

# PASTOR'S NOTE FROM PASTOR ERIK GRACE IN ACTION

As Martin Luther wrestled with what could make him right with God again after he had sinned, his great insight came when he realized salvation was more about what Christ had done, than what he had done. Luther realized he could never be perfect or good enough to somehow earn God's love. This why it came as such good news to him that salvation wasn't about being good enough it was rather about receiving the free gift of grace.

The phrase that Luther came up with to describe this was that salvation is by grace alone, through faith alone. This didn't mean that Christians just kept on sinning or doing whatever they wanted because forgiveness was free. Rather, true faith naturally leads to and expresses itself in good deeds. Grace is the source of the gift of salvation. Faith is the reception. Good works are the response. Luther emphasized that it is impossible to separate faith and works, just as it is impossible to separate heat and light from fire. A dynamic, living faith will inevitably produce good works as a result of the free gift of grace that has been received.

This is why our Stewardship and pledge drive campaign theme this year is "Grace in Action." We will be exploring ways that we can be stewards or caretakers of the gift of grace we have been given by responding with acts of kindness, mercy, and justice through action and advocacy. Our campaign will kick off Sunday September 28 with three Sundays emphasizing this theme.

I am thankful for the many ways that I have witnessed grace in action during my time at Holy Trinity. While there are formal ways that we try and encourage this, there are many informal ways that people show little signs of grace in how they care

for one another. As a pastor, it has been my privilege to see these actions at Holy Trinity. I've seen it in a group of people helping to renovate and organize someone's apartment after they have been at a rehab facility. I've seen it in people showing up with food after another person has had surgery. I've seen it in a group organizing rides so a friend can get to their Dr. appointments. All of these are ways grace is shared and becomes evident through action.

Your gifts of time and financial support help to create a culture at Holy Trinity where grace is not only preached and taught, but also lived out in the daily lives of people in big and small ways. As we look again for your commitments in the coming year I hope you will continue to be moved to support this place called Holy Trinity and the good news it seeks to share.




# THANK YOU FROM GRACEFUL DIAPERS

# HTLC LIBRARY BOOK REVIEW

This month's book review is on Albert Nolan's "Jesus Before Christianity." The basic premise is that Jesus can be best understood not so much through historicity (which is scant) but instead by what can be imputed from his actions and words as reported in the four Gospels. The author examines the man before he became the object of Christian faith (thus the title) as represented by the organized Church.

Nolan devotes a chapter to Jesus' most notable acts—his healing. It can be interpreted that Jesus performed these miracles neither to draw attention to his ministry nor to prove that he was son of God (which is what I had always assumed); instead Nolan argues that he healed because he had compassion for the afflicted. He never refused to heal anyone. Nor did Jesus ever claim credit for his healing; his typical response was: "Your faith has made you well."

Jesus' compassion through healing acted as a counterweight to the shabby treatment the sick and handicapped received in Biblical Palestine. According to Hebrew belief, people were infirm because God wanted them that way. A birth

defect was bestowed on a baby as punishment for the parents' or ancestors' prior sin. Children and adults were stricken with afflictions as God's punishment for their own sins. In this creepy philosophy, **sick = sinner = outcast**. (This might explain why most of the medical doctors in that part of the Mediterranean were Greek—the Jews had no interest in healing people whom they deemed evil.) Therefore, Jesus' acts of *healing* could be construed as a metaphor for *forgiveness*, and perhaps even *rebirth*. One is reminded of that curious episode reported both in Mark and Luke in which a paralytic man was lowered through the roof to Jesus—who forgave him *first* and then healed him *after*.

Nolan outlines the rigid caste system of the Hebrews, namely the Sadducees, or chief priests, scribes, and elders (upper-class); Pharisees, Essenes, Zealots, and various professionals (middle class); and everybody else (the lower class majority). Those who could not afford an education were unable to learn Hebrew law and therefore could not be compliant with all the rules they didn't even understand. Here the equation becomes uneducated = nonobservant = sinner = outcast. These were written off as dirt. Others on the dirt list, besides the poor and downtrodden in general, included tax collectors, usurers, prostitutes, other sinners, herders or shepherds (go figure), non-tithers, and all non-Jews. Jesus himself, although of middle-class origin, was disparaged because he was from Galilee (equivalent to our San Fernando Valley?). We talk about oppression from the Romans; what the Jews did to themselves was far worse. On behalf of all outcasts, Jesus threw tradition aside. He went out of his way to associate with them and to minister to them. His words and actions spoke to the basic equality of all people—a concept both revolutionary and threatening to Hebrew status quo.



