

## Scripture Reading: Read 1 Corinthians 1:18-31 together.

## **Key Takeaways:**

- 1. The wisdom of God often appears foolish to the world.
- 2. Trusting God's wisdom over worldly wisdom is a daily choice.
- 3. The cross of Christ is central to God's wisdom and plan.
- 4. God often chooses the weak and foolish things to accomplish His purposes.

## **Discussion Questions:**

- 1. How does the idea of the cross being "foolishness to the world" challenge our understanding of God's ways?
- 2. The sermon mentions several areas where worldly wisdom conflicts with God's wisdom (e.g., marriage, sexuality, money). Can you think of other areas where this tension exists in your life?
- 3. Paul points out that the Corinthians themselves were not wise, influential, or noble by worldly standards. How does this challenge our views on what God values in people?
- 4. Reflect on a time when you chose to follow God's wisdom even though it seemed foolish to others. What was that experience like?
- 5. How can we discern between godly wisdom and worldly wisdom in our daily decisions?
- 6. The sermon mentions "Garden of Eden moments" where we choose to trust God or ourselves. Can you identify such moments in your life recently?
- 7. Discuss the five questions provided at the end of the sermon for discerning between foolishness and wisdom. Which do you find most challenging or helpful?

## 5 Questions to help discern between wisdom + foolishness

- 1. Does this align with God's will as revealed in scripture?
- 2. Will this help me love God and people more fully?
- 3. Will this decision help promote unity or division in the body of Christ?
- 4. Have I asked other mature Christians to help me discern what is wise?
- 5. If my choice were made public, would it bring honor to Jesus?
