PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

As I write this, I am slammed with things to do. I worked the Rotary Pork and Corn Feed, which took up much of my Wednesday. I've met with my Confirmation team to plan this year's programming. I've done load after load of laundry. I mowed the lawn. I helped clean the house. I've cooked a few dinners for our household. I've begun working on my father-in-law's taxes, which are due in seven weeks. I did a couple one-to-one conversations for the Jeremiah 29 Project. I did a session of premarital counseling. And these things are in addition to my month-to-month, week-to-week duties: visiting the sick and shut-in, writing a sermon, leading Bible studies, and preparing worship.

I don't ask for sympathy because I know many of you have busier weeks than I do. You have responsibilities to family and work. You may have health concerns. You have household tasks. I bring up my responsibilities because it is so easy to forget our need for rest.

American society is hostile to rest. While you sometimes hear the refrain, "Nobody wants to work anymore," the numbers don't bear that out. Those who repeat that may have a point about work ethic and reliability, but the truth is that Americans spend more hours at work than most developed nations. Many folks work two or three jobs to make ends meet, at least one of which is often part of the gig economy, which offers more flexibility and independence at the cost of traditional employee protections. If we're parents of school-age children, we spend more time on top of that with our children's activities. Some tournaments can take a whole weekend, which makes it difficult to take any time for rest. And the less said about the time we spend on screens, the better. For this pastor, it seems as if the whole purpose of the American economy (or any other economy for that matter) is to extract as much value as possible from the earth and human bodies without regard for the impact that has in the long run.

This is where our faith can be counter cultural in a way that promotes shalom for all. Genesis 2:2-3 tells us that God rested from the work of creation on the seventh day and set it apart as a day for rest. Often, we feel like we have so much to do that we can't possibly take any rest. Yet, not being able to do so is the mark of a slave. Deuteronomy 5:15 reminds the Israelites, "Remember that you were a slave in the land of Egypt...therefore the LORD your God commanded you to keep the Sabbath day." We are neither slaves nor is our work more important than God's. We are called to live counter to this toxic grind culture, which chews up and spits out human bodies.

An excellent book on rest is *The Sabbath* by the Jewish philosopher and theologian Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel. After writing that Judaism is a religion of time before space, he remarks on the enslavement of human beings to spatial things. The sabbath is a counter to that. “The meaning of the Sabbath is to celebrate time rather than space. Six days a week we live under the tyranny of things of space; on the Sabbath we try to become attuned to holiness in time. It is a day in which we are called upon to share in what is eternal in time, to turn from the results of creation to the mystery of creation; from the world of creation to the creation of the world.” From beginning to end, Heschel’s book is a clarion call to see humanity as God sees us, not how our toxic culture sees us. Before we are objects of economic value, we are human beings created in God’s image.

It's hard to remember this, but God knows that. And God knows that you are worthy of the gift of sabbath he gives you. Whatever your situation is, I pray you take rest where you can find it, even if it is only for an hour or two. That way, we can live more fully into the shalom God dreams for us.

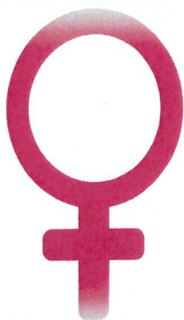

Reviewed reports by Pastor and Committees

****Pastor’s Report:** Report included in packet. Continues working with Jeremiah Project (see below).
Pastor will be gone on September 13th and 14th. He will pre-record his sermon.

**** Staff:** Report in packet. Gospel of Uke played their first “gig” at Cherry Street Book Store on 7/12

**** Worship:** No meeting. Pastor will order another container to use for the blessed grape juice so we are not wasting it.

**** Finance:** Building Fund is \$3500 down but last year we were \$12,000 down at this time. Linda and Carol have been discussing the Kitchen Fund. They would like to move this fund to Viking Grant will look into this.

**** Y/ED:** Did not meet due to Mission Trip. . Mission Trip went well. We did have several students drop out that had committed. Team will work on ideas to strengthen commitments in the future.

****Outreach and Caring:** Report in packet. Nola took communion to a member. Committee continues to reach out to members through cards and personal contact.

****God’s Work Our Hands:** Report in packet. Habitat for Humanity commitment of \$1500 was met.
Relay for Life luminaria were sold. Looking for a coordinator for the Newborn Kits. A donation was received to continue this ministry.

New Business: There have been some issues with our cleaning person. We do not have an agreement signed with her. We feel like there needs to be a discussion making sure that she understands her job description. We would like to check with Catherine to see if we can have a list of duties and expectations translated to Spanish and explained to her. We also would like to have her sign an Acknowledgement. Executive Committee will review.

Summary:

This Shalom reporting is through July/25, with a combined General and Building Funds deficit of \$27,290. The deficit is primarily due to Jan-July offerings under-budget by \$36,476. The General/Bldg Funds balance is about \$112,000, down from \$139,000 at the end of December/24. Based on reported receipts and supply expenses as of early August, the July BBQ grossed \$14,113 with net proceeds of \$9,893.

