Founded by German immigrants in 1745, St. John's Lutheran Church is one of the oldest congregations in the North Carolina Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. THIS SUNDAY AT ST. JOHN'S

❖ Today is the Eleventh Sunday after Pentecost. The Season after Pentecost (the long, green season also commonly known as Ordinary Time) begins following Pentecost Sunday and ends on Christ the King Sunday, November 23, 2025. This season focuses on discipleship and the teachings of Jesus. Our Gospel texts come from Luke.

SERVICE NOTES

- ❖ A printed cross + is an invitation to make the sign of the cross on your forehead or body. We make the sign of the cross to remember our Baptism and the promise: "You have been sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked with the cross of Christ forever."
- ❖ **Bold print** indicates a speaking part for the whole assembly.
- * Restrooms are located in the Narthex to the right of the front door and through the doors behind the choir to the left.
- ❖ A nursery is available for your use. Ask an usher for directions.
- ❖ You are welcome to receive Holy Communion. If you would prefer to receive a blessing instead, please come forward during the distribution with your arms crossed.
- The homemade communion bread is gluten free. If you prefer a wafer, please indicate by raising a finger as you approach the pastor. Grape juice, instead of wine, is also available.

A NOTE FROM PASTOR MATT HANSEN

People of St. John's:

We may not face the same physical problems as the woman in our Gospel text this week, but I suspect there are many of us facing great personal challenges. In the reading, the bent over woman is healed simply for showing up where the assembly and Jesus are present. She was seen by Jesus, with her pain, before she could even ask for help. There's a clue for us here.



Week after week, we are drawn into the presence of Christ. At St. John's, in Word and Sacrament, Jesus sees us. Jesus calls us. Jesus frees us from the power of sin. Jesus reminds us of how much he loves us.

The leaders in the synagogue were upset because this healing took place on the Sabbath. But Jesus insists that the Sabbath is precisely the day for release and renewal. In other words, rest and freedom are not luxuries for another time, but God's promise for today.

So when you come to worship, know this: you don't need to have it all together, or even know what to pray. Simply being here is enough. Christ seeks you out, sees you as you are, and gives you what you most need: the mercy and freedom of God.

FIRST READING: ISAIAH 58:9b-14

A reading from Isaiah.

^{9b} If you remove the yoke from among you, the pointing of the finger, the speaking of evil, ¹⁰ if you offer your food to the hungry and satisfy the needs of the afflicted, then your light shall rise in the darkness and your gloom be like the noonday.

11 The Lord will guide you continually and satisfy your needs in parched places and make your bones strong, and you shall be like a watered garden,

like a spring of water

whose waters never fail.

¹² Your ancient ruins shall be rebuilt; you shall raise up the foundations of many generations; you shall be called the repairer of the breach, the restorer of streets to live in.

¹³ If you refrain from trampling the Sabbath, from pursuing your own interests on my holy day;

if you call the Sabbath a delight and the holy day of the Lord honorable;

if you honor it, not going your own ways, serving your own interests or pursuing your own affairs;

¹⁴ then you shall take delight in the Lord, and I will make you ride upon the heights of the earth;

I will feed you with the heritage of your ancestor Jacob, for the mouth of the Lord has spoken.

PSALM 103:1-8

We read a portion of Psalm 103 responsively by verse.

 - ⁴ who redeems your life from the Pit, who crowns you with steadfast love and mercy,
 - ⁵ who satisfies you with good as long as you live so that your youth is renewed like the eagle's.
 - ⁶The Lord works vindication and justice for all who are oppressed.
 - ⁷ He made known his ways to Moses, his acts to the people of Israel.
 - ⁸ The Lord is merciful and gracious, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love.


SECOND READING: HEBREWS 12:18-29

A reading from Hebrews.

¹⁸ You have not come to something that can be touched, a blazing fire, and darkness, and gloom, and a tempest, ¹⁹ and the sound of a trumpet, and a voice whose words made the hearers beg that not another word be spoken to them. ²⁰ (For they could not endure the order that was given, "If even an animal touches the mountain, it shall be stoned to death." ²¹ Indeed, so terrifying was the sight that Moses said, "I tremble with fear.") ²² But you have come to Mount Zion and to the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and to innumerable angels in festal gathering, ²³ and to the assembly of the firstborn who are enrolled in heaven, and to God the judge of all, and to the spirits of the righteous made perfect, ²⁴ and to Jesus, the mediator of a new covenant, and to the sprinkled blood that speaks a better word than the blood of Abel. ²⁵ See that you do not refuse the one who is speaking, for if they did not escape when they refused the one who warned them on earth, how much less will we escape if we reject the one who warns from heaven! ²⁶ At that time his voice shook the earth, but now he has promised, "Yet once more I will shake not only the earth but also the heaven." ²⁷ This phrase, "Yet once more," indicates the removal of what is shaken—that is, created things—so that what cannot be shaken may remain. ²⁸ Therefore, since we are receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, let us show gratitude, by which we may offer to God an acceptable worship with reverence and awe, ²⁹ for indeed our God is a consuming fire.

GOSPEL: LUKE 13:10-17

The holy gospel according to Luke. Glory to you, O Lord.

¹⁰ Now [Jesus] was teaching in one of the synagogues on the Sabbath. ¹¹ And just then there appeared a woman with a spirit that had crippled her for eighteen years. She was bent over and was quite unable to stand up straight. ¹² When Jesus saw her, he called her over and said, "Woman, you are set free from your ailment." ¹³ When he laid his hands on her, immediately she stood up straight and began praising God. ¹⁴ But the leader of the synagogue, indignant because Jesus had cured on the Sabbath, kept saying to the crowd, "There are six days on which work ought to be done; come on those days and be cured and not on the Sabbath day." ¹⁵ But the Lord answered him and said, "You hypocrites! Does not each of you on the Sabbath untie his ox or his donkey from the manger and lead it to water? ¹⁶ And ought not this woman, a daughter of Abraham whom Satan bound for eighteen long years, be set free from this bondage on the Sabbath day?" ¹⁷ When he said this, all his opponents were put to shame, and the entire crowd was rejoicing at all the wonderful things being done by him.


