

#### Reclaiming the "M" Word

For as in one body, we have many members and not all the members have the same function, so we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another.

Romans 12:4-5 (NRSVUE)

I have been a <u>member</u> of the Lutheran Church for over 60 years. In the catechetical method made famous by Martin Lutheran I will ask, "What does this mean?" What does it mean to be a <u>member</u> of a church?

Church membership is not what most people think when they speak of membership. Often times it means being a part of a group or club, paying dues, and receiving services from those dues. It doesn't include special privileges nor does it have the traditional hierarchy. As a matter of fact, Jesus said to be the greatest we have to be the lowest; to be the first we have to be the last. So, what does it mean to be a member of the church?

The Apostle Paul used a wonderful image to define the true meaning of <u>member-ship</u>: the body of Christ. The church, you and I, are members (parts) of the body of Christ. So, what does that mean? While I believe we could spend a lifetime trying to understand this profound picture, I'd like to suggest a few ideas.

- 1) As members of the church (the body), we are a part of something larger than ourselves. We do not work for ourselves. All members work for the one body. Paul tells us that body is Christ Jesus himself. We do not serve our own needs. We are all servants of Jesus, working to advance his kingdom of love in the world.
- 2) As members of the church (the body), we need each and every member to fully accomplish the work of Christ in the world. If a body is missing some of its parts, say an arm or a leg, it becomes more difficult to accomplish tasks. If most parts are missing, it is nearly impossible. So, it is in the body of Christ. We need everyone in order for the church to function at full capacity.
- 3) As members of the church (the body), we need to work together. Can you imagine how difficult it would be for a body if the left hand was always fighting with the right? Or vice-versa? Not much would be accomplished. So, it is with the body of Christ. The church needs to work together in order to fulfill the desires of the head (Jesus). Conflicts in the body draw the church into itself and away from its goal to reach the world with the love of Christ.
- 4) As members of the church (the body), we need to care for each other. When one part of the body hurts, it affects the entire body. When one part rejoices, the entire body rejoices. As one body, we share with each other all that our life journeys bring. We help each other get through the tough times and celebrate the seasons of joy. We need to be healers in the body (church) with our words and deeds.
- 5) And finally, as members of the church (the body), we need to stay connected to the head (Jesus). We have often seen the tragic results of an individual whose mind and body have lost connections due to illness or disease. I remember friends of my parents whose minds were strong and vibrant, but ALS (Lou Gehrig's Disease) had made their bodies incapable of accomplishing their desires.

The head runs the show and we must stay connected to him in order to fully be the church.

May we function together as the body of Christ.

#### **Congregational Update from Council Chair**

September 21, 2025

Dear friends in Christ,

The last time Council provided an update was back in the spring. Attendance was low for the after-church and Zoom sessions we tried, so today we are returning to a tradition from years past—what some of us remember as a "temple talk." A spoken update was shared in worship this morning, and this written version is being provided so that everyone in our community can receive the same information, whether you were able to be here or not.

I've organized this update around three themes: what exciting opportunities are before us, what's changing to help us realize them, and what's needed from all of us to get there.

#### 1. Exciting Opportunities

We are in a hopeful season. Pastor Greg has now been called as our permanent pastor, with a clear call to lead us in transformation while staying rooted in the essence of who we are—a Christ-following, grace-filled Lutheran community.

We've also been approached by Unity Lutheran, the mission congregation serving newcomers from Hong Kong who have been worshipping and delivering programming here for the last several years. The leaders of their congregation have expressed a desire to become part of Hope, which could bring new talents, ideas, and energy to help us build connections with newcomers. Council recently passed a motion to invite this community into dialogue about possible opportunities for shared ministry and we'll continue to share updates on these conversations as they move ahead.

And, building off the Southwest Area Gathering that several of us attended this spring, there is strong energy for more collaboration between Lutheran churches, especially around children and youth ministries. Other congregations are already experimenting, and there is real potential for us to share resources and learn together.

#### 2. What's Changing to Help Us Realize These Opportunities

To create space for growth, some things are changing. Beginning this fall, our fourth Sunday worship each month will be less traditional and more free-flowing, in response to the spiritual interests you've expressed. This shift also means we've moved from having a Director of Music to a "worship team" approach. Please come to me or Pastor Greg with your questions about this.

We've also hired an HR consultant to review roles and responsibilities—volunteer, staff, and contract—so that we are set up for the church we are today and the one we are becoming. The Personnel Committee—Kurt Hanson, James Gattinger, and Rachel Schmidt—will guide this process. It's needed because over the years, people have quietly picked up extra work without adjustments to their roles or compensation, and because our demographics and volunteer base have changed.

I also need to share that our Office Administrator, Mary, has gone on short-term medical leave. We invite your prayers for her health and wellbeing, and ask your patience as we cover her responsibilities until November.

For our children's ministry, Sunday School in its past form is not continuing. Instead, we'll focus on special events and new approaches. As hard as this is—especially for parents of young children like myself—we trust that new expressions of ministry for our kids will rise. Resurrection always comes after death, and we look forward to seeing what God will bring to life.