#### **Book Review continued...**

What emerges is the image of a man predominantly motivated by compassion for the downtrodden. Even the "Temple Incident" could be construed not so much as outrage against the pollution of a holy space or grand-standing for Jesus' own purposes (indeed it made him famous) as it was compassion for those being exploited and cheated. Remember the scene in which Jesus wept for Jerusalem—despite its treatment of him? He knew of the coming destruction of Jerusalem in AD 70 and again in AD 135. Compassion.

You'll enjoy the surprising interpretations and slants in Nolan's book that aid in fully appreciating Jesus as a person before he became JC Superstar.

# Being Proud to Be a Fair Trade Supporter With Miriam

I just returned from visiting my daughter in San Luis Obispo where I always have to stop at her Fair Trade store HumanKind. Last year was their 15th anniversary. We have had 11 Christmas Fair Trade Sales here at Holy Trinity through HumanKind. We have had record offsite sales for them! By buying their fair trade products we have helped them spend \$3,080,038 over the 15 years they have been in operation. That is \$3 million invested in fair trade enterprises, creating sustainable jobs for people who depend on selling their handcrafted goods. HumanKind's mission statement is "To create a fair trade marketplace that supports the efforts of producers who live in communities that have been negatively impacted by inequality and lack of opportunity. We strive to inspire our community to think critically about their purchasing power and the impact it can have in our world."

We are in the stages of planning another "Fair Trade

Christmas Sale," probably the Sunday before Thanksgiving so you can start your Christmas shopping in a world affirming way!

In the meantime, Nancy, Terri and I will have our fair trade wares of coffee, tea, chocolate and olive oil, out for sale on September 7th and 21st, the first and 3rd Sundays, between services and after the 11:00 service. Look for us by the entrance doors. I'll be wearing a fair trade dress that I bought at HumanKind.

# MATH IS HARD — BUT VOLUNTEERING IS EASY!

We are so thankful for the church members who assist in worship each Sunday morning. Ushers, Acolytes, Scripture Readers, and Communion Assistants play a vital role in making our services meaningful. Here's what each role does:

- Ushers greet church members as they arrive, hand out bulletins, collect the offering, and help organize communion.
- Acolytes light the candles as worship begins (and yes, you get to hold fire \(\frac{1}{2}\)).
- Scripture Readers read the lessons during the service.
- Communion Assistants assist with the bread and wine alongside the pastors.

Our volunteers often say that serving in this way makes worship more meaningful for them.

Okay, here comes the math part (brace yourself)...

- Ushers: We need 2–3 per service (9:30 & 11:00).
   That's about 16–24 ushers each month. (Some months have 4 Sundays, some months have 5 Sundays.)
- **Scripture Readers**: One at 9:30 + One at 11:00. That's 8-10 readers each month.
- Acolytes: Same math as readers → about 8-10 acolytes each month.
- Communion Assistants: Usually 2 per service (except sometimes 3: when Pastor Emily is assisting with Faith Explorers during the 11:00 service, then we like to schedule 3 communion assistants during that 11:00 worship service to assist Pastor Erik so that there are four people participating in communion). That works out to about 18-22 communion assistants each month.

Add all that up (don't worry, I used a calculator), and we need somewhere between 50-66 volunteer slots filled each month.

Right now, about 40 wonderful people are serving regularly, which means we could really use a few more helping hands.

**MATH QUESTION OF THE DAY:** How many more volunteers do we need?


You don't need to be a math whiz to help. All it takes is volunteering one Sunday a month — one hour of your time. That's it.

# NEW PRAYER CONCERNS PROCEDURE

Prayer is an important part of our life at Holy
Trinity. One tool that we use to help us in knowing
what to pray for is the prayer concerns list where
names or issues are put after we have prayed for
them on a Sunday morning. Those of you who
have been coming to Holy Trinity for awhile may
know that we used to put the prayer list every
Sunday in the back of the Sunday bulletin. In order
to save paper, we are now listing the prayer
concerns only on the first Sunday of the month.
We are also putting the prayer list in the monthly
Tempo where it was not listed before.

Another part of our prayer concerns procedure is that we are going to try and update the list once a quarter or four times a year instead of just once a year. We are trying this because the list can start getting kind of long and the prayers are not updated. For example, people come home from the hospital or have recovered from a surgery, but the list doesn't get updated so it may sound like there is concern when things may have improved.

Please know that we want to keep praying for a concern if it is needed, so if you see a name or something else has been taken off the list and you would like it to be back on, just let the church office know and we can get it back on.

Thanks for your understanding as we try this new procedure and let us know if you have any feedback on the process.

### **WORSHIP ARTS GROUP**


