Big Idea: "What sort of people ought we to be?" In a world passing away, we're called to mature in Christ, long for His return, and live holy lives. Our hope? Not our efforts, but Jesus' blood. Grow in grace, share the gospel boldly, and live for His glory.

Opening Question:

If you could wake up tomorrow and have one aspect of your life be transformed instantly, what would it be and why?

Discussion Questions:

Pastor Tim asked, "What sort of people ought we to be?" How would you answer this question based on the sermon?

Discuss the concept of measuring ourselves against Jesus rather than other people. How does this change our perspective on holiness and godliness?



The sermon emphasized that our only hope is in the blood of Jesus. How does this truth impact your daily life and interactions with others?
How do you balance looking forward to Christ's return with the desire to see others come to know Him?
Pastor Tim mentioned the importance of being "well-versed and stable in our thinking regarding Scripture." What are some practical ways we can grow in our understanding of God's Word?
Reflect on the story of the two Hebrew men during the first Passover. How does this illustrate the importance of faith in Christ's blood rather than the intensity of our faith?

Practical Applications:

- 1. This week, intentionally look for opportunities to share your faith with others, remembering that it's not about your own righteousness but about Christ's work.
- 2. Set aside time each day to study Scripture, asking the Holy Spirit for understanding and guidance.
- 3. Reflect on areas in your life where you might be relying on your own efforts rather than God's grace. Surrender these areas to God in prayer.
- 4. Consider participating in evangelism training or finding ways to become bolder in sharing your faith.
- 5. Make a list of things in your life that you consider important. Reflect on how knowing these things are temporary changes your perspective.

Closing Thought/Prayer:

Thank God for His grace and the righteousness we have through Christ's blood. Ask for His help in growing in maturity and living for His glory.
