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Food For Thought

Passion in Our Compassion Activating the Church

- Where there is no vision, the people perish." 2-3 Proverbs 29:18
- 3 As I perceive the situation in most Lutheran congregations, we need a vision for ministry that we
- feel and own with a passion. We have a general sense of whom God wants us to be and what He wants us to be about - "His redeemed people touching the lives of others" – but we lack a specific understand-
- ing as to what that means for us as we seek to be His presence in our communi-
- ties. As such we lack passion for any particular form or expression of ministry. 7
- The love of Christ compels me. '2 Corinthians 5:14
 - Without passion we approach our ministry with the mentality: "It is nice that..."
- or "it would be nice if . . ." This mentality is sufficient when things come easily,
- don't ask much of us, and are generally going well. This mentality is insufficient,
- however, when things are not coming easily or going well, and when they do ask a lot of us. At such times this mentality is reflected in the thought: "It would have
- been nice, but ..." It is passion in and for our ministry that sees us through the
- hard times, the times that do ask a lot of us, the times that ask us to sacrifice. It is
- passion for our ministry that says "In spite of the fact that..." or "I am going to/
- we must...." It is passion that will not allow us to quit. We need to become pas-
- sionate about our ministry.
- The Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve and to give His life as a ransom for many. 'Mark 10:45
 - For the Son of Man came to seek and to save what was lost. Luke 19:10

I believe passion for ministry arises not from someone telling us what we should be passionate about, but by feeling the needs, the hurts, the pains of those in our families, our neighborhoods, our communities. It involves tearing off the calluses we have developed to protect us from the pains of others. It means slowing down our lives of perpetual motion and activity – motion and activity that keep us from becoming personally and deeply involved in feeling and identifying with others in their needs. It means to become vulnerable, to be willing to experience pain, and to learn how to cry in another's pain.

"There should be no division in the body, but that its parts should have equal concern for each other. If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honored, every part rejoices with it." 1 Corinthians 12:25,26

"Rejoice with those who rejoice; mourn with those who mourn." Romans 12:15

When we feel the needs of others, out of their pain, I believe God will give us a vision of what can be, of what ought to be, and of what we, empowered by His grace and incarnating His presence, can help to be. This then becomes God's vision for our congregation and our vision for ourselves. Having felt the pain, we now also feel His compassion and will seek to express His and our compassion with a passion.

Be careful, then, how you live - not as unwise but as wise, making the most of every opportunity. Ephesians 5:15,16

Be wise in the way you act toward outsiders; make the most of every opportunity." Colossians 4:5

With vision and passion we are now ready to seek opportunity. Seeking opportunity does not mean we simply wait for the right moment. If we decide to simply wait for the right moment, we are likely to be waiting the rest of our lives. Seeking opportunity also means that we do what we can to create opportunity, to bring about the right moment. We must honestly evaluate the situation, and then we must not stop there. We must also ask what, when and how will we take the next step in ministry.

Now to each one the manifestation of the Spirit is given for the common good." Corinthians 12:7

From Him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work. Ephesians 4:16

God has provided His church with the resources to accomplish the vision He gives us, that to which He has called us. The question is not "Are we able?" In and through Him we are fully able.

"Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us", Ephesians 3:20

"I can do everything through him who gives me strength." Philippians 4:13

The question is "How do we tap into the resources at our disposal?" – the resources of time, talents and treasures. Each of us becomes significant, even vital, at this point. The body will only be as fully functional as each of us is fully functional in our Godgiven and God-empowered roles.

Food For Thought (cont.)

