

#### STACEY BEAMAN & RYAN LEHMANN







# PASTOR EMILY AT GATHERING AT THE GATE IN WASHINGTON D.C.

On September 15–17, I went to Washington D.C. alongside other members of the ELCA to advocate for SNAP and Medicaid. Bishop Bos and Desta Goehner were also in attendance. We attended a California Constituents Coffee with Senators Padilla and Schiff and met with some of their staff to discuss SNAP, Medicaid, and Housing. Then, we met with Representatives Julia Brownley and staff from Representative Judy Chu's office. At the end of the day, I attended a meeting alongside my mom who came from Ohio to meet with Senator Husted. What did we learn?

- We need to find resources and help educate our community on how to access healthcare in the future. Requirements are changing and extensive paperwork will make it more difficult.
- The Big Beautiful Bill doubles the infrastructure budget for detainment centers and prisons
- 2.4 million will lose their SNAP benefits at the end of 2026
- 10 million will be uninsured by the end of 2027 due to the cuts to Medicare(this information comes from the congressional budget office)
- We will not see a lot of the changes until after midterm elections based on when they are planned to roll out.
- There is a bipartisan bill gaining steam in the house called the "Road to Housing Act."

Many of our congresspeople expressed that it is becoming ever more difficult to meet in the middle or make any substantial moves. After all the meetings were said and done, it was saddening to hear about the weight of greed and fear that is preventing democratic process. However, I still heard hope in the voices of some who expressed they will not give up. And they can't do it alone.

We are the ones here in our communities day in and day who will see the effects of decisions being made by those in power. We are the ones who need to share our stories, serve as witnesses, and name the hard truths. We can make intentional choices that express who we are and what we are about as Christ-followers: that we seek freedom for the oppressed (not more prisons), food for the hungry (not 2.4 million people losing their SNAP benefits), healing for those who are hurting (not 10 million people going uninsured and not having access to good healthcare). As Christ followers, we seek communities being made whole, and this work is becoming increasingly urgent.

Happy October! When it gets cooler and fall flavors pop up all over, I think of pumpkin chocolate chip cookies, a most wonderful recipe I got from B.J. Slattum. The recipe makes 8 dozen cookies and I can do it in less than 2 hours! And they freeze well. I plan to make some soon and have them for the October library event on October 19th. I use the Equal Exchange chocolate chips. A bit pricey at \$7 a bag for 10 oz. but very delicious. One customer at Holy Trinity bought 2 bags in September. I'm ordering more! We also have baking cocoa for

for \$6.50 a container.



## TREASURER'S NOTE

Excellent news for Holy Trinity has come through over the summer and deserves celebrating. First, our church is one of many nonprofit institutions affected by the COVID-19 pandemic that applied for an Employee Retention Credit (ERC). This tax credit is intended to help some businesses and nonprofits deal with financial ripple effects from the early pandemic. After a long wait, this approx. \$19,000 ERC was issued to Holy Trinity by the IRS in July. Second, our church's solar panel installation was eligible for a government rebate. This solar panel rebate was issued in September for a net approx. \$38,000. Claiming the ERC and the solar rebate required a great deal of work even though Holy Trinity qualified for both of them — for example, time spent organizing our church documentation and coordinating with outside institutions like the solar company and a specially certified tax preparer. Many people helped to make this happen, and in particular Grace Nelson and Mike Sadowski should be applauded for their significant & dedicated contributions to these processes. It's exciting that such hard work has paid off for the Holy Trinity community!

In more routine news, giving income for Holy Trinity and many other churches shifts seasonally and often exhibits a summer slowdown while some folks travel out of town. For example, in August 2025 non-pledged giving to Holy Trinity was approx. \$3,200 (~30%) below the monthly budget and pledged giving was approx. \$6,700 (~20%) below the monthly budget. This summer slowdown has eaten up budget surpluses from spring 2025, but it's likely things will speed up again going into the fall.

