

Through Jesus Christ you have reconciled us to you and restored the glory you intended for us.


On the night before he died, Jesus ate supper with his friends. He took bread, gave thanks, broke it, and gave it to them, saying: "Take and eat. This is my very self given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

Then he took the cup of wine, again he gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying:
"Drink it all of you. This cup is a new covenant poured out for you and all people.
Do this for the remembrance of me."

And so, we remember: the cross, the tomb, the resurrection and ascension, and, longing for Christ's coming again in glory, we present these gifts to you. Send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon these gifts, so that we who share this bread and wine may be a people of hope, justice and love. Draw us together in Christ, and, in the fullness of time, gather us with all your people into the joy of your eternal home. Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, we worship you our God and Creator and give you our unending praise.