"Do not neglect your gift." Timothy 4:14

"For this reason I remind you to fan into flame the gift of God. For God did not give us a spirit of timidity, but a spirit of power, of love and of self-discipline." 2 Timothy 1:6,7

"Anyone, then, who knows the good he ought to do and doesn't do it, sins." James 4:17

As each of us faces the challenge and invitation of ministry it is easy to look at what we as individuals are already doing and at what others are not doing, and thus to become critical and judgmental. However, the real challenge to each of us, the challenge which reflects the depth of our passion, is our willingness to look at and affirm what others are doing and to ask ourselves "What more am I capable of doing?" God calls us not simply to bear some fruit, but to bear much fruit (John 15:1-8). This entails actively and wholly presenting ourselves to God and to the opportunities of both word and deed before us today (Romans 6:13).

Now about love we do not need to write to you, for you yourselves have been taught by God to love each other. And in fact, you do love all the people. Yet we urge you to do so more and more."1 Thessalonians 4:9.10

The passages in this article are meant to express the third use of the law. This means it is assumed the article is being read by people who have heard and experienced the gospel, and, now moved by that gospel, who desire to live as the new creation that gospel has made us. As we reflect on the challenge before us, we also need to remember and believe Jesus' promises:

I have come to give you life, life abundantly. John 10:10

Meaning of Reformation

Martin Luther posted the 95 Theses on October 31, 1517 (over 500 years ago), an event that is considered the start of the Protestant Reformation. He posted them on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany to challenge the practice of selling indulgences by the Roman Catholic Church. This movement was launched by Martin Luther to reform the Catholic Church, not to break from it, by returning to the teachings of the Bible and sola fide (faith alone) for salvation. The Reformation emphasized the authority of God's Word and justification by faith in Jesus Christ alone, rather than through good works or the mediation of the Pope.



This led to a new church centered on the preaching of the Gospel and the use of the vernacular in worship and the distribution of communion in both kinds (bread and wine). Martin Luther translated the Bible and Mass into German, allowing people to understand and participate in their own language rather than Latin. The movement aimed to retain and preserve the essence of the Church's history and teachings while filtering out teachings and practices that contradicted the Bible. The Reformation also highlighted the significance of personal vocation, the idea that every individual has a role to play in serving God and their neighbor within the community.




Men's Bible Study




Congregational Lunch — Sept. 24th

The Olive Branch for Children—Update

It is a special year for Deborah and The Olive Branch for Children ("TOBFC"). Happy 20th Anniversary!

Where have the years gone! Deborah was in her early 20's when she first spoke to us about the plight of the orphaned children and the hardships they endured. We watched Mlombwa and Laudia grow and thrive with your love and care! As mentioned in the spring, our theme for this year's fundraising for Laudia and TOBFC is: "Extending the Olive Branch: Celebrating 20 years of Service and Compassion".

It is now almost October and time is running out to fulfill our obligation to Laudia and TOBFC! So far, we have raised \$1,798.20 which is way short of our set goal of \$5,000! Even if we drop the goal amount back to \$4,000 annually, (which for the past 6 years we have exceeded, even during COVID!) — this is far below what Peace has agreed to and committed to! We love our daughters and we agreed to support both until they finished their schooling. Mlombwa is done schooling but Laudia is still going to school. The Olive Branch Committee decided that the additional monies raised would go towards the important programs that TOBFC does for the vulnerable. They help over 200,000 individuals in over 52 communities!

Unlike any other charity, 100% of the monies raised goes directly to TOBFC. You can make a donation until the end of December in whichever option you choose – through e-Transfer, Tithe.ly, PAR, Canada Helps, or through your offering envelope. Please clearly mark your envelope or any donation option with "Olive Branch" and the amount designated in addition to your regular offering. You will be given a tax receipt for your contribution.

Thank you for being there and supporting our girls and the TOBFC for over 20 years! With your generosity, love, commitment and support, they can dare to dream, they can be rooted in love and they can grow in hope.

Intercession Prayers

What is intercession?

At Peace, there are two types of intercessory prayers. First of all, during the worship service, usually after the Apostles' Creed, the Assistant minister reads a series of prayers, generally for the Church, the World, and the People – and these may thematically vary according to the church season, special days in the church or community calendar, or a special event that has impacted the church membership. The second is private prayer by members of the Peace Intercessory Prayer Chain Ministry.