Finally, we've launched a visioning process called *Rooted in Hope*. Together we'll name our core identity and discern a vision to guide our decisions and ministries into the future.

#### 3. What's Needed to Help Us Get There

Your participation is vital—join a Rooted in Hope conversation or fill out the <u>online survey</u>, and help us connect with others outside our walls to learn how they see us and where God may be calling us to serve.

We also need your financial investment. We repaired one section of the roof this year, but two more large sections are leaking and need urgent work. We also invested this summer in refreshing the landscaping out front—removing the overgrown juniper bushes and laying new sod—small but important work to keep our building and grounds welcoming. Council has hesitated on big investments post-COVID, but it's time. As we enter budget season, signs of congregational support will help us make responsible choices for both staffing and facilities. To be clear, if you are able to contribute to a healthy financial position in this last part of the year, it will make it easier for us to make responsible choices for our people and our facilities.

To help with making fiscally responsible decisions, we've formed Hope's first Finance Committee—thank you to Dale Ham, Lois Hansen, Cam Runka, Steve Medhurst, and Dave Baer for stepping up. The committee has already begun work, and I want to share a snapshot of our mid-year financials at the end of July:

#### Mid-Year Financial Update (as of July 31, 2025):

- Revenues: \$248,000 (↑ \$20,000 from last year, ↓ \$4,000 from budget)
  - Higher rental revenues than budgeted
  - Lower offering revenues than budgeted
- Expenses: \$265,000
- **Deficit:** \$17,000 on paper (better than the \$40,000 deficit we had budgeted)
- **Next steps:** Beginning in 2026, the Finance Committee will prepare budgets with monthly forecasts to better reflect seasonal giving patterns (e.g. Easter and Christmas).

We also want to grow in understanding why people give, and in showing gratitude. So let me say today: **thank you**. Thank you for your faith, trust, and generosity in supporting this community's mission—to worship God, celebrate the good news of Jesus Christ, share in Christ's community, and witness Jesus' love to the world.

And finally, we need your prayers, patience, and grace. As one of the longest-standing members of Hope—41 years since my baptism—I can say with certainty that who I am today is because this community and the Spirit have held me. You've walked with me through my childhood, those awkward teenage years and confirmation, the questioning years of young adulthood when I played organ for pocket money, my wedding and the birth of my children, and also through grief at the deaths of my mom Judy and my grandma Bessie.

I am deeply grateful for the love and grace this community has shown me across all of those years. And I am committed to helping ensure that this community continues to show love and grace to many more people for decades to come. That will mean change. But through it all, we will hold fast to our essence, our faith, and our mission.

Let's walk together into the future God is calling us to.

#### **Council Update**

We have recently appointed a finance committee. They would like to remind members that there are several ways to financially contribute to the mission and ministries happening at Hope Lutheran:

#### PAR (Pre-Authorized Remittance)

You can set up an automatic withdrawal from your bank account in the amount of your choosing, so you can ensure that your financial gift makes it to the church even if you aren't there every Sunday. Contact the office (church@hopelutheran.ca) to receive the form to set this up.

#### Charitable Donations of Marketable Securities

Hope Lutheran Church has the ability to accept donations in the form of marketable securities. The direct donation of securities has favourable tax implications for the donor and is also in Hope Lutheran Church's (HLC) interest to be able to accept these kinds of donations with relative ease. Charitable donations of securities in publicly traded companies would be exempt from capital gains but please refer to CRA guidelines for a full explanation.

HLC policy is that a gift of this type is not considered complete until the securities are fully assigned and held by HLC. For marketable securities such as stocks and bonds, the value of the receipt is determined by using the market value of the security at the close of business on the day the security is received. Hope's authorized trading officer is Dale Ham. You may contact him (403-333-4868 or <a href="mailto:daleham@shaw.ca">daleham@shaw.ca</a>) to find out more about the process. He will work with you and your financial advisor or broker to prepare the transfer forms and coordinate with the banking representatives for the efficient transfer and acceptance of the securities into Hope's trading account. He will also coordinate with the HLC Recording Secretary and the donor as to the valuation of the donation for the annual donations tax form preparation.

#### **Estate Planning**

Consider naming Hope Lutheran Church as a charitable beneficiary in your will, leaving a legacy contribution to the ministry of our shared faith community.

#### Envelopes in the Offering Plate

As the offering plate is collected on Sunday, we welcome financial gifts in the form of cash or cheques. There is also a box on the ushers' table to receive these gifts. Please note that in 2026 we are moving to envelopes that are not pre-printed with a unique number, so you will need to write your name or number on the envelope to have your gift recorded. Council made this decision to reduce

waste from many envelopes that go unused, and save on the cost of printing envelopes that are not used.


