



This year, we will have judging panel of five members that includes past winners and other POP VIP'S.



Adult Faith Formation

Alzheimer's Disease and other associated forms of dementia have become a significant health crisis in the United States, and the world. The difficulties that the disease presents to families and communities are enormous. Caregiving for someone with dementia presents huge challenges.

Jesus teaches us to care for one another.

Faith communities like ours can play a significant role in providing needed support to those with the disease and their families.

This three-week series will provide the basics of what Alzheimer's is, the warning signs of the disease, and what science is saying about how one may be able to delay or even prevent getting the disease.

Each week's presentation will build on the previous week, yet each also stands on its own.

Week 1, November 2: Understanding Alzheimer's and Dementia: The terms "dementia" and "Alzheimer's" are often used interchangeably. Week 1 will sort out those terms, and dive into the basics of how the disease affects those that have it, how it progresses, risk factors for getting it, current available treatments, and glimpses into the future for progress in battling the disease.

Week 2, November 9: 10 Warning Signs of Alzheimer's: Have you noticed yourself or others having "senior moments" when one cannot find the right word, or cannot find the darn car keys? Do you wonder, "am I (or are they) getting Alzheimer's?" Week 2 will explore 10 warning signs for Alzheimer's, and differentiate between normal age-related cognitive changes, and more worrisome signs that something may be amiss.

Week 3, November 16: Healthy Living for Your Brain and Body: There are no available treatments to prevent or cure Alzheimer's. The good news is that there are ways to delay and perhaps prevent the onset of this disease. Week 3 dives into the latest research and describes changes one can make to give oneself the best chance to avoid this deadly disease.

And no, it is NOT too late!

Justice and Diversity News



October is National Disability Employment Awareness month (NDEAM).

The theme for 2025 is "Celebrating Value and Talent." This theme recognizes that people with physical and non-physical disabilities provide value and bring talent to America's workplace and economy. Check out the explainer video: NDE-AM on YouTube or visit WhatCanYouDoCampaign.org

Did you know? Title I of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requires employers with 15 or more employees to provide reasonable accommodations for employees with disabilities. However, it is the employee's responsibility to let the employer know that an accommodation is needed. Check out the Job Accommodation Network for ideas about possible accommodations and how to ask: https://askjan.org/

Social media doesn't always get it right. Check the facts about hiring requirements for persons with disabilities on the Department of Labor Office of Disability Employment Policy page for Myths and Facts.

The ELCA social message on <u>"People Living with Disabilities"</u> states: "This church believes that God, as creator and sustainer, intends that society regard all people as of equal worth and make it possible for all — those without and those with disabilities—to participate freely and fully as members of society in all important aspects of common life."

Let's welcome others with good etiquette.

This article shares some Workplace Etiquette for Mobility, Sensory, Cognitive, and Psychiatric Impairments.

For example, "A wheelchair, mobility aid, or service animal is part of an individual's personal space; an extension of that individual" and should not be touched without permission.

This article talks about using <u>person-first affirming language</u> when speaking about a person with a disability. For example, we can say "Person who uses a wheelchair" (person-first) or "Wheelchair user" (identity-first) instead of "Wheelchair bound" or "Confined to a wheelchair."

Dear God, We pray for a spirit of inclusion in our hearts and communities. Help us to welcome and value everyone, regardless of their background or circumstances. May we actively seek to include those who are often overlooked or marginalized. Let our actions reflect your love and acceptance. Amen. (excerpted from a prayer for inclusion)

Update on Our Solar Array



The 19th of Sep. was the one-year anniversary of the churches solar array start up so I thought some performance info would be appropriate

- The total electric load for the church for the past 12 months was over 71,000 KWH (that number includes 2024 building utility challenges). But the good news is that the solar array put out enough electricity to cover 61% of that load so we should still see a reduction in 2026 C.E. surcharges.
- Total cost savings with solar for the past 12 months is about \$5,400.
- Final net C.E. costs for the past 12 months is about \$7,300
- (Cost without solar would have been about \$12,300)
- And solar array energy output for 12 months avoided the production of about 29 tons of CO2.

29 tons/yr of CO2 is a tiny number relative to total global emissions of >37 billion tons for 2024 but installing a 92 panel array is a first step, a big step, in showing our friends and neighbors that we believe the welfare of all humans is important.

I just finished William McKibben's book <u>Here Comes</u> <u>The Sun</u> and would like to pass on a few points he makes.

•We are all aware of the global warming problem. The author phrased the situation this way. If the nations of the world don't start working a lot harder at reducing CO2 emission it will only be a few years until people who live in states other

- than California and Florida will also have difficulty finding affordable house insurance.
- Solar panels are the least expensive method for producing electricity, especially considering there are no material costs or delivery charges for sunshine. So, individuals and organizations in many parts of the world now have the opportunity to become energy independent.
- Unfortunately, current Washington leadership polices and high installation costs for solar have slowed US solar installations but supported US coal and oil interests. Installation cost for solar in the USA are about three times greater than in places like Germany and Australia.
- The author emphasized that there are sufficient materials and installation space for solar to provide all the world's electric needs and reported that China is leading the world in rate of reduction of CO2 emissions using solar

There are some solar wins in Michigan that are not included in McKibben's book:

- As of 1-Apr-25 Michigan Home Owners Association policies can no longer prohibit installation of roof solar.
- Ann Arbor citizens recently approved moving forward with a plan to establish an Ann Arbor Sustainability Energy Unit and drop DTE as an electricity provider.
- If, Michigan legislators changed the laws to allow Community Solar it would support installation of more solar in Michigan.

How to Guard from Scammers

Churches are built on trust — trust in God, in one another and in the mission of serving others. Unfortunately, that trust can sometimes make churches and their members targets for scammers.

From email phishing schemes to fake donation requests, scammers are becoming more creative and convincing. They prey on people's goodwill, often impersonating pastors, staff or longtime members to take advantage of congregants.

While it's unsettling to think your church could be at risk, there are practical, compassionate ways to stay informed and protected — without becoming overly suspicious or fearful.

Watch for red flags

Scammers thrive on confusion. They often use urgency, emotional appeals or fake authority to trick people. Here are a few common warning signs:

Unusual requests for money.

A member receives a text or an email from someone claiming to be the pastor asking for gift cards or a quick wire transfer. Big red flag.

Poor grammar or strange formatting.

Scam messages may use formal titles ("Dear Parishioner") or odd phrases not typical of your pastor's communication style.

Unfamiliar phone numbers or email addresses.

Even if the sender's name looks familiar, double-check the actual email address or phone number it came from. Scammers often spoof names to appear trustworthy.

Pressure to act quickly or secretly.

If a message says "Don't tell anyone" or insists on fast action to "help someone in need," be cautious.

How scammers target churches

Scammers are drawn to churches because of their open-door mentality, their generous spirit and the trust within congregations.

Some common tactics include:

Impersonating church leaders.

They may set up fake social media profiles or email addresses posing as pastors or staff asking members for money.

Spoofing the church office.

Some scammers even spoof the church's phone number or domain to make their messages look legitimate.

Hacking church websites or email lists.

Without secure systems, hackers can gain access to your contact lists or internal messages.

Phishing for info. Seemingly innocent forms or emails may ask members to "verify their membership" or update their personal info — handing it over to thieves in disguise.

What to do if you think you are being scammed

Do NOT click on any links or reply to the original communication. Contact the church office, Pastor Rachel or the supposed sender in a different format, for example: if it is a text, follow up with an email or vice versa.

If you think you are being scammed or aren't sure it is an official church communication, contact the church office.

Just a reminder: we will not ask for money or gift cards by email.