In this newsletter, I will write about the first – that which you participate in during worship. Although the Assistant Minister reads the prayers, the congregation prays silently and periodically responds with such words as "Lord hear our prayer". How do the assistant ministers compose the prayers? We follow guidelines of 'Sundays and Seasons', which is an assistive website for worship planning, used by various Lutheran organizations in North America – including Evangelical and Missouri Synod. The prayers are framed around the season and the readings and lessons of the day. Being attuned to the congregation, assistant ministers at Peace customize the prayers.

According to Cathy Ammlung (Associate Pastor, St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Fulton, Maryland, and member of Lutheran CORE and the Society of the Holy Trinity (STS)), corporate intercessions have a long tradition. In 258 AD, church father Cyprian saw a need to add a special element to the liturgy to pray deeply for 'Church, catechumens, penitents, the emperor, magistrates, those in affliction, travelers, prisoners, and any local concerns.' This prayer session was referred to as "prayers of the faithful", and throughout the history of the church, moved into various time slots in the liturgy, and was read by various church officers down through the ages until today, in most evangelical Lutheran churches, it has become the responsibility of the lay assistant minister, supported by the congregation in silence then response. I am sure that the assistant ministers of peace see how the shape of the intercession prayer tradition has remained unchanged since the beginning, which adds a sacred dimension to what we do.

I have been an assistant minister at Peace for almost 20 years (I'm sure Rosie could look back in the archives and find the exact year). We used to write our prayers on the spot – sitting at the front on the riser, while listening to live petitions from the congregation. Some of you will remember the pressure to write the petitioner's names, the concerns or celebrations – straining to hear the congregant who did not have a microphone. And often, you could see an assistant minister scribbling away during the rest of the service up until intercession time. That seems so long ago.

I don't know how other assistant ministers compose their very beautiful prayers these days. I do know they are inspired by Spirit during a sincere and prayerful time. I myself do it before service on Sunday morning, and it is one of the few times I can "hear" our Lord. I prayerfully look at the readings and lessons, and I reflect on the season and what is happening in the congregation and the world, and I look at the Sundays and Season's template, and I write what my heart speaks to me. Then I often read aloud to Jeremy because I know that it is a long time for congregants to stand and listen – especially after the sermon. And Jeremy tells me if I have been brief enough and pithy enough. I know that some congregants will feel my prayers are too long. For that reason, I like to preface the prayers by entreating congregants to use my words as entry points to their own hearts and enter into deep corporate prayer and calls out to Jesus as we stand in one body – our church – as Jesus has taught us.

Cathy Ammlung, who writes intercessions for the Coalition for Renewal (CORE), instructs that intercessory prayer should incorporate "the Roman virtues of terse, simple, elegant directness, and the Eastern virtues of intense devotion, evocative language, and reverence." If you find this tradition as compelling as I do, and you feel called to pray intercessions, please contact Rosie or Sirkka.

Intercession Prayers (cont.)

To summarize in words much better than I can put together, Cathy Ammlung writes the following:

The intercessory prayers have a very long history as the prayers of and by the whole people of God, the Body of Christ himself. They are the Church praying for the Church, the world, the ruling authorities, and those in any tribulation, distress, or sorrow; for peace, for the propagation of the Gospel; for our enemies; for every manner and estate of humanity; for children and catechumens; for favorable weather and harvest; for deliverance from every affliction, wrath, danger and need; for the faithful departed; and for the salvation of those praying and for all people."

In the next newsletter, I hope Rosie will permit me to write about the traditions of intercessory prayer chains – it won't surprise you to know that the assistant ministers – by chance not planning- are also members of Peace Intercessor's Prayer Chain Ministry. If you are interested in joining that ministry, please contact myself or Ruth Hern.




