<p>Get together as a family or with a friend or group of friends this week!</p> <p>Start with Prayer -ask Jesus to guide your time together. Go over prayer requests together.</p> <p>Read the Text -read the text together. (1 Cor. 14:33b-40)</p> <p>Discussion Guiding Questions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Why is it imperative to study the scriptures within both their literary and historical-cultural contexts? Why is important for us to consider the questions, “What did the text mean to those it was written to?” And “What was prompting or motivating this particular writing?” 2. What was the context that prompted this instruction from Paul (14:1-33a)? How were the gifts of tongues and prophecy being misused in the church in Corinth? Whom does Paul aim considerations of silence towards (vss. 28, 30, 34)? 3. When Paul uses the word “brothers” in his letters to the Church, what population does he typically have in view? 4. How does Paul draw us back to the primary motivation for his instruction (vss. 39-40)? 5. Starting in 10:31, and moving through 11:40, make observations regarding Paul’s use of “all things.” How does his use of “all things” inform the priorities of our public worship environments? <p>Questions towards Spiritual Growth & Discipleship:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. How does this text challenge you to grow in a greater love for God? 2. How are you motivated to grow in a greater love for others? 3. How might Jesus be motivating you apply some of the principles from this passage to your family, career, community, or church? 4. How might Jesus be using you to draw those that do not know him, unto himself? 5.