Fall is also the time of year when Holy Trinity organizes annual financial pledge requests because planning for a year of community worship, gathering, advocacy, and service is a tremendous

undertaking. Responding to the church's request for information about your intent for the 2026 calendar year – even if to say that you're not planning to pledge – is critical for planning the upcoming annual budget. Thank you for your time spent responding to this request for input, and should you choose to make a pledge please know that there is no inappropriate amount or schedule. All gifts of all kinds fuel the care that this church community weaves for one another and for the local community that depends on us.

### HTLC Library Book Review by Brian McGuire

When I saw this in the HTLC Library I was like "Whoa, ripped from the headlines—a book exposing the inhuman treatment of Palestinians by Israel." Then I realized that it had been written in 2004, that absolutely nothing has improved, and in fact the situation is worse than ever. If you are easily angered, I would not recommend reading this book.

"Bethlehem Besieged" is by Mitri Raheb, published by ELCA's Augsburg Press, and donated by former pastor Frank Nausin. The author is an Arabian Christian and a Lutheran minister who presides over the Evangelical Lutheran Christmas Church in Bethlehem. Raheb and his family live within the Lutheran compound, three blocks from Bethlehem's Church of the Nativity.

As brief history, in the Six-day War of 1967 Israel invaded Egypt's Sinai Peninsula and annexed the Golan Heights, the West Bank, and Gaza Strip, displacing hundreds of thousands of Palestinians and Syrians. The First Intifada started in 1987 and lasted five years: a series of protests and riots over Israel's sustained occupation of Palestinian land. (Intifada is a verbal noun meaning "to shake or dust off" and connotes resistance against oppression.) Raheb's narrative encompasses the Second Intifada of 2000–05. He describes numerous curfews imposed by the Israelis: 24-hour, seven days per week, lasting up to four months. No school and no work. Bethlehem was filled with Israeli tanks and Apache helicopters (guess where those came from?). A forty-day siege of Bethlehem's Church of the Nativity took place where dozens of Palestinian fighters had taken refuge. Raheb witnessed and endured numerous raids and absolutely wanton vandalism by Israeli soldiers on the nearby Lutheran Compound—over and over again. I won't try to paraphrase; here are some of Raheb's remarks:

"We suffer because we have to pay the price of the sins of Europe against the Jews. . . . some Europeans deep down feel relieved that the Jewish people finally have their own state outside of Europe. . . . The Holocaust harmed not only the Jewish people but also the Palestinians who became the victims of the victims."

"We also pay for the sins of part of the Jewish Diaspora, especially in the United States. Many American Jews have their own guilt feelings. . . . So they compensate . . . by sending donations to Israel and by lobbying for extreme Israeli policies . . . subsidizing Israel's continuous occupation of the West Bank and Gaza and pressuring the US Congress to support a one-sided pro-Israeli position."

"Then we have the Christian Right in the United States. I do not find much in them that is Christian or right. Deep down they are anti-Semitic, hating Israel and the Jewish people. But in the meantime they don't mind sharing a bed with the Jewish lobby as long as it fulfills their intimate desire for power. They not only support Israel blindly but they try to back its far-right parties which call for expansion of the Israeli settlements in the occupied territories **and even ethnic cleansing of the Palestinians.**" (my italics)

And here we are in 2025.

The book ends with the story of the pipe organ which the Lutheran Christmas Church had owned for over 100 years. Built in Germany and shipped to Palestine in 1893 through the Port of Jaffa, it played for a century: surviving occupations, world wars, regional wars, bombs, and tanks. In 1993 after its 100th birthday the organ was retired due to worn-out components and deferred maintenance that the congregation could not afford. In 1997 a minister visiting from Christ the Redeemer Lutheran Church in Minnesota noticed it in the balcony and asked if he might facilitate its restoration. Funds were raised and in 1998 the organ was dismantled and shipped to Minnesota for rebuilding. It was returned and reassembled with only days to spare. On Christmas Eve 2000 the organ was playing again in Bethlehem.
