There is no charge for "Cooking School" although we put a basket out for those who would like to contribute a tip to the presenter before leaving.

MARCH 18: JOAN ERICSON - "A TOUCH OF TRADITIONAL JAPANESE FARE"

Joan Ericson was raised in Japan as part of a missionary family. She speaks and reads Japanese fluently, and has just retired from Colorado College where she taught the Japanese language and culture for many years. She and her husband **Jim Matson** (who was raised in India) raised their two daughters speaking Japanese as their first language, English as their second. She has continued to prepare meals from scratch using basic wholesome (not processed) ingredients and will help us adapt these recipes to ingredients available in our markets.

APRIL 29: ALYCE MORGAN - "COOKING FOR TWO,

the Art of Cutting Back Quantities in Recipes."

Since our recipes tend to be written for six-eight people, many of us whose families have grown and gone tend to have too many left-overs in our refrigerators...which tend to gravitate to the back of the shelves until we find them in the corner overrun with hairy mold. **Alyce Morgan** has had a long-term interest in, among other things, cooking and entertaining, and will help us address that issue and others. He doesn't talk much, but he's a hard worker –polite, patient and present. During his breaks, he enjoys the sunlight on his face and the leaves on the trees. In the evenings, he eats, reads and dreams. Over the years, Wim Wenders has made many movies about characters who want to flee the world; with Perfect Days, he reminds us that fleeing the world and wanting to embrace it are two sides of the same coin. He follows Hariyama with loving intimacy." [Telluride Film Festival]

"There's a word in Japanese that transliterates to "komorebi" and refers to a phenomenon for which there is no single word in English: the quality of light as it filters through foliage. Hirayama's life and mind are full of shadows, despite the sunlight he keeps reaching for. The light of komorebi is not full brightness — it is glistening, ever-changing, full of variation. Hirayama loves this, and he photographs it because the constant capture of what other people miss — the subtle shifts in the canopy every single day — are for him another indication of the trees' vitality." 




