
Saint Francis of Assisi

October 4th is the Feast Day of Saint Francis of Assisi, the Patron Saint of animals. Francis preached to people and animals, saying that it is the natural duty of all living things to give praise to the Creator – and that it is the particular duty of human beings to cherish and protect nature, as stewards of creation and because we, too, are creatures. An old legend says that as Francis lay dying, he looked upon his donkey and thanked him for carrying him and accompanying him for so many miles.

And so, welcome to this liturgy that honours the place of animals in the grand sweep of God's creation. To bless animals is to acknowledge them as fellow creatures of God, and to express our thanks for the service, comfort and companionship they provide to us.

There are many images and symbols of animals in the windows, walls, carvings and hangings in the Cathedral. The Altar frontal today depicts the seven days of creation showing animals and plants from the Ottawa Valley (and note the loon in the pulpit!). Do take time to explore while you are here, or come again another time. You are always welcome!

May you and the animals present in this service fully enjoy the space, colour and sounds of the Cathedral, and may the abundant blessing of God who made and holds every living thing in the pulse of God's creative power be upon you today and always.

Second Reading | Matthew 6:25-34

A reading from the gospel of Matthew.

Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? And can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life? And why do you worry about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these. But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which is alive today and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you – you of little faith? Therefore do not worry, saying, "What will we eat?" or "What will we drink?" or "What will we wear?" For it is the Gentiles who strive for all these things; and indeed your heavenly Father knows that you need all these things. But strive first for the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. 'So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today.'

We pray for animals who are wild and tame, for those whose beauty opens our eyes more fully to your presence, and for those whose power causes us to tremble, giving us a fuller understanding of your power and care for us.

We give thanks for the gift of the animals who are our companions, whose presence adds purpose to our days, and whose affection we cherish. We pray that you will help us to care for your creation well, and in our caring for them, know that we are sharing in your love for all that you have created.
