Food For Thought

Philippians 4:19	And my God will	l meet all your needs
according to the	riches of his glor	y in Christ Jesus."

This verse expresses Paul's assurance that God will provide for the needs of the Philippian believers, not based on their own merit, but according to God's abundant provision in Christ. It emphasizes God's generosity and faithfulness in meeting the needs of those who trust in Him.



Lutheran theology emphasizes that God provides for all human needs, both physical and spiritual. This provision is seen as a gift of God's grace not something earned or deserved. It's a gift He freely gives based on our specific need.

Believers are encouraged to trust in God's faithfulness to meet their needs, as expressed in scriptures like Philippians 4:19. God gives us the grace we need to get through any situation (2 Corinthians 9:8). God's grace, his undeserved favor, is what allows us to forgive someone who wrongs us, to forgive ourselves, or to simply have enough strength to get through the day. Lutherans believe that God is the source of all good things and that He actively cares for His creation. This belief is rooted in the understanding that God created the world and all that is in it, including humanity, and that He sustains life and provides for its needs.

The idea that God will provide for all our needs is perhaps one of the hardest concepts to communicate to people. We pride ourselves in being independent and not requiring any support for anyone else. We would rather do without than be indebted to others for their help. We have become so self-sufficient that at times we even exclude God from our list of helpers.

And yet God wants to help us with our problems and needs. He wants us to call on Him and, rightly understood, put Him to the test. Not only that, but He can solve our problems and provide for all our needs. We merely need to ask. He is always eager to hear from us. As our gracious heavenly Father, He is always ready to pour out His blessings on those who come to Him acknowledging their independence on Him.

In essence, Philippians 4:19 is a message of hope and encouragement, assuring believers that God will meet their needs in accordance with His limitless resources in Christ Jesus.

When we need encouragement, whether we're facing a financial, medical, or emotional trial, we can know this for certain: God promises to provide for His people. God's Word is packed full of promises we can cling to no matter what our needs or circumstances may be.

In His goodness and mercy, God provides for our lives on this earth too. Often, it's not without suffering or waiting or a restructuring of priorities, but God provides! Everything we have is a gift from God. We have much to be thankful for.

Therefore, let us surrender our concerns to Him and trust in His unfailing faithfulness. He is faithful to His promises, and His provision goes beyond material needs. He also cares for our emotional, spiritual, and relational needs.

God's provision has been on my mind a lot lately. I think that happens when significant life changes occur, or when we are at crossroads in the path of our lives. When I look at my life to this point, I praise God for His blessings and His provision. I don't deserve His goodness, but He faithfully and lavishly provides.

In reflection, there are many things that God is providing us at Peace. Right now, I believe God is providing us with TIME! Time to reflect, time to pray, time to listen to God, time to be refreshed, time to grow and thrive in his Love, time to love one another, time to give to others as he gave Himself to us. Time to give God thanks and praise for the bounteous blessings we receive from Him.

God's provision leads us to having our hearts filled with thanks-giving. God has extravagantly provided us so much that we should not be anxious but trust that *God will meet all our needs according to the riches of his glory in Christ Jesus*. Let us: "Praise God from whom all blessings flow!"

Praise God, from whom all blessings flow;

Praise Him, all creatures here below;

Praise Him above, ye heav'nly host;

Praise Father, Son, and Holy Ghost!

May this verse encourage us to live with a spirit of contentment and gratitude. As we recognize God's grace and abundant provision in our lives, let us respond with thanksgiving and a willingness to share our blessings with others. Amen!

Have Your Say — Survey Results

First, the Council wants to say thank you to all those who completed the questionnaire. You all provided some thoughtful answers. Thank you also goes out to Lena Sievers who summarized all your feedback to make it easy to incorporate into our Congregational Mission Profile. This document has now been completed and submitted to the Synod. If you would like to see a copy, please see Lena.

Out of all the items people are excited about at PLC, these 3 stood out:

- 1. Our Community Lunches these provide a time for our members to get together every month sometimes learn a new skill or hear an interesting speaker.
- 2. Our Newsletter it keeps us all informed and uplifted.
- 3. Our service ministries the Saturday Outreach lunch was mentioned multiple times, but also mentioned were DARS, Durham Youth and Olive Branch.

In response to the final question on the survey 'What else do you think we should prioritize at Peace' there was some very interesting input provided. I'll do my best to set out the overriding themes.

- 1. Balance traditional and more modern elements in worship services. There is a desire for services that 'attract the youth and seniors with inspirational messages, music, outreach and working together as the body of Christ,' and a request for services that are modern and uplifting.
- 2. Return to some of the former practices some noted that some of the more traditional elements of our Worship services should be brought back. For example: pastors should wear robes, Assistant Ministers should sit in the altar area during the service, include the traditional aspects of Lutheran services, e.g. the Apostle's Creed and the Lord's Prayer in all services.
- 3. Suggestions about Our Pastor- he/she should:
- (a) Be relatable someone who will lead with wisdom, laughter and faith.
- (b) Recognize and provide support through this period of change truth & reconciliation, redevelopment, making us an affirming church.
- (c) Promote Lutheran doctrine, hold Bible Studies.
- (d) Value both internal and external ministries, with an emphasis on more visitation. However, the lay visitation team was recognized as valuable,
- 4. Some interesting ideas were raised:
- (e)"members should be invited to offer suggestions for hymns and liturgy". (this is generally overseen by the Worship & Arts Committee suggestions may be directed to the Chairperson Giselle Bischof
- (f) Acquire dollies to more easily move chairs and tables for setting up events. (This idea has been forwarded to the Property Committee who agree this would be of value.)
- (g) "More volunteers on all committees."

