INTRODUCTION TO THE DAY

In Deuteronomy God promises to raise up a prophet like Moses, who will speak for God; in Psalm 111 God shows the people the power of God's works. For the church these are ways of pointing to the unique authority people sensed in Jesus' actions and words. We encounter that authority in God's word, around which we gather, the word that prevails over any lesser spirit that would claim power over us, freeing us to follow Jesus.

WORD

FIRST READING: DEUTERONOMY 18:15-20

The end of Deuteronomy is Moses's farewell address to Israel. They will enter the Promised Land, but he will die before crossing with them. No doubt the tribes were troubled about the time to come, since Moses had been the intermediary between them and God, and they faced a future without the Word of God.

[Moses said:] ¹⁵The Lord your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among your own people; you shall heed such a prophet. ¹⁶This is what you requested of the Lord your God at Horeb on the day of the assembly when you said: "If I hear the voice of the Lord my God any more, or ever again see this great fire, I will die." ¹⁷Then the Lord replied to me: "They are right in what they have said. ¹⁸I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their own people; I will put my words in the mouth of the prophet, who shall speak to them everything that I command. ¹⁹Anyone who does not heed the words that the prophet shall speak in my name, I myself will hold accountable. ²⁰But any prophet who speaks in the name of other gods, or who presumes to speak in my name a word that I have not commanded the prophet to speak—that prophet shall die."

R: The word of the Lord. A: Thanks be to God.

PSALM 111

(Sung to the tune Winchester Old LBW 264)

This psalm is the song of a faithful prophet, one who recognizes and proclaims the work of God both in the past and in the present.



Enjoy the great works of the LORD; Fail not to see, adore. Great and majestic are His deeds; His righteousness endures.

In all my mem'ry He has placed Just acts and wondrous deeds. Know that the LORD's compassionate; Love and kind grace is He.

Mercy He gives to those who fear, No food they lack or need. O He remembers covenant, Provides eternally.

Quickly He shows His mighty power; Rewards with gifts of land. Shows us His just and faithful works; Trustworthy, His law stands.

Upright and steadfast are His ways; Vibrant in faithfulness. Well has He saved His cov'nant ones— eXtol His holiness!

You will find wisdom when you seek the fear of God the LORD. Zealously follow His commands—praise to Him evermore!

SECOND READING: 1 CORINTHIANS 8:1-13

For most of the season of Epiphany, we'll be reading almost continuously through Paul's letter to the Corinthians. At that place and time, the only meat which was available for most people was that distributed from the temples of the gods, left overs from the sacrifices. For some Christians, eating this meat implied that they were participating in those sacrifices. Other Christians were so strong in believing that those gods did not exist that they could freely enjoy the meat.

¹Now concerning food sacrificed to idols: we know that "all of us possess knowledge. Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up. ²Anyone who claims to know something does not yet have the necessary knowledge; ³but anyone who loves God is known by him.

⁴Hence, as to the eating of food offered to idols, we know that "no idol in the world really exists," and that "there is no God but one." ⁵Indeed, even though there may be so-called gods in heaven or on earth—as in fact there are many gods and many lords—⁶yet for us there is one God, the Father, from whom are all things and for whom we exist, and one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom are all things and through whom we exist.

⁷It is not everyone, however, who has this knowledge. Since some have become so accustomed to idols until now, they still think of the food they eat as food offered to an idol; and their conscience, being weak, is defiled. ⁸"Food will not bring us close to God." We are no worse off if we do not eat, and no better off if we do. ⁹But take care that this liberty of yours does not somehow become a stumbling block to the weak. ¹⁰For if others see you, who possess knowledge, eating in the temple of an idol, might they not, since their conscience is weak, be encouraged to the point of eating food sacrificed to idols? ¹¹So by

your knowledge those weak believers for whom Christ died are destroyed. ¹²But when you thus sin against members of your family, and wound their conscience when it is weak, you sin against Christ. ¹³Therefore, if food is a cause of their falling, I will never eat meat, so that I may not cause one of them to fall.

R: The word of the Lord. A: Thanks be to God.

*GOSPEL READING: MARK 1:21-28

The word "Epiphany" means the obvious appearance of a god to rescue, relieve and heal. The readings of this season, from the beginning of the Gospel of Mark, describe the authority and wonderworking of Jesus, in teaching, healing, freeing, and calling.

P: The Holy Gospel according to Saint Mark, the first chapter. **A: Glory to you, O Lord.**

²¹[Jesus and his disciples] went to Capernaum; and when the sabbath came, he entered the synagogue and taught.²²They were astounded at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes. ²³Just then there was in their synagogue a man with an unclean spirit, ²⁴and he cried out, "What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God." ²⁵But Jesus rebuked him, saying, "Be silent, and come out of him!" ²⁶And the unclean spirit, convulsing him and crying with a loud voice, came out of him. ²⁷They were all amazed, and they kept on asking one another, "What is this? A new teaching—with authority! He commands even the unclean spirits, and they obey him." ²⁸At once his fame began to spread throughout the surrounding region of Galilee.

P: The gospel of the Lord. A: Praise to you, O Christ.

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
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






*PREFACE

as we forgive those who trespass against us;




