SCRIPTURE READING Luke 14:1, 7-14

14:1 On one occasion when Jesus was going to the house of a leader of the Pharisees to eat a meal on the Sabbath, they were watching him closely. 14:7 When he noticed how the

guests chose the places of honor, he told them a parable. 14:8 "When you are invited by someone to a wedding banquet, do not sit down at the place of honor, in case someone more distinguished than you has been invited by your host, 14:9 and the host who invited both of you may come and say to you, 'Give this person your place,' and then in disgrace you would start to take the lowest place. 14:10 But when you are invited, go and sit down at the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he may say to you, 'Friend, move up higher'; then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at the table with you. 14:11 For all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted." 14:12 He said also to the one who had invited him, "When you give a luncheon or a dinner, do not invite your friends or your brothers and sisters or your relatives or rich neighbors, in case they may invite you in return, and you would be repaid. 14:13 But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind. 14:14 And you will be blessed because they cannot repay you, for you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."

POSTLUDE

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The Table of Humility (Luke 14:1, 7-14)

Jesus' teaching at the Pharisee's dinner party is both unsettling and freeing. In a world

where status and self-promotion often dictate who gets noticed, Jesus suggests a different

way: take the lower seat. Do not strive for honor; instead, make room for others.

Rev. Lillian Daniel reminds us that the church at its best is not a gathering of the most

impressive, but a community of the honest—people who know their need for grace. At the

table of Christ, our value is not determined by our résumé or reputation but by the

welcome of the Host.

When Jesus says, "invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind," he points us toward

a hospitality that is not transactional. It's not about what others can do for us, but about

reflecting God's own radical generosity. To sit at this table is to remember that we are all

guests, not because of merit but because of mercy.

This week, perhaps we might practice that kind of humility. Maybe it looks like stepping

back so someone else can step forward. Maybe it's welcoming someone who cannot repay

us. And maybe, as Rev. Daniel suggests, it is simply telling the truth: that our worth is not

earned, but given.

At Christ's table, there are no "better seats." There is only the grace of the Host who says,

"Come, for all is ready."
