Luke 12:13-21

(NRSV)

¹³Someone in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the family inheritance with me."

¹⁴But he said to him, "Friend, who set me to be a judge or arbitrator over you?"

¹⁵And he said to them, "Take care! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; for one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions."

¹⁶Then he told them a parable: "The land of a rich man produced abundantly.

¹⁷And he thought to himself, 'What should I do, for I have no place to store my crops?'

In one of the classes I took to be a pastor, we had

to read myths of creation from societies all over the world. It struck me that every society that lasted believed in powers greater than humanity ruling over the earth, that humans are to serve.

You could argue that it was an evolutionary thing, that by worshipping something greater than any one individual, the community was fostered. I think it is more fundamental than that, however.

To live, we need to eat, to breathe, to rest; all of these needs have something to meet them. We would not eat if food did not exist, we would not breathe if there was no oxygen, and we would not rest without safe refuge.

We all seek spiritual fulfillment as well; therefore, there must be something universal to meet that need, and I believe it is love from God, the source of all our life. Our Creator made us directly aware of Godself through Abraham and his descendants. The psalmist praises "the steadfast love of the Lord" for meeting all of our needs well.

Just as the world was created in stages, human society has been growing over time. Unfortunately, just as people have a tendency to binge on junk food instead of eating only healthy foods, people also have a tendency to worship unhealthy things.

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Hosea brought God's call for healthier spiritual

existence to the Israelites shortly before the fall of the Northern kingdom. You can hear the love of God mourning their choices as they allied with Assyria instead of trusting in God, because they would become subject to Assyrian rule and suffer under a king that did not love them as God did.

We see that today, with people across the world venerating humans in power or in the spotlight of fame. Fans invest in [politicians, sports teams, performers, etc.] but get only short-term gains, if anything, from them. There is only one ruler that outlasts all human endeavors, and that is God.

Jesus warned His followers about that, to be careful of what they sought. Just like the "fool" in the story we heard today, we can't take material gains with us when we die. Someone else will inherit what we leave behind. All we can take with us is ourselves, the kind of person we are.

So what makes you who you are? Paul asked the Colossians to put aside the things that are "earthly: fornication, impurity, passion, evil desire, and greed (which is idolatry)." From creation in Genesis through all the ages, what matters most are our relationships with God and with one another – and our relationships have been corrupted with sin.

In Christ we have the opportunity to move forward in healthier, happier ways than earthly greed affords. When we focus on Jesus as our head and all of us equal (albeit different) parts of the church body, no longer do we favor one at the expense of another.

In Christ, the divisiveness of segregated groups is eliminated. "There is no longer Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave and free; but Christ is all and in all!"

So where is your head at? Are you prioritizing the love of God or love of something else? If we truly want to live well, we need to refocus on God daily, through prayer, reading of scriptures, and meditating how we can better apply God's grace in this world.
