

From the Pastor's Desk

Dear people of God,

As I reflect on the events of the past month, even the past year, I am reminded of my childhood, of the summer that I was 12 and was about to enter the 7th grade. The year was 1976, the year of our country's bicentennial. That was a great year. Everyone was gearing up for the big celebration that was to happen on the 4th of July. It seemed as if all the communities spent extra on fireworks just to have a once in a lifetime display and even the schools were getting involved. The Spring concert for the Catholic school I attended was a musical depicting the revolution. We were celebrating 200 years since we declared independence from Great Britain, 200 years since the document that declared our independence was signed, because we were already at war with Great Britain and the war wouldn't end for another couple of years but we mark the creation of the United States of America with the signing of the Declaration of Independence which begins the second sentence with these words: "We hold these truths to be self evident, that all men are created equal..."

I also remember in Social Studies that when we discussed the United States, we described ourselves as a melting pot. This was a matter of pride that we were a nation of people from all countries of the world, and we also lifted up the poem by Emma Lazarus that is on the Statue of Liberty. "...Give me your tired, your poor, Your huddled masses yearning to breathe free, The wretched refuse of your teeming shore. Send these, the homeless, tempest-tost to me, I lift my lamp beside the golden door!" As a nation we firmly believed that all men are created equal and to prove that we accepted everyone into our melting pot certain that it was these two things that made us strong as a nation because we were the United States of America.

Lately though it seems that instead of being a melting pot, we are separating into our different identities. Instead of focusing on what we have in common, which is a lot, we are focusing on our differences. We are separating, isolating ourselves, pushing people out instead of welcoming with open arms. There is a key ingredient that is missing. If you are a baker you know what I mean, there is always one ingredient that is added, eggs mostly, that is used to bind everything together. For people this ingredient is love, more specifically it is God's love. Jesus commands that we love our neighbors as ourselves and that we love each other just as he has loved us. Nelson Mandela, not one of my favorite people but here he is spot on, once wrote, "No one is born hating another person because of the color of his skin, or his background, or his religion. People must learn to hate, if they can learn to hate, they can be taught to love, for love comes more naturally to the human heart than its opposite." We must make sure that we are teaching love and not hate. Let us begin loving each other so that once again we can be the United States of America in name and in our relations with each other.

One way we can do this is by living the words of this prayer of St. Francis. If you know the tune sing it loud, if not that is ok but together let us pray: Lord, make us instruments of your peace, where there is hatred, let us sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is discord, union; where there is doubt, faith; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy. Grant that we may not so much seek to be consoled as to console; to be understood as to understand; to be loved as to love. For it is in giving that we receive; it is in pardoning that we are pardoned; and it is dying that we are born to eternal life. Amen.
