

Blessed are the Merciful; for They will be Shown Mercy

Matthew 5:7

"Good sense makes one slow to anger, and it is his glory to overlook an offense."

Proverbs 19:11

"Mercy has a mundane, everyday quality. Imagine for a moment the ordinary circumstances and moments mercy is needed: drink spilled at the dinner table, the insensitive comment from a co-worker, the presumptive demands of our children or our spouse. The scripture from Proverbs 19 reminds us that it is 'glory to overlook an offense.' Every day, mundane mercy is lived and needed as part of all our lives. In fact, this everyday mercy may be just as urgently needed in our world as the kind that seems superhuman. How might it change the climate of our homes, workplaces, communities, schools, nation if more often than not, we just let go of our offenses? How would it look to have caring conversations rather than hurtful rhetoric? How might it change our relationships if we're known to be a constant source of mercy instead of anger, and kindness instead of retribution?

'It's not simply something we need to do begrudgingly; it's truly a better way. We're "blessed" to be merciful. By trusting Jesus' words, we're invited to discover how mercy is a truly better way to live. The grand gestures matter: The gospel itself is the grandest gesture of mercy in history. But the smaller efforts at mercy matter, too—because they, in their own small way reflect the mercy we've found in Jesus.' (Mike Cosper)

There's no limit to God's mercy—no sin too great to forgive, no debt too large to pardon, so there should be no limit to ours as well. Yet such largesse never begins with us. As John Piper says, "Mercy comes from mercy. Our mercy to each other comes from God's mercy to us." Those who have experienced such great leniency stand ready and willing to pardon others and are blessed for it. A life marked by this kind of radical mercy reveals a heart that loves God and seeks to walk and share life in the way of God.

I look forward to worshiping with you this Sunday as we dig deeper into our understanding of our blessedness and the call it has in our journey of discipleship. Jill

Dale G. Caldwell, MBA, Ed.D. is the President of Centenary University and the Pastor of Covenant United Methodist Church in Plainfield, New Jersey. His experience includes serving as the CEO of Strategic Influence LLC, Senior Manager at Deloitte Consulting, Deputy Commissioner of the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs (DCA) and Founding Executive Director of the nonprofit Newark Alliance.

Dale is the Founder and Board President of the Dale Caldwell Foundation whose mission is to reduce poverty through education, employment and entrepreneurship. He has written eight books, has over 33 years of K-12 public school board president experience and was named the New Jersey School Board Member of the Year in 2009. Dale has extensive tennis leadership and playing experience and was inducted into the USTA Eastern Tennis Hall of Fame in 2021.

He graduated from Princeton University with a BA in economics; the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania with an MBA in finance; and received his Doctorate from Seton Hall University in Education Administration.

His father, Rev. Dr. Gilbert Haven Caldwell, graduated from North Carolina A&T, and became a United Methodist pastor, who knew and marched with Martin Luther King, Jr.

CROP is a program of Church World Service working to combat hunger within the local community and world community. The annual **Red Bank CROP Walk** organized by ecumenical and interfaith congregations lets us walk as a family in our mission to combat hunger.


Last year the **Red Bank CROP Walk** was fourth in the nation raising almost \$120,000 and collecting 10,000 lbs of food that was shared among the local partner food pantries. This year the **Red Bank CROP walk** celebrates its **45th anniversary**. Once again walkers from area churches, schools & civic groups will join together in the walk against hunger with a goal of \$145,000.


