# **Harmony and Concord**

# Marsh dedicated one-ton carillon bell to our church in 1997

Concord United Methodist Church has a distinction like none other in the state — or perhaps within the United States.

A bronze bell weighing over a ton, hanging in the carillon on the Concord University campus, is dedicated to the church.

Thereby hangs a tale.


The late Joseph F. Marsh, Jr. had a keen sense of history. A staunch member of Concord UMC, he lived in retirement in Athens after a tenure as president of Concord College from 1959 to 1973.

One day in the mid-1990s, he stopped by the familiar confines of the president's office and told then-President Jerry L. Beasley that he wanted to provide funding for a carillon tower on top of the main academic building.

Marsh even flew to France to meet personally with the head of the foundry that was producing the 48 custom-made bells for the carillon.

As the donor, Marsh got to decide what inscriptions would be cast onto the outside of the bells, and who he wanted to honor.

For Bell No. 3, he wrote: "Dedicated to the Concord United Methodist Church, founded July 25, 1858, [and] originally known as

The 48 bronze bells were cast at the renowned Paccard Foundry in Annecy-le-Vieux, France, established in 1796.

Concord Church, for worship by all denominations ... Whence came the college's name."

On the other side of the bell, he had the following quote cast, words from 1858 attributed to Sarah Caulkin Holroyd, one of the church's founders: "Let this be a place where the people of all denominations may worship together in peace, harmony, sweet fellowship and concord."

"And so, it shall be named Concord Church."

The school now known as Concord University began classes in the town of Concord (now Athens) in 1875, as Concord State Normal School. When the institution moved to its current campus in 1911, its first building was the one upon which the carillon was eventually constructed.

That three-story academic centerpiece is now known as Marsh Hall in memory of the former president.

The Marsh Memorial Carillon and Tower was dedicated in the fall of 1997, part of the college's 125th anniversary celebration. The ceremony included a "blessing of the bells" by the pastor of Concord United Methodist Church, the Rev. W. Brent Sturm.

Bell No. 3, dedicated to the church, is described as weighing 2,654 pounds, with a diameter of 50-3/16 inches and a stand-alone height of 39-9/16 inches. It produces a D-sharp pitch.

The names of at least two other living members of Concord UMC are inscribed on other bells in the carillon.

The musical instrument automatically rings out each hour from 8 a.m. until 9 p.m. during the academic year. Marsh, a stickler for precision, had the hour strike timed exactly by calling upon his former colleague David Klingensmith to synchronize it to a time signal radioed from the U.S. Naval Observatory.

The bells may be played manually by the traditional use of wooden paddles, located in the brick-lined room directly under the carillon tower. An organ-like keyboard was also installed for manual playing.

A computer programmed with dozens of tunes provides an automated option for sending music out across the landscape. This option was sidelined for

# **The New Vision Depot Needs You**



When disaster strikes in southern West Virginia relief comes from many different areas. There are several avenues of relief from within the United Methodist Church.

UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief), Volunteers in Mission, Disaster Response Ministries, and Volunteers Active in Disaster are all available to assist in the relief efforts. The New Vision Depot partners with these groups to provide materials and support in their efforts. Rev. Scott Mayberry, director of the New Vision Depot, is responsible for the collection, assembly, and checking of buckets for distribution to various areas of West Virginia.

Rev. Mayberry says they currently have about 500 Flood Buckets assembled, palletized, and ready for distribution to an affected disaster area, but they need about 1000 buckets. There are specific contents included in each bucket. A list of these contents can be found at umcmission.org/ UMCOR-kit. It is important to ensure you put the correct size and quantity of items in the bucket before you send it to New Vision Depot. When an assembled bucket arrives, it is disassembled, and the contents are checked against a list of appropriate items. If an item is included which does not meet the requirements, it is removed and replaced with an item that adheres to the UMCOR list.

If an individual, or group, would like to spend a day assembling Flood Buckets, you may contact Rev. Mayberry and arrange for a day to meet at New Vision and assemble the buckets. If you are unable to go to New Vision and participate in a day's project, you can give to your local church. In the lower left section of your check include: "Conference Advanced Special #922." This will ensure the money goes to New Vision Depot and the church is given credit for supporting this effort. The contents of each Flood Bucket cost about \$75.

years after a lightning strike fried the electronic components!

The carillon was abuzz with activity in June 2024 when the Guild of Carillonneurs in North America made it their home base for a convention. Local residents spread across campus to listen to these accomplished musicians perform in concert.

Marsh, who was briefly a Concord student before World War II, left a wish for the future on Bell No. 6: "May this carillon reach the soul of the College and remind us that education consists not only of academic achievement but also of those lessons that touch the heart."
