
and we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, Lord of all; presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.



Postlude Choral Song and Fugue Samuel Sebastian Wesley (1810 - 1876)

Notes for the Postlude:

Samuel Sebastian Wesley (the Grandson of Charles Wesley of Methodist fame) was an English Cathedral Organist and Director, who held posts at various cathedrals, including Hereford, Winchester and Gloucester. He wrote around 25 organ pieces, and is best known for his choral works, and a couple of hymn tunes, including 'Aurelia', which we know well as 'The Churches One Foundation'.

This piece (very much influenced by the Prelude and Fugue pairing of J.S. Bach) begins with a grand hymn like tune, which Wesley gradually develops in little sections, but keeps returning to, binding this movement together. The fugue uses a descending, almost untouched C major scale as its subject, with a wonderful bouncy rhythm at the start, helping us hear its appearance throughout the piece. The fugue explores all sorts of keys, and includes a second subject (fugue within a fugue!), including C# major, which creates the large chord towards the end of the piece, building up from the bottom and banishing all the previous keys. A final joyous page of music across a dominant pedal leads us to the end.

The original piece would have sounded different and far less grand - it was written for chamber organ (a small organ of perhaps no more than 8 stops) and few pedals (notes for the feet). Walter Emery (1909-1974) a highly respected English musicologist made an edition that expands on the original, providing a more developed pedal part, adding notes and richer manual registrations suitable for a modern cathedral organ, and it is this satisfying version we hear today.

Interestingly, Wesley may well have approved of this version. The keyboard for the feet on most modern organs is shaped in a concave way - that is to say it radiates out (like a protractor) from the player, making access for the feet easier. Older organs have straight pedal boards (or worse, inverse concave) making playing harder and more limited in ease of

use. Wesley developed this conclave pedal board with famous English organ builder, Father Willis, which has become the standard across the world.
