Why Donald Trump Isn't a Lutheran

There are some things in life for which you can't campaign. You can run for an office, apply for a job, seek an award, promote your credentials, pad your resume, push your achievements, and even brag about your accomplishments, but some things must happen by grace ... as a gift.

It is so hard, if not impossible, for the proud and arrogant to understand that.

As much as someone pompous might want to self-promote, you cannot nominate yourself for the "Humblest Person on the Planet". No matter how rich you claim to be, you cannot pay for a space on Mt. Rushmore. You cannot lobby Congress to replace the Lincoln Memorial with yourself perched on a king's throne. Much as you think you might deserve it, you cannot buy sainthood; and great as you think you might be, you cannot vote yourself into heaven. (Imagine calling St. Peter and asking if he can find just 11,780 more votes to be heaven's first president. Or trying to send a riotous mob carrying crosses to storm heaven with fake electoral ballots while locking God in a closet and declaring yourself the ruler of the world.)

Lutherans understand all that. Embedded within the Lutheran character is a special DNA strand called Grace. That DNA stands apart. It is called Grace Alone. Lutherans are taught from an early age not to be an obnoxious braggart (at least not to brag too much anyway!). If what you've done is so great, it will speak for itself. True greatness doesn't need our prideful preening. It doesn't crave attention.

Perhaps that Lutheran understanding helped start the Nobel Peace Prize. You may not realize this, but the Nobel Peace Prize has a strong Swedish Lutheran heritage. Alfred Nobel was a Lutheran; and, like all Lutherans, he was a sinner. And he knew it. A renowned chemist and inventor, Nobel patented a use for nitroglycerin that was safe. After the Greek word for power, he called it dynamite. Much to his dismay, the destruction of dynamite was used for military explosives and critics called him 'the merchant of death'. One newspaper opined that Nobel "became rich by finding ways to kill more people faster than ever before". Dismayed and disappointed at dynamite's destruction of human life, Nobel wanted to be remembered for a legacy of peace. His last will and testament set aside his considerable estate to establish the Nobel Peace Prizes.

Alfred Nobel's Lutheran pastor, Nathan Soderblom, conducted his funeral in 1897. Soderblom himself received the Nobel Peace Prize in 1930 for calling all Christian leaders to work for peace and justice during World War I and for creating compassionate conditions for prisoners of war and for refugees of war.

Yet another Swedish Lutheran would be the first to receive the Nobel Peace Prize posthumously in 1961. Dag Hammerskold was the youngest person to be elected Secretary-General of the United Nations. Lutheran theology shaped his deep trust in God's grace and his deep commitment to world peace, grounded in justice. John F. Kennedy called Hammerskold the "greatest statesman of our century".

Those who would aspire to win the Nobel Peace Prize might aspire to emulate these three obscure Lutherans. They didn't claim human greatness. They claimed God's grace. Because Lutherans understand grace. And grace leads to humble gratitude for the greatness of our God.

Our President, with all his 'religious advisers'--Paula White and Cardinal Dolan and many others--doesn't seem to get grace. He wondered out loud if he's done enough to get to heaven. Can't they tell him that we are saved by grace, and that all the braggadocio and self-promotion in the world won't make one bit of difference to God? Do they know themselves that grace is a gift of God that can't be hawked or peddled or turned into billion-dollar crypto profit?

Perhaps a humble Lutheran pastor like Nathan Soderblom might remind them ... that you can't earn your way into heaven ... and that you can't buy sainthood ... or lobby for the Nobel Peace Prize. Because there are some things for which you just can't campaign.




