Pastoral Pondering...

I take great joy in the Cathedral of Creation. I love watching as the light rises



and falls over the horizon at the bookends the day. I enjoy morning coffee listening to the bird song choir in the tree limbs above. I like taking my camera to see if I can capture just a glimpse of the beauty of Creation to share with others. I experience peace with creation in all seasons, the silence of snow, the green shoots of spring, the Northern Lights in the clear night sky, and the colors of summer and fall. The outdoors are a place of prayer, where I feel close to the fingerprints of God and the movement of the Holy Spirit. The Season of Creation is a time to connect our indoor worship with our outdoor experience of God's beauty in Creation.

The Season of Creation may be new to you, and it is becoming more recognized and celebrated across the Church. From September 1 - October 4, Christians around the world take time to intentionally focus on our biblical call to be stewards of the earth. This may come more naturally to those who have grown up close to the land. The work of agriculture, planting and harvesting, caring for animals, even the smaller scale gardening of flowers, vegetables, and caring for pets we have at home, keep our hearts and hands close to Creation.

The theme for this year's Season of Creation is "Peace with Creation" inspired by Isaiah 32:14-18. The prophet speaks challenging words that portray Creation suffering and in need of peace, due to injustice and broken relationship between God and humankind. Though God's plan for Creation is rooted in justice and peace, human sin disrupts this. We are in need of deep healing and peace with Creation. In the Hebrew scripture, Shalom represents a far deeper concept of peace, one that extends beyond the absence of conflict to the full restoration of broken relationships, as illustrated in Isaiah's vision. The restoration encompasses our relationship with God, the human family, and the rest of Creation.*

During this season we will adjust our worship liturgy to speak words of Creation and see what God's word may be asking us to pay attention to in the world around us. I hope that we can cultivate deep and restorative Peace with Creation. Shalom.

Meridith & Whitney attend Youth Mental Health Conference

September 2025

On Tuesday, August 12th, Meridith Sandlin and Whitney Howe attended a one-day Youth Mental Health Conference in Spencer. The mental health of teenagers is a growing concern so I thought it would be useful for all of us to learn more about this issue.

Q: What was the name of this conference and who sponsored it?

A: The name of this one-day conference that Meridith and Whitney attended was called "Youth Mental Health First Aid". It was put on by Iowa State Extension. A grant had been secured so there was no cost to the participants. Both Meridith and Whitney felt that it was a very worthwhile conference to attend.

Q: How did you find out about this conference?

A: Meridith had been searching for a conference on teenage mental health as she has had and will continue to have students that are struggling with their mental health. Meridith asked Whitney if she wanted to attend with her as she thought the information from the conference would help Whitney as a Youth Director.

Q: Are some youths more prone to having mental health issues?

A: Children with traumatic life experiences are more likely to have mental health issues. However, anyone can experience mental health challenges, even if they have had the best possible life circumstances. Experiencing a mental health problem does not mean that the young person or their family did anything "wrong." Sometimes it just happens, not only in youth, but throughout the human lifespan.

Q: What is a clue that a teenager is having mental health issues?

A: You should have concerns if a teenager is withdrawing and losing interest in their friends' and family activities.

Q: What should you do if you think someone is suicidal?

A: Approach the person in private and ask them directly, "Are you thinking of killing yourself?" Depending on their response, encourage self-care strategies, refer them to a professional that can help, or call 988 or 911.

Q: What is the slang term for committing suicide?

A: Teenagers use the term "unaliving themselves" instead of the term "suicide" when on their smartphones/internet. By using "unaliving" instead of "suicide", they won't be flagged or censored by algorithms.

Q: Is there a phone number that teenagers can call or text if they are having mental health issues?

A: Call **988** Lifeline. This number is for all (teenagers and adults) who have mental health concerns or who feel that they are in a mental health crisis.

Q: What can you do if a teenager (or adult) is having mental health concerns?

A: #1 - Listen nonjudgmentally.

#2 - Give reassurance.

#3 - Encourage professional help.

#4 - Encourage self-care.

Q: What are two pitfalls to avoid when listening to someone in need of mental health care?

A: #1 - Adults often listen with the goal of "fixing". Instead, adults just need to listen and let the person come up with their own ideas for changes that need to be made.

