This church family greeted him and welcomed him around the table during fellowship. As a devout Christian, Kashif has appreciated times of worship and conversation.


Kashif's and family of six's home is Pakistan amid a Muslim population. Sadly, Kashif's family is persecuted for being Christian. Most recently, his 17-year-old sister has been taken while befriending Muslim classmates. To search for her, the family must pay the police, which is a hardship for this struggling family. It is Kashif's dream to move his family to a safer country, be it the US or a country in Europe.

Among these challenges faced by Kashif's family, Kashif has been a full-time student at the Hungarian University of Agriculture and Life Sciences majoring in BSC in Business Administration and Management on a full scholarship from Christian Young People. He is expecting to finish and graduate in December. Sadly though, Kashif's scholarship has been terminated by a government decree leaving him at a loss for which to cover his final semester expenses of \$2500.00 – a mere pittance of the college education costs of the US.

Nadeem Kashif (also known to a few of us as "Ken") is a deeply compassionate and faithful young adult. It has been a joy to meet him, chat with him, and hear his passion for the future of his entire family. After reading the letter received from the university, my heart ached.

I chose to share his story, with his permission, because I know the importance for me to hear the stories of others. As a Christian, loving and serving others is the teaching of Jesus that most resonates with me. Giving respect and dignity to lives different than my own is necessary to grow as a global family in God. I was raised hearing the scripture in Luke 12:28 "From everyone to whom much was given, much will be expected." I am so very thankful to live in a country where I can be an outwardly practicing Christian, where I have the resources for my children to be educated at a university, and that safety and protection is part of my rights.

A SERVICE OF HEALING Sunday, August 31, 2025

All healing is of God.

Scripture strongly affirms ministries of spiritual healing, which in recent years have received renewed emphasis throughout Christ's holy Church. The root of the word healing in New Testament Greek, *sozo*, is the same as that of salvation and wholeness. God works to offer persons balance, harmony, and wholeness of body, mind, spirit, and relationships, seeking reconciliation between God and humanity, among individuals and

creation. The Church's healing ministry in no way detracts from the gifts God gives through medicine and psychotherapy. It is no substitute for either medicine or the proper care of one's health. Rather, it adds to our total resources for wholeness.

Healing is not magic, but underlying it is the great mystery of God's love. God does not promise that we shall be spared suffering but does promise to be with us in our suffering. Trusting that promise, we are enabled to recognize God's sustaining presence in pain, sickness, injury, and estrangement.

A Service of Healing is not necessarily a service of curing, but it provides an atmosphere in which God's presence and healing can become known. The greatest healing of all is the reunion or reconciliation of a human being with God. For the Christian the basic purpose of spiritual healing is to renew and strengthen one's relationship with the living Christ.




The Little Free Pantry


