INTRODUCTION TO THE DAY

Cradle and cross are inextricably connected on the fourth Sunday of Advent. Between a lovely tribute to the little town of Bethlehem and Mary's magnificent song of praise, the letter to the Hebrews reminds us in no uncertain terms that Christ's advent is for "the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all." It is the kind of tension in which the church always lives as when in holy communion—with high delight—"we proclaim the Lord's death."

GATHERING

*CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS

P: Blessed be the holy Trinity, + one God, alive in the world, reviving creation, arriving soon. **A: Amen.**

P: Let us confess our sin, in the presence of God and of one another.

P: God of mercy, we confess that we have sinned. We trust earthly powers and human authority alone. We grow fearful. We cling to false comforts.


P: God of might, we confess that we have sinned. We have turned away from our neighbors. We have trusted false promises.


P: God in our midst, we confess that we have sinned. We plead: come to us. Bring your mercy to birth in us.



WORD

FIRST READING: MICAH 5:2-5A

The book of Micah was written when Jerusalem was surrounded by an invading army. While the situation was bleak, Micah reminds the people of the promise made to David (whose home town was Bethlehem): his dynasty would not fail, and God would provide both a righteous king and peace.

² But you, O Bethlehem of Ephrathah, who are one of the little clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to rule in Israel, whose origin is from of old, from ancient days.

³ Therefore he shall give them up until the time when she who is in labor has brought forth; then the rest of his kindred shall return

to the people of Israel.

⁴ And he shall stand and feed his flock in the strength of the LORD, in the majesty of the name of the LORD his God.

And they shall live secure, for now he shall be great


to the ends of the earth,

^{5a} and he shall be the one of peace.

CANTICLE: LUKE 1:46B-55 HOLDEN MAGNIFICAT

While the response to the first reading is almost always a psalm, occasionally another song from Scripture appears here. Today, the response is Mary's song, which concludes today's Gospel reading, which is a response to Elizabeth's declaration that the child Mary bore would fulfill the promises of Micah and the other prophets. Mary's song is traditionally sung in the Evening Prayer Office.




SECOND READING: HEBREWS 10:5-10

One of the themes of Hebrews is that Jesus has fulfilled and replaced Israel's Temple and sacrificial system as the meeting-place of God and humans. The "body you have prepared for me" is an appropriate reference to the Gospel reading's description of Christ's coming in the flesh.


- ⁵ Consequently, when Christ came into the world, he said,
 - "Sacrifices and offerings you have not desired,
 - but a body you have prepared for me;
 - ⁶ in burnt offerings and sin offerings you have taken no pleasure.
 - ⁷ Then I said, 'See, I have come to do your will, O God' (in the scroll of the book it is written of me)."
- ⁸ When he said above, "You have neither desired nor taken pleasure in sacrifices and offerings and burnt offerings and sin offerings" (these are offered according to the law), ⁹ then he added, "See, I have come to do your will." He abolishes the first in order to establish the second. ¹⁰ And it is by God's will that we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all.

L: The word of the Lord. A: Thanks be to God.

*GOSPEL READING: LUKE 1:39-45 [46-55]

While she and her husband are aged, Elizabeth has miraculously become pregnant with the child who will become John the Baptist. In the meantime, in Nazareth, her cousin Mary has received a visit from the angel Gabriel, who offers her the opportunity to become the mother of Jesus. Mary travels to Jerusalem to meet Elizabeth.

³⁹ In those days Mary set out and went with haste to a Judean town in the hill country, ⁴⁰ where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. ⁴¹ When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leaped in her womb. And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit ⁴² and exclaimed with a loud cry, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. ⁴³ And why has this happened to me, that the mother of my Lord comes to me? ⁴⁴ For as soon as I heard the sound of your greeting, the child in my womb leaped for joy. ⁴⁵ And blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfillment of what

was spoken to her by the Lord."


- ⁴⁶ And Mary said, "My soul magnifies the Lord,

Address and Questions

The presiding minister addresses those being welcomed.

P: In baptism, we are welcomed into the body of Christ and sent to share in the mission of God. We are called to live among God's faithful people, to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper, to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed, to serve all people, following the example of Jesus, and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth.

Sisters and brothers in Christ, do you intend to continue in the covenant of your baptism among God's people in this place?

Those being welcomed respond.

I do, and I ask God to help and guide me.

The minister addresses the assembly.

P: People of God, do you promise to support and pray for *these* new *members* in *their* life in Christ?

A: We do, and we ask God to help and guide us.

WELCOME

Those being welcomed face the assembly. A representative of the congregation addresses the assembly.

P: Let us welcome these sisters and brothers in Christ to this community of faith.

A: We rejoice with you in the life of baptism. Together we will give thanks and praise to God and proclaim the good news to all the world.

*PRAYERS OF INTERCESSION

As we prepare for Emmanuel, God-with-us, let us pray for all people and places that long for God's presence.

A brief silence.

L: God our uniter, increase communication and cooperation in our relationships with those of other traditions and religions. Root your church in the radical message of your incarnation, and enable us to pursue your justice in the world. Lord, in your mercy,

A: receive our prayer.

L: God our creator, we praise you for the beauty that surrounds us. Awaken in us a renewed sense of care for the wildlife in our communities (*local preserves, parks, or sanctuaries may be named*). Form us into faithful stewards of what you have made. Lord, in your mercy,

A: receive our prayer.

L: God our sovereign, Mary proclaims a new way of life that lifts up the lowly and fills the hungry with good things. Nurture in local governments and municipalities a desire to care for all who are overlooked and ignored. Lord, in your mercy,

A: receive our prayer.

L: God our beacon, as the northern hemisphere begins its slow turn toward more daylight, remind us that even in the deepest nights, you are there. Comfort the lonely and bereaved. Hold closely the frightened, anxious, depressed, and ill (*especially*). Lord, in your mercy,

A: receive our prayer.

L: God our guide, shepherd the leadership of this congregation. Bless the council and staff in discerning future ministry and open their hearts to the voices of the community. Lord, in your mercy,

A: receive our prayer.

L: God our gatherer, we give you thanks for our new member, Edna, whom you have drawn to yourself by the love of Jesus Christ and whom we have welcomed into this household of faith. Keep us close together in your Spirit, in the breaking of bread and the prayers, and in service to others. Lord, in your mercy,

A: receive our prayer.

Here other intercessions may be offered.

L: God our life, you remember the promises you have made to your people. In gratitude for those who have died especially Sheldon Corl and Jean Anderson, we praise you for your faithfulness throughout history. Lord, in your mercy,

A: receive our prayer.

L: Savior of the nations, come, and receive these prayers and the pleas of our hearts, in the name of Jesus Christ.

A: Amen.










*PREFACE

and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.



A NOTE ON COMMUNION WAFERS




To topple barriers that prevent participation in worship, we want to make it possible for individuals with Celiac Disease or gluten intolerant to be able to eat the Body of our Lord. Our default wafers are made by Parish Crossroads and are known as "Low Gluten Wafers" because they contain trace amounts of gluten. However, the wafers are tested at least once a year for how much gluten is in them. Since 2020, the wafers have routinely tested to contain 15ppm gluten or less (The


US FDA defines most food products with 20ppm or less as "gluten free"). Use the QR Code and look for the link that gives the most recent test results.

If you still have concerns, we have some truly gluten-free wafers available upon request.