Well, it seems we have our work cut out for us to address conflicting desires, but there is consensus on the things that connect us. With God's Grace, we pray our Call Committee will find us a Pastor with the talent, wisdom and faith to lead all of us into our future together.

In the meantime, please pray for all the lay leaders and volunteers doing their best to provide for all the needs of our diverse congregation. Oh, and, if you have time, join us on one of our working committees.

Choking Hazard Warning

Attention: Seniors 55+

An elderly man, 62 years old, was hospitalized due to choking on water that entered his lungs after drinking a glass of water at 11 PM. He was rushed to the hospital for emergency treatment but unfortunately he passed away. His sudden death serves as a reminder to the elderly that no matter what they do, they must pay attention to two things:

One is to avoid falls, and

The other is to prevent choking.

After the age of 55 and beyond, it's important to start practicing:

When drinking water — Stop everything and focus on drinking water carefully and slowly. Elderly people are prone to choking because the muscles in their throat and swallowing mechanism have weakened, degenerated, and lack strength.

The following information was shared by a doctor. It's worth passing on, especially to your elderly relatives and friends.

Pneumonia caused by choking on water, milk, soup, etc., is a common problem among the elderly.


If there are elderly people at home, take note:

- 1. Use a straw if possible when drinking water, and keep your head slightly lowered while swallowing.
- 2. Prefer thick soups over thin ones. Thin soups flow too quickly and can easily cause choking if breathing is uneven.
- 3. Do not drink liquids while there is still solid food in your mouth or while chewing. If water stays in the mouth too long, it may flow into the windpipe and cause choking if you're not careful.
- 4. Do not talk or turn your head while there is food or water in your mouth.
- 5. Elderly people do not have the same physical strength and endurance as younger individuals.

If liquid or food enters the windpipe and is expelled, the face may turn red, and blood pressure may rise. In some cases, choking can be fatal.

As we age, we must drink water slowly, attentively, and cautiously. Take care of yourself and share this with other elderly individuals.

Meaning of Altar Candles

In Lutheran tradition, altar candles symbolize the presence of Christ as the Light of the World and remind worshippers of his sacrifice. They also represent the light of the gospel and the sacredness of the worship space. Some congregations light altar candles only during Holy Communion, while others light them during all services.

Here's a more detailed look at the symbolism:

- Christ as the Light of the World: Candles are a visual representation of Jesus's declaration, "I am the light of the world" (John 8:12). They remind believers that Christ brings light and guidance into the darkness of sin and death.
- Christ's Sacrifice: As a candle gradually burns away to provide light, it symbolizes the self-giving nature of Christ's sacrifice for humanity.
- The Sacredness of Worship: Candles can also signify that the time and space for worship are set apart and holy, marking them as a place where God's presence is felt.
- The Gospel's Light: Lit candles can also represent the light of the Gospel, which illuminates the way to salvation.
- **Practical Considerations:** Historically, altar candles served a practical purpose, lighting the altar for the priest during services, especially in darker churches.
- **Two Altar Candles:** Many Lutheran congregations use two altar candles to symbolize Jesus's dual nature as both human and divine.
- Carrying the Light: At the end of a service, a lit candle may be carried out into the world, representing the call for believers to shine the light of Christ in their daily lives.

Fur Family Pic's — next month!





Congratulations to our new National Bishop

Delegates at the 2025 ELCIC National Convention have elected Rev. Dr. Larry Kochendorfer to serve as its fifth National Bishop in the ELCIC!

Kochendorfer becomes the fifth National Bishop in the ELCIC, following Donald Sjoberg (1986-1993), Telmor Sartison (1993-2001), Raymond Schultz (2001-2007) and Susan Johnson (2007-2025).

Currently, Kochendorfer is serving as interim pastor at Our Redeemer, Penticton, B.C., as well as assistant to the bishop in the British Columbia (BC) Synod. Following the announcement of the election,

Kochendorfer asked for prayers for his congregation, the BC Synod and his Synod Bishop, Rev. Kathy Martin.

Kochendorfer served as Bishop of the Synod of Alberta and the Territories (2012-24) and has also worked in congregations in Dickson, Lethbridge and Edmonton, Alberta

Having served the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) as a council member from 2017-23, Kochendorfer is currently chair of the LWF's Mutual Responsibility Task Force and was recently co-chair of the Lutheran portion of the Joint Anglican Lutheran Commission.

Kochendorfer has been married to his wife Cathy for 42 years, and the two have raised four children together.





All delegates, visitors and special guests attending the 2025 ELCIC National Convention celebrated and honoured the legacy of outgoing National Bishop Susan Johnson. Taking office in 2007, Johnson became the first female national bishop in the ELCIC, and carried the role through three further elections (2011, 2015, 2019) until the announcement that she will be retiring this fall.

The Eastern Synod of the ELCIC


