These three German-born musicians have done much to enrich the life of the church. Schütz was an early master who focused on settings of biblical texts. Bach wrote over 300 cantatas along with works for organ and instrumental pieces, and has been called the "fifth evangelist" for the way he proclaimed the gospel in music. The Johnson Amendment

Bishop Eaton addresses the recent IRS ruling that suggests the agency may interpret the Johnson Amendment in ways that would allow churches and other religious organizations to engage in partisan activity.

Emphasizing the importance of safeguarding the Johnson Amendment, Eaton says, "theologically, it keeps partisanship out of religious organizations and, for our church, protects the proclamation of the gospel and the right administration of the sacraments as the unique purpose and calling of God's church and our congregations. At the same time, it allows appropriate avenues for advocating for God's justice and concern for good social order."




The Johnson Amendment was created in 1954 and named after Senator Lyndon Johnson. The amendment states church and and other non-profits are "absolutely prohibited from directly or indirectly participating in, or intervening in, any political campaign on behalf or (or in opposition to) any candidate for elective public office".

Overturning the law could mean that donations made to churches could support a political candidate and this would make churches "bigger money players" in politics (npr.org).

Steve's Science Tidbits

The Importance of Facial Expression

Think of how boring it would be if we didn't have facial muscles. Interactions with other people would be extremely challenging. Socializing is critically dependent on one's ability to "read" others.

Much of the information we convey to others is manifest in ways we move our facial muscles. On average, people produce 101 facial contractions per minute during a typical human encounter. These muscles are innervated by CVII, the seventh cranial nerve, and when this nerve is compromised by injury or viral infection, the facial muscles are rendered nonfunctional, a condition known as Bell's Palsy. As a result, the facial muscles droop and become expressionless, devoid of any emotion.

We need facial expressivity to facilitate human bonding. For every emotion there seems to be an accompanying reflexive facial movement; it's an engrained feature of our communication system: corners of the mouth upturned when amused, furrowed brows when puzzled, widening of the eyes when shocked, etc. Along with changes in vocal inflections, communication becomes visual as well as auditory, one reinforcing the other. Even young children can describe the emotion conveyed when shown pictures of people with different expressions.

In a recent study, 52 people were filmed during an online social interaction with a researcher that captured both audio and video responses. Participants were exposed to challenging situations that mimicked everyday experiences, and their facial movements were carefully monitored. Automated software coded each muscle movement.

Results showed that people who were more agreeable, extroverted or neurotic (as measured by a questionnaire) were more facially expressive. One researcher commented that people with these personality traits probably enjoyed socializing more or have strong concerns about how they appear to others.

Following these exercises, the paired participants rated how much they liked each other, as did 176 other participants who merely watched video clips of these people. The results were overwhelming: the more facially expressive the person, the more they were liked.

When the active participants reported their thoughts and feelings after the interactions, and these were compared with what the casual observers were "reading" in the faces of the participants, it turns out the participants were effectively broadcasting their thoughts through their faces. Moreover, the more expressive the participant, the easier they were to read and, hence, the more they were liked.

This makes a lot of sense. When we meet someone new, aren't they auditioning for our trust, for our potential friendship or affection, for their appreciation of our humor, for their genuineness of response? We intently watch their facial reactions for a better picture of who they are and appreciate more those who are unambiguous.

Being more open and expressive may be threatening to some, leading to feelings of vulnerability, but there are definite social rewards. Unless you are playing cards, a poker face can be a disadvantage. **Steve Downs**
