Tribute by Dianne White to Kindergarten Director, Donna MacLean

My name is Dianne, and I work in the office here at Zion. Today, we gather to celebrate a remarkable program and outreach that has touched many lives over the years. We are here to honor all the teachers—both past and present—who have dedicated themselves to this mission.

In 1979, the Session of Zion Church made a visionary decision to establish a Kindergarten here. They recognized it as an opportunity to serve the community and to share Zion's name and mission far and wide. The first teachers to bring this vision to life were Azalia Matheson and Lorraine MacLeod. In 1987, Azalia Matheson decided to retire from teaching here. She left behind a strong and well-established program for her successor. Azalia and I had the honor of interviewing a recent college graduate, and we both felt she was the perfect fit for Zion. That individual was Donna. Looking back, I can confidently say that we made a wise decision.

Donna, you have poured countless hours into this program—far more than what was ever compensated. You have invested your whole heart into this work, and the results speak for themselves. The program has flourished under your care and dedication.

Over the years, the program has evolved. As Kindergarten became part of the formal school system, we adapted by offering Junior Kindergarten and Playschool. When the challenges of COVID-19 arose, like many others, we had to rethink our approach. Through it all, the core mission remained unchanged: to provide a nurturing and educational environment for young children. Thousands of students have passed through our doors in the past 46 years. Each one has left here prepared for the next step in their educational journey. Zion's name has become well-known in the community, thanks to the time and effort invested in each student. We often hear from schools that Zion students are well-prepared and ready to learn.

Having children here has made Zion a vibrant and active church. Their voices and laughter are often remarked upon by those who visit. Just this week, visitors from a cruise ship stopped by and listened as the children practiced for their closing performance. They expressed how wonderful it was to hear them and commended the teachers for their outstanding work. Every child who has come to Zion has felt cared for, respected, safe, and important. That is a remarkable accomplishment. Donna has an innate ability to make each child feel special, knowing exactly how to comfort them and adapt to their individual needs. If a child required extra support, she ensured it was provided.

We have been truly blessed at Zion with all the teachers who have served here over the years. I won't attempt to name them all, as I would hate to miss someone. If you have been part of this program in any way over the past 46 years, please accept our sincerest appreciation for a job well done. The willingness of the staff to assist with various church functions—whether it's adjusting schedules during funerals or clearing spaces for events—has been invaluable. Your support has been a great help and blessing to Zion Church.

One day, I was out and heard a child exclaim, "Daddy, there's my principal!" I looked around to see who she was referring to, and her father said, "I think she's talking about you." It was a reminder that, as my job description states, there are always "other duties as required!"

On behalf of the congregation, as a parent whose children have all attended here, and as someone nearing the end of my tenure as principal, we thank you. You have made Zion a name well-known and respected in the community. I am confident that whatever you pursue next, you will excel.



Psalm 3 O Lord, how many are my foes!

King David's son Absalom, with an army of tens of thousands of men had risen up against him in a plot to take away the throne. David could have trusted in his own army to defeat Absalom, <u>but</u> instead, he depended upon God's mercy, even though many doubted that God would deliver him. "But you are a shield around me, O Lord; you bestow glory on me and lift up my head." And as David cries out to God, the Lord answers him from his holy hill, and David could be confident that the Lord would sustain him and deliver him from his troubles.

New Responsibilities for John Barrett

As many in our congregation may have heard, John Barrett, an Elder at Zion Church, has recently been appointed to lead the **Congregational and Community Ministries** Department for the Presbyterian Church in Canada as Associate Secretary. Curious as to what is involved in this position, we thought we'd include some of John's responsibilities in this article, so our readers had a clearer understanding of what he's been up to since he started this role on July 21, 2025. When not travelling to various parts of the country to fulfill his responsibilities, John will divide his time between his primary office at 50 Wynford Drive in Toronto and his satellite office located at Zion Church in Charlottetown.

Believing that congregations are of vital importance and that presbyteries have a pivotal role in the oversight of their constituencies, **Congregation and Community Ministries** provides resources to support and enhance the mission and ministry of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. **Congregation and Community Ministries** engage with church leaders, supporting them as they seek to continue Christ's ministry in Canada.

The nature and scope of the Associate Secretary's role in this department is to support the church by providing effective leadership for the department, assisting congregations, presbyteries, synods and committees of the General Assembly in bolstering discipleship initiatives and congregational ministries, and to work with other departments of the national office to accomplish these same foundational goals.

The **Congregational and Community Ministries Department** supports all aspects of congregational life including evangelism, Christian education, youth, street level mission, congregational development, change & transition, worship and leadership development. The Associate Secretary draws upon the gifts and talents of leaders in The Presbyterian Church in Canada and connects them and their ideas to the wider church through leadership opportunities and print resources. The department is expected to provide accessible, thorough, and prompt responses to requests for information in all aspects of congregational and community ministry life.

Additionally, this position oversees the production of online and print resources for the church in all the previously mentioned areas. **CCM** assists presbyteries and synods as they evaluate, envision, and execute programs as a part of their pastoral oversight and strategic planning; supports presbyteries and synods in the development of workshops, consultations, conferences and other programs for growth, renewal and health; supports and provides grants and programs to congregations and to presbyteries as they oversee new church development, renewing ministries, ministries with Indigenous peoples, rural and remote ministries and other specialized ministries; aids presbyteries in their search for new and innovative mission and ministry initiatives by providing programs, advice, resources and grants from various sources within the church; aids presbyteries in initiatives to strengthen congregational health by providing programs, advice, resources and grants from various sources within the church; facilitates ministry appointments based upon presbytery requests and the discernment of the Life and Mission Agency. The entire department is expected to be current, creative, responsive, proactive and innovative in all aspects of congregational ministry when seeking to carry out this mandate.

During the early weeks of assuming his new position, John will be visiting the eight National Indigenous Ministries in Canada, all of which receive funding through the **CCM** Department. These ministries are in Kenora Ontario, Winnipeg Manitoba (2), Mistawasis & Saskatoon Saskatchewan, Edmonton Alberta, Vancouver and Duncan (Vancouver Island) British Columbia.

We wish John well in this new undertaking and know that the Zion congregation will be prayerfully supportive of him as he faces the many challenges that this position will bring. We look forward to updates from his department in future issues of 'The Gathering'.
