We pray for all those who have not found rest this summer: those juggling more demands and fewer resources at work or at home; those whose work or plans for the future are uncertain; those fleeing conflict and seeking new homes in despair and hope.

May they know your strength and assurance day by day,

Loving God,

All: Hear us as we pray.

O God, we need the embrace of your presence, each in our own way.
Bring healing and peace to our lives and to this world you love.
Open our eyes and our hearts so that we may offer healing and peace to others.

Priest: May God be with you.

All: We lift them to the Lord.

Priest: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

All: It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Priest: We give you thanks and praise, almighty God,

through your beloved Son, Jesus Christ,

our Saviour and Redeemer. He is your living Word,

through whom you have created all things.

By the power of the Holy Spirit he took flesh of the Virgin Mary and shared our human nature. He lived and died as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.
