As we prepare to celebrate this feast day, let us call to mind our own failing and mis-steps and confess our sins, first in silent prayer.

We pray for your Church, that she may be a messenger of life and an agent of your love throughout the world. Instill courage in the hearts of those Who follow you, that we may dare to proclaim hope to those who live in fear, encouragement to those who doubt, and comfort to those who despair. Give your Church the strength of unity to proclaim your Gospel in word and deed as part of the world in crisis.

For Jesus Christ we ask,

All: Hear us as we pray.

We pray for the sick, the destitute, the oppressed and the vulnerable.

We pray for our fellow human beings and for all fellow creatures affected by war, conflict, genocide, and ecocide.

Serve justice to those who cry out to you, and to those who have no ability to cry out. Humble our hearts to relate to our fellow creatures in distress as true brothers and sisters. Give us the courage to act on behalf of those who silently endure injustice and guide our steps in the way of righteous and long-lasting peace. Act in our world your life-giving will.

For Jesus Christ we ask,

All: Hear us as we pray.

Heavenly Father, grant that the future of the world, of humanity, of the Church and of all people may be in your hands, and that we may live in true hope, justice, and peace for the sake of our living Lord Jesus Christ.

All: Amen.

Priest: May God be with you.

Priest: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

All: It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Priest: It is indeed right and good,

our duty and our joy,

always and everywhere to give you thanks, holy Father, almighty and eternal God,

through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Today we celebrate with songs of praise the cross, the victory-sign of Christ.

Once through the fruit of the forbidden tree we fell, now through this tree our Saviour cancels all our sin.

An instrument of shameful death

has become for Christ a throne of glory.

The power of the life-giving cross

reveals the judgement that has come upon the world

and the triumph of Christ crucified.

And so, with choirs of angels and with all the heavenly host, we proclaim your glory and join their unending hymn of praise:

All: Holy, holy, holy, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full, are full of your glory. Hosanna! Hosanna! Hosanna in the highest! (x2) Blessed, blessed, blessed, blessed is the one coming in the name, the name of our God. Hosanna! Hosanna! Hosanna in the highest! (x2) (From: St. Aidan Setting; John Bell, The Iona Community)

Priest: We praise and bless you, loving Father, through Jesus Christ, our Lord; and as we obey his command, send your Holy Spirit, that broken bread and wine outpoured may be for us the body and blood of your dear Son.

On the night before he died he had supper with his friends and, taking bread, he praised you. He broke the bread, gave it to them and said: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

When supper was ended he took the cup of wine. Again he praised you, gave it to them and said: Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

So, Father, we remember all that Jesus did, in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross.

Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.

Christ is the bread of life:

All: When we eat this bread and drink this cup, we proclaim your death, Lord Jesus, until you come in glory.

Priest: Lord of all life,
help us to work together for that day
when your kingdom comes
and justice and mercy will be seen in all the earth.

Look with favour on your people, gather us in your loving arms and bring us with St. Luke and all the saints to feast at your table in heaven.

Through Christ, and with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory are yours, O loving Father, for ever and ever.
