Unless the cheating had changed and metastasized ... unless cheating on a golf course was a symptom of something so deeply ingrained that it was no longer possible to differentiate the dye from the fabric ... as if cheating had become one's very DNA. Then, cheating becomes habitual. It becomes easy.

Then the golf course cheater makes it a matter of course to cheat—to cheat on taxes, to cheat on wives, to cheat on bank loans, to cheat on contractors, to cheat with the fraud of inflated valuations. No harm, no foul, right?

A lifestyle of cheating wreaks havoc. It breeds corruption. Acting only out of self-interest, it bullies the weak. It destroys lives. It cheats immigrants out of due process. It cheats the most vulnerable people out of medicare. It cheats the poorest of the poor in Africa out of food and medical supplies. It cheats our allies out of the respect they deserve. It cheats minorty communities with blatantly unfair redistricting. It cheats schoolkids out of the truth by banning history books. It cheats refugees by denying them basic rights. It cheats the people of Gaza out of life itself.

Cheating strangles the truth by choking it in lies. It cheats our democratic process with autocratic power. It cheats justice by pardoning insurrection. Finally, it even cheats Christianity by substituting a bogus, pseudo-faith that is rooted in privilege and power, not compassion and grace. It blurs truth with blatant lies and hypocrisy. It pretends to be Christlike without the cross. It undermines the Gospel.

One may protest that I'm being too harsh on chronic cheaters. So, it's only fair, I guess, to note that God cheats too.

With a mischievous smile, God held back all the wild cards before he shuffled the deck in the duel with the devil. While the devil held four aces and death seemed destined, God's hand was flush with wild cards—a royal flush, in fact, of eternal life in Christ.

It's not fair what Jesus did. He didn't play by the rules. After all, Pilate sentenced him to death ... and death has firm and final rules. Death always gets the last word—until Jesus came. Jesus let go of his power and let death have its way—all the way to the cross. Jesus let death play its game—all the way to his last breath.

But then, God cheated. He changed the rules and ended the game. And with it, God exposed all cheaters of all time for their fraud. And God still calls out their lies and undoes their work. Those who have been victimized by the lies have their humanity restored. The vulnerable poor are cherished and fed. Refugees fleeing despair and death are given hope and a home. The cheating ways of humanity are trumped by the freedom of Christ. Christ makes you free so you don't have to cheat anymore. Not at golf. Not at grifting. Not at all ... because Christ has already justified us and given us the victory.

Cheating doesn't finally win anything anyway because finally, your cheatin' heart will tell on you—always. Today, Mr. Cheat-Os has met his match. Mr. Cheat-Os. Meet Mr. Free-Tos. FLIX FOR FAITH POPE MOVIE #3 FRIDAY, AUGUST 15TH AT 6:30PM






