

"Our Greatest Need in Life and Death"

1 Peter 2:18-25 September 28, 2025

<u>The Big Idea</u>: Suffering and pain are a part of every life. The hardest of all is "undeserved suffering." In a moment of deep and difficult to accept truth, Peter says we are actually called by God to endure suffering. Peter then presents Jesus to us as our Savior, Example, and Shepherd.

1 Peter 2:18-25(ESV)

2 ¹⁸ Servants, <u>be subject</u> to your masters <u>with all respect</u>, not only to the good and gentle but also to the unjust.

when, mindful of God, one endures sorrows while suffering unjustly.

²⁰ For what credit is it if, when you sin and are beaten for it, you endure? But if when <u>you do good</u> and suffer for it you <u>endure</u>, this is a gracious thing in the sight of God.

²¹ For to this you have been called,

"Servants" → Peter, here uses a different word than word typically used in the Bible. Here it is "household servant".

"be subject" → submit; humbly comply

"unjust" (skolios) → crooked; unfair

"gracious thing" → literally, "this is grace"

- ➤ It demonstrates to the world what the grace of God is all about.
- And it means that we experience the grace of God in a powerful way.

"sorrows" → heaviness, pain, suffering

Peter gives us 2 qualifiers:

- It must be unjust or undeserved suffering.
- We must be God-focused in order to resemble & experience His grace.
- "do good" → the right thing; or, for the benefit of another
- "you have been called" \rightarrow to call your name [v. 21]
- "endure" → to remain (stay in the suffering instead of running away); to calmly take the suffering

because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an <u>example</u>, so that you might follow in his steps.

²²He committed <u>no sin</u>, neither was <u>deceit</u> found in his mouth.

²³When he was reviled, he <u>did not revile in return;</u> when he suffered, he <u>did not threaten</u>, but continued <u>entrusting himself to him who judges justly</u>.

24 He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree, that we might die to sin and live to righteousness.

²⁵ For you <u>were straying</u> like sheep, but <u>have now</u> returned to the Shepherd and Overseer of your souls.

WHO IS JESUS?

1. Jesus is Your Example

"Christ also suffered" → Jesus proved that a person could be in the will of God, be greatly blessed by God, and still suffer unjustly.

At first, Peter opposed Christ's suffering on the cross (Matt. 16:21ff); but then he learned that we lead by serving and serve by suffering. He also learned that this kind of suffering always leads to glory!

- "example" → a writing pattern or template; the alphabet guide
- "follow in his steps" means "follow closely on his steps"

2. Jesus Bore Your Sin

- There was a high purpose for Christ's suffering that went far beyond being an example for us. [Leviticus 16:20-22]
- Jesus' salvation frees us from having to be responsive to sin.
- Jesus' salvation empowers us to live righteously.

3. Jesus is Your **Shepherd** and **Overseer**

- Peter draws from Isaiah 53
- Sheep will never survive without a Shepherd
- Psalm 23 is not automatically our experience. David's description is what we experience when we learn to listen to and "follow on His steps" [v. 21]

When we were lost, we needed a Savior, not an example.

Now that we are saved, we need an example -- Someone to show us how to live and how to endure unjust suffering.
