Back in July of 2024, along with two youth from CTK—and a few folks from other area churches—I had the privilege of attending the ELCA National Youth Gathering in New Orleans. In addition to exploring the sights of the city and participating in large and inspiring worship services in the Smoothie King Center, home of the Pelicans basketball team, we also had several chances to wander around the convention center.

In this enormous hall filled with informational booths, pop-up shops selling t-shirts, commemorative water bottles, Bibles, etc., lots and lots of fun activities, and—you know—a ton of teenagers, I happened upon a dream come true: off in one of the corners, I found a group selling faith-based Lego sets. Now, I don't know if you know this about your pastor, but I am what is known as a die hard A.F.O.L. (Adult Fan of Lego). While I typically shy away from labels, this is one that I must admit fits me quite well. Fascinated with those little brightly colored plastic bricks since childhood, my love for them continues to this day. Naturally, the most popular item at this booth during the ELCA National Youth Gathering was a custom designed building kit of "Luther's Rose", the seal of Martin Luther.



When we think of a seal, we think of something permanent, something lasting, something signifying the resolution of the person who stamped that seal to their letter or deed in the first place. And yet, this version of the seal of Martin Luther—the man who 508 years ago this month began the movement that led to the existence of this and many more denominations and congregations—is made of tiny loose bricks, that attach to one another just as easily as they can come apart. This "Luther's Rose" can be disassembled and reassembled or its pieces can be used in an entirely new way. This is not only the genius of the toy used in the making of this seal. It is also the genius of that which the seal represents.


