Introduction from the Lutheran-Anglican-Moravian Commission

The document is a hit of an experiment. While our three traditions share a calling to pray for the whole world, including our Christian siblings in churches closely linked to our own, there are variations in how this calling is lived out. The use of a cycle of prayer in the Moravian tradition is less common than in the Anglican and Luther-an traditions. There are also variations in size, jurisdictional regions, and structures of leadership among our three denominations that complicate the weaving together of balanced document.

Prayer cycles can sometimes become overwhelming and crowded pieces of liturgies. Care needs to be exercised in setting a context. Some words of explanation may occasionally be needed to set this Full Communion Cycle of Prayer in context.

The Anglican-Lutheran-Moravian Cycle of Prayer for use in the Diocese of Rupert's Land

The National Anglican-Lutheran-Morarian Cycle introduced above has been augmented to include prayers for the churches and dioceses of the Anglican Communiton, the Council of the North, and the congregations, parishes, missions, ministries, and communities of the Diocese of Rupert's Land.

In addition to the cycle of prayer, congregations may wish to pray regularly by name for local, national and international leadership in both the Anglican Church of Canada and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada.

The World Council of Churches Ecumenical Prayer Cycle

The Ecumenical Prayer Cycle covers every region of the world over the course of a year. Praying for each place on earth and its people at least once a year, we affirm our solidarity with Christians all over the work, siblings living in diverse situations, experiencing diverse problems, and sharing diverse gifts. 

Solemn Te Deum in Thanksgiving for the Consecration and Installation of Bishop Naboth Manzongo

Translations in Common Praise: God, We Praise You (# 331); Holy God, We Praise Your Name (#334); Thee We Adore, Eternal Lord (#332); You Are God (761)

Te Deum (BCP p. 7)

We praise thee, O God; we acknowledge thee to be the Lord.

All earth doth worship thee, the Father everlasting.

To thee all Angels cry aloud, the Heavens and all the Powers therein.

To thee Cherubim and Seraphim continually do cry,

Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God of hosts;

Heaven and earth are full of the Majesty of thy glory.

The glorious company of the Apostles praise thee;

The goodly fellowship of the Prophets praise thee;

The noble army of Martyrs praise thee;

The holy Church throughout all the world doth acknowledge thee,

The Father, of an infinite Majesty;

Thine honourable, true, and only Son;

Also the Holy Ghost, the Comforter.

Thou art the King of Glory, O Christ.

Thou art the everlasting Son of the Father.

When thou tookest upon thee to deliver man, thou didst not abhor the Virgin's womb.

The Act of Praise concludes with the General Thanksgiving from the Book of Common Prayer, or another suitable Collect.
