SCRIPTURE READING

Luke 11:1-13

He was praying in a certain place, and after he had finished, one of his disciples said to him, "Lord, teach us to pray, as John taught his disciples." so he said to them, "When you pray, say: Father, may your name be revered as holy. May your kingdom come. Give us each day our daily bread. And forgive us our sins, for we ourselves forgive everyone indebted to us. And do not bring us to the time of trial." And he said to them, "Suppose one of you has a friend, and you go to him at midnight and say to him, 'Friend, lend me three loaves of bread, for a friend of mine has arrived, and I have nothing to set before him.' And he answers from within, 'Do not bother me; the door has already been locked, and my children are with me in bed; I cannot get up and give you anything.' I tell you, even though he will not get up and give him anything out of friendship, at least because of his persistence he will get up and give him whatever he needs. "So I say to you, Ask, and it will be given to you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you. For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened. Is there anyone among you who, if your child asked for a fish, would give a snake instead of a fish? Or if the child asked for an egg, would give a scorpion? If you, then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him!"

BENEDICTION

"Learning to Pray"

Inspired by Eugene Peterson & Luke 11:1-13

In Luke 11:1–13, the disciples ask Jesus, "Lord, teach us to pray." They weren't asking for a technique. They had seen how prayer shaped Jesus' life—how it grounded Him in the Father's will, gave Him strength, and nurtured intimacy with God. They wanted that kind of life.

Eugene Peterson, in *The Message* and throughout his pastoral writings, reminds us that prayer is not about getting what we want but becoming who God intends us to be. He writes, "Prayer is not something we think up to get God's attention; it's God's way of getting our attention."

Jesus answers their request not with abstract ideas, but with a prayer—the Lord's Prayer—and with a story. He teaches us to ask, seek, and knock—not as consumers before a vending machine, but as children coming home. He assures us that the Father is not reluctant or distant, but generous and near.

Peterson once said that prayer is "answering speech"—our response to a God who has already spoken, already loved, already invited us into relationship. Jesus' prayer is simple, but it reorients us: to God's name, God's kingdom, God's provision, God's mercy, and God's protection.

This week, let us pray as learners. Not to master prayer, but to be mastered by the God who loves to give the Holy Spirit to those who ask.

Praver:

Lord, teach us to pray—not for performance, but for presence. Shape our hearts through Your words. Help us trust that when we ask, You hear. When we knock, You open. Amen.