#2 – Saying, "You will be all right" to the person facing a personal crisis. Their life isn't "alright" so saying it is, is not a comfort to the person. Instead, the person needs to know that you care.

Q: Is there a hospital nearby that deals with teenage mental health issues?

A: Unity Point (Allen Hospital) is one of the best hospitals for treating mental health.

Q: Does Iowa have enough hospital beds to deal with those that have mental health issues?

A: No, Iowa does not have enough mental health hospital beds to meet the needs of its population; the state of Iowa has the lowest ratio of state-run psychiatric beds per capita in the nation, with only two beds per 100,000 people, far short of the recommended 50 beds per 100,000 for minimally adequate care. In addition to the scarcity of state-run beds, Iowa also faces significant challenges with staffing shortages across the state, leading to unused beds even where they exist. (Source: *Des Moines Register on January 24, 2024*).

Q: I never finish a Q & A without having asked the interviewees their favorite Bible verse.

A: Meridith: Ecclesiastes 12:12 "My child, there is something else to watch out for. There is no end to the writing of books, and too much study will wear you out."

Whitney: Psalm 30:5 "For his anger lasts only a moment, but his favor lasts a lifetime; weeping may stay for the night, but rejoicing comes in the morning."

Thank you, Meridith and Whitney for meeting me at Fredsville so I could interview you. The information you learned will be very useful to you and also to those that read this Q & A. To conclude this Q & A, I have included the Suicide Warning Signs for both adults and youth that you received.

Suicide Warning Signs for Adults



Suicide Warning Signs for Youth



Risk is greater if a behavior is new or has increased, and if it seems related to a painful event, loss, or change.

- Talking about or making plans for suicide.
- Acting anxious or agitated; behaving recklessly.
- Talking about being a burden to others.
- Talking about feeling trapped or in unbearable pain.
- Increasing the use of alcohol or drugs.
- Talking about feeling hopeless or having no reason to live.
- Sleeping too little or too much.
- Withdrawing or feeling isolated.
- Showing rage or talking about seeking revenge.
- Displaying extreme mood swings.

It's time to take action if you notice these signs in family or friends:

- 1. Talking about or making plans for suicide.
- 2. Expressing hopelessness about the future.
- Displaying severe/overwhelming emotional pain or distress.
- 4. Showing worrisome changes in behavior, particularly in combination with the warning signs above, including significant:
 - Withdrawal from or changing social connections/situations.
 - · Changes in sleep (increased or decreased).
 - Anger or hostility that seems out of character or out of context.
 - Recent increased agitation or irritability.

PHOENIX — The Rev. Yehiel Curry was elected July 30 to serve a six-year term as presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). The election took place during the 2025 ELCA Churchwide Assembly being held July 28–Aug. 2 at the Phoenix (Ariz.) Convention Center.

Curry was elected on the fifth ballot. There were 799 votes cast, with 400 votes needed for an election. Curry received 562 votes, and the Rev. Kevin Strickland, bishop of the ELCA Southeastern Synod, received 237 votes. Curry is the first Black presiding bishop of the ELCA.

Speaking to the assembly after his election, Curry reflected on his membership at Shekinah Chapel in Riverdale, Ill., where he eventually became a lay mission developer while he participated in the Theological Education for Emerging Ministries program, which prepares individuals for ordained ministry in the ELCA, with a focus on emerging ministry contexts like ethnic-specific, multicultural, rural and inner-city settings. He spoke to the assembly about his initial hesitation in accepting that first ministry role.

"Perhaps I'm out there in one of you," Curry said. "I never saw myself as good enough, so for two years, I said no. I finally said yes. When I said yes, your support, this church's support, of that ministry meant everything. So if you want to know what your benevolence dollars look like, it looks like me, and I want to say thank you. Thank you for your investment."

Curry has served as bishop of the ELCA Metropolitan Chicago Synod since 2019. He previously served as mission developer (2009-2012) and pastor (2012-2019) of Shekinah.

He received a Bachelor of Arts from Lewis University in Romeoville, Ill., in 1995 and a Master of Divinity from the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago (LSTC) in 2013. LSTC is one of seven ELCA seminaries.
