Dear Beloved Community,

As we step into the Season of Creation, I find myself humming the familiar hymn:

*For the beauty of the earth,
For the glory of the skies,
For the love which from our birth
Over and around us lies...*

These words, penned by Folliott Pierpoint in 1864, are more than just a poetic tribute to the world around us. They are a hymn of thanksgiving and, I believe, a gentle call to responsibility.

In each verse, the hymn draws our attention to the gifts of creation: the skies, the hills, the flowers, the sun, moon, and stars, and even the joy of human love. The refrain—*Lord of all, to thee we raise / This our hymn of grateful praise*—is not only a song of gratitude but an offering. And what do we offer in return for the beauty we've received?

Creation care is not a modern trend or political agenda—it is a biblical mandate. From Genesis, we are told that God saw everything He had made, “and indeed, it was very good” (Genesis 1:31). Humanity was placed in the garden not as owner, but as steward—to tend and keep it (Genesis 2:15). That sacred calling remains.

Sadly, it is easy to forget our role in the flurry of modern life. We consume without thought, waste without concern, and often look away from the damage being done to God's good earth. But if we sing about the beauty of the earth, we must also live in a way that honors it.

So what can we do?

- **Reduce, reuse, recycle—simple steps with real impact.**
- **Support local farmers and sustainable practices.**
- **Plant a tree, tend a garden, walk instead of drive.**
- **Speak up for policies and actions that protect God's creation.**
- **Teach our children that this world is sacred.**

Let us raise more than our voices in song—let us raise our lives in grateful praise through action and intention.

As we sing together,

*For the joy of ear and eye,
For the heart and mind's delight,
For the mystic harmony
Linking sense to sound and sight...*

Let us remember: God's creation is not a backdrop to our lives—it is a holy gift, filled with wonder and responsibility. May we be faithful stewards of the beauty entrusted to us.

In our July meeting the council learned that Carol Dana, Dave Marquardt, and Marty Beert were stepping down from their roles on the Personnel Committee. I want to thank them for their dedication and fulfilling work to support the staff over the 3+ years they have served on the committee and all the work they put in to develop the Personnel Handbook and keep it updated. The committee decided to develop terms for the existing and the new members so there is at least one new member joining the committee each year. Lynette Brentin will serve a 1-year term, Marilyn Colyar a 2-year term, and Steve Giles a 3-year term. In addition to these members, Pastor JT, Treasurer Mike Snowden, and myself as president serve on the committee.

I am also pleased to announce this month that Linda Ribary has agreed to serve a 3-year term on the Audit Committee. She will join Paula Davis and Ann Rousseau in conducting this important work for our church.

And talking about THANK YOUs, please stay for the Hospitality Time after the worship service on September 7. We will be thanking and celebrating Susan Luebeck's 25th anniversary as our pianist at ADLC.

Highlights from the August Council Meeting:

- ◆ Reviewed the Little Lambs year-end financials (August 2024–July 2025). We were pleased to see the ministry ended with a net profit of \$26,640 and is on solid financial grounds to build up their reserves. Received with gratitude a gift of \$2,664 from Little Lambs that will be put into our general operating account.
- ◆ Accepted reports from the Council Committee Liaisons and acted as necessary on requests.
- ◆ Approved a motion to put a down payment of \$8,605.45 to purchase 135 regular chairs, 35 chairs with arms, and a chair dolly from ComforTek using funds from the Future Reserve Fund. This will prevent the cost for the chairs from being affected by tariff changes. The funds used from the Future Reserve Fund will be restored after the fund-raising event is completed.

- ◆ Reviewed the ADLC financials for February–July of the fiscal year. Unrestricted offering was \$29,282, which was lower than the \$39,655 budgeted. **This is a concerning trend that will require us to dip into our reserve funds sooner than planned. Please review the complete financial report in the newsletter and review the comments from the Treasurer.**
- ◆ Approved a motion to hire Gig Harbor Tree Service to cut down the three dead madrona trees that are leaning over the data lines on Peacock Hill Ave for a cost of \$1,891.75.
- ◆ Approved a motion to raise funds for the Palestine Children’s Relief Fund (PCRF) for the October 2025 service event. Information on PCRF can be found at the following link: [PCRF](#)
- ◆ Heard a report from the ADLC Endowment Committee that the balance in the account is \$86,317.04 as of 7/31/2025 (fluctuates on how the market is performing). Funds available for disbursement are \$7,484.80. **Please reach out to the committee for their guidance on how to request grants for this money.**
- ◆ Approved a motion to fill the two vacancies on the Personnel Committee. Steve Giles will serve a 3-year term. Marilyn Colyar will serve a 2-year term.
- ◆ Approved a motion to fill the vacancy on the Audit Committee. Linda Ribary will serve a 3-year term.
- ◆ Approved a retirement thank you gift for Shari Shull for her 18 years of service at ADLC.
- ◆ Approved an anniversary thank you gift for Susan Luebeck for her 25 years of service at ADLC.
- ◆ Approved serving wine at *A Chair Affair* fund raising event on September 20, 2025.

Blessings to all of the servant leaders that support and lead our ministries as we begin our fall season.

Our giving for February through July is about what is needed to meet our budget, but during the past three months giving has been significantly less than what was needed. If this pattern continues we will use a majority of the funds we have in reserve by the end of this fiscal year.



Resilience

I started these small articles on grief to open up discussions about loss. Grief is not a statistical chart and there is no miracle formula to make it go away. I am surrounded by a group of people far more experienced in living with loss than I may ever be. I am surrounded by veterans of war, wives of veterans, people who have cared for others and now need care themselves, people who have lost careers and rebounded. So many stories over so many lifetimes that still need telling.



Resilience is built by experience. For each story of loss, there is a story of life. The story of life will be different, but there is still a seed of life waiting to sprout. We don't bounce back quickly, and it's uncomfortable to be in that space, but even the smallest steps forward show growth. Your own experiences of grief will be different from each other, but I encourage you to let the past inform the present and future. Be the veteran of grief that you are as you face whatever is present today. How have your previous experiences with grief taught you to be resilient?

There will be time for Q&A, resources to take home, and information on local recycling.

September 28: The Artist's Way: Celebrating and Honoring God's Gift of Creativity

More than 30 years after it was first published, the Artist's Way remains a popular reading choice for individuals seeking to recover—or discover—their creative practice(s) and potential. The book has also spawned many Artist's Way programs across the country. The author, Julia Cameron, believes that creativity is—at heart—a spiritual matter. Among the program's core principles are: "Creativity is God's gift to us. Using our creativity is our gift back to God." And "The refusal to be creative is self-will and is counter to our true nature." Beginning in January of this year, **Heidi Giles** participated in an Artist's Way program in Tacoma. During this Forum presentation, she will provide basic background about the Artists's Way, including her experiences in the program. Are you looking to rejuvenate your creative practices?