It's a wrap! All the meetings are complete for this year, supplies put away and numbers tabulated for our annual Shalom Western Barbeque. After anxious thoughts, questions and concerns we can set it aside for another year and look forward to a 40th anniversary event. The wrap-up meeting always seems to spawn some new ideas, ways to improve what we do and reconfirm the goodness of the whole project. Thank you so much to the committee folks that faithfully support each other and put in the work—Jim & Corey, Ryan, Sue, Linda, Al, Jan, Deb, Connie, Dave and Carol. They appreciate your kind words of appreciation for a job well done.

Here are the final numbers for 2025: pre-sale tickets--\$10,629.00, door sale tickets--\$2,235.00, left-over food sales--\$242.00 for a total revenue of \$13,106.00 (\$522 more than last year). 694 people went through the serving lines. The Bake Sale income was \$2,001.00 (\$126 more than last year). The total revenue was \$15,107.00. Total expenses were \$4,079.00 for a net profit of \$11,028.00. From that income we will pay the annual \$300 dues for Bread for the World and the rest will go to pay down the mortgage. Thank you one and all for a job well done!

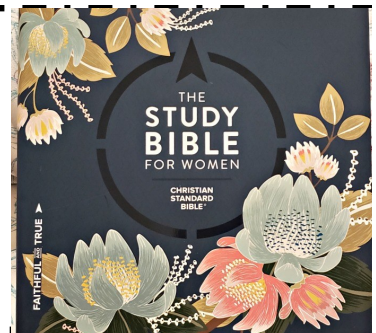

Our Wednesday evening programming begins the following week. “Blessed by God to be a Blessing”

“Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places” (Eph. 1:3).

As managers and stewards of all that God has entrusted to us, we have been blessed abundantly. Though perhaps some have been blessed more than others, all of us — without exception — have been and continue to be the recipients of God's blessings.

We are entering into our annual stewardship emphasis entitled, “Blessed by God to be a Blessing.” During this time, we will consider how God has blessed us, the reasons for God's blessings, and what our response should be to God's goodness.

On a daily basis, God provides for us. God gives the seed, along with rain and sunshine to cause the seed to grow. God gives health, strength and life itself. God gives wealth and the ability to acquire that which rightfully belongs to Him. And God gives grace and eternal life through the Lord Jesus Christ to all who look to Him in believing faith.

Did you ever stop to consider why God blesses us so abundantly? He does so for one simple yet profound reason: Because He loves us. In fact, the prophet Jeremiah tells us that God has loved us with an “everlasting love,” that is, His love knows no beginning and no end. It is God's love for us that causes Him to provide for us all that we have. And Christ demonstrated the Father's love by dying on the cross of Calvary to redeem us “while we still were sinners” (Rom. 5:8).

What should be our response to God's love and provision? In spite of King David's observation that all things come from God, some might conclude that because of their lifestyle, family background or social standing, they deserve God's beneficial treatment. Others might reason that their good works entitle them to be the recipients of God's blessings. But all of our noble efforts and supposedly righteous deeds, when done in our strength, amount to no more than what the prophet Isaiah called "a filthy cloth."

Still others might conclude that God made a mistake in determining their place on the economic spectrum, so they spend their time and energy trying to help God correct that error. Whether fretting daily over financial matters, diligently searching for a "get-rich-quick" scheme, or engaging in some activity that will allow them to win large sums of money, their dissatisfaction with God's provision causes them to get sidetracked spiritually.

The mature Christian, however, realizes that God is the Source of everything, that God owns everything, and that all that we have is in one way or another a blessing from God. The mature Christian seeks ways to use God's gifts to bless God and to be a blessing to others. And the mature Christian accepts with a spirit of contentment and thanksgiving what God has provided.

As you consider how God has blessed your life, please seek His direction concerning how you should respond. Remember, we have been "blessed by God to be a blessing." Or as one anonymous author put it so succinctly, "The greatest blessing comes to the one who freely gives and expects nothing in return."

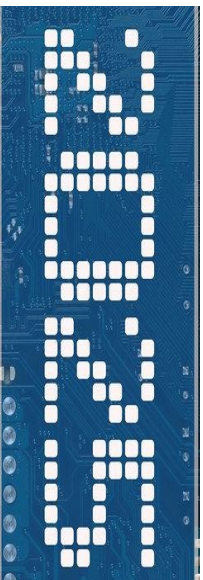

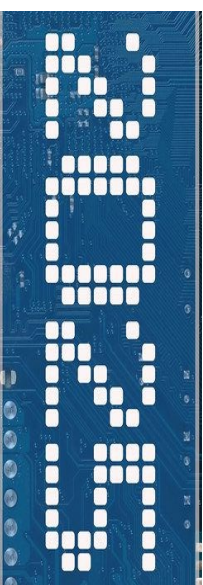