#### STITCHING FOR HOPE

#### FROM THE WIDER CHURCH

#### Installation of ELCIC Bishop Larry Kochendorfer



The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada (ELCIC) gathered on Saturday, September 27 in worship and celebration for the installation of Rev. Dr. Larry Kochendorfer as the church's fifth National Bishop.

Taking place in the afternoon at Faith Lutheran Church, Winnipeg, MB, the installation of the new National Bishop brought together rostered leaders, ELCIC members, staff and ecumenical guests. The service was filled with the beauty of choir and musicians, lifting hearts in joyous song, and with prayers carrying deep meaning and hope.

Lutheran, ecumenical, and interfaith pastors and bishops in attendance robed in red vestments and processed into the sanctuary to the hymn *Soli Deo Gloria*. Scripture readings from Isaiah 43, Psalm 46, and Ephesians 4 were shared, reminding all of God's steadfast love, strength, and the call to unity.

"We do not fully know the future, but we have what we need, dear church," Kochendorfer said. "Jesus is feeding us. We have bread and wine, we have the scriptures, we have each other. We will not get to where we are going without going together and with others. Jesus comes alongside. Love is at our side. Hope, faith and love, these are the tools of our calling. Hope, the ability to hear the melody of the future. Faith the courage to dance to its rhythm. Love, the stubborn and unwavering commitment. And together we seek to live out God's grace and God's unconditional love."

The Most Rev. Linda Nicholls, former Archbishop and Primate of the Anglican Church of Canada, preached at the installation, sharing words of encouragement and hope for Kochendorfer's ministry and for the ongoing work and mission of the ELCIC amid current worldly challenges.

"My prayer for the ELCIC and for Bishop Larry is that you will keep singing," Archbishop Nicholls shared. "Singing with joy, hope and passion, and that you do that in partnership with us Anglicans, so that we might together show the world that we are not alone; we do not fear. Jesus lives and we will live together with all the gifts that God has given us."

Those gathered both in-person and online had the opportunity to take the Sacraments through communion shortly after the laying on of hands-on Bishop Kochendorfer. The new National Bishop was presented with the gifts of a pectoral cross, a crosier and the Holy scriptures.

Synod Bishops Rev. Trish Schmermund, Rev. Kathy Martin, Rev. Dr. Ali Tote, Rev. Carla Blakley, and Rev. Jason Zinko were all present to offer their blessing and support alongside many rostered leaders and lay representatives from across the wider church.

The service concluded with a blessing, while congregants sung *Hope Everlasting* as the new National Bishop and clergy processed out of the sanctuary.

#### **About National Bishop Larry Kochendorfer**

Kochendorfer, 64, most recently served as interim pastor at Our Redeemer, Penticton, B.C., and assistant to the bishop in the British Columbia Synod. He previously served as Bishop of the Synod of Alberta and the Territories (2012–2024) and has been a parish pastor at congregations in Dickson, Lethbridge and Edmonton, Alberta.

He has served the wider church through the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) as a council member from 2017–2023, chair of the LWF's Mutual Responsibility Task Force, and co-chair of the Lutheran portion of the Joint Anglican-Lutheran Commission.

Kochendorfer has been married to his wife Cathy for 42 years; together they have raised four children and are proud grandparents to five grandchildren.

Kochendorfer was elected National Bishop at the 2025 ELCIC National Convention in Winnipeg on July 12. He becomes the fifth National Bishop in the ELCIC, following Donald Sjoberg (1986–1993), Telmor Sartison (1993–2001), Raymond Schultz (2001–2007), and Susan Johnson (2007–2025).

#### THE BOTANY BOOK BY KATHY LEE

The year is 1924 and a 15-year-old grade nine student is searching the pasture and the roadsides for plant specimens for his botany class at school. Between April 24 and May 8 he collects 30 and he carefully mounts them on the blotter-paper pages his botany book.

Certain criteria must be duly recorded: *Order of Description* and *Order of Family*. Order of Description for a wild onion specimen: *Root*- bulb; *Stem*-erect; *Leaves*-long, slender and round; *Flowers*-pink; *Calyx*-3 and pink; *Stemals*-3 and pink; *Stamens*-6; *Anthers*-6; *Pistil*-1 and pink; *Stigma*-1 and white; *Ovary*-3 celled; *Fruit*-3 celled, 3 valved, capsule; *Seed* -many. Remarks: The wild onion is very common. Classification, locality and date are to be recorded as well. *Classification*-Liliacea (Lily), Pasture, April 28, 1924

Order of Family: Common name- wild onion; Genus-Allium; Species- A. mutabile (Michx) Locality and date.


This book belonged to my father, Harry. It is one of my most precious keepsakes. Considering it is over 100 years old it is in remarkable condition. As a child I often looked through the pages to examine the preserved plant specimens. My favourite was Pussy Toes because the root was fuzzy and fun to touch.

My dad's botanical knowledge about native plants carried on throughout his life and he passed the knowledge on to my siblings and me. As a result, we could name quite a few, especially the ones that grew in our pasture: shepherd's purse, wild aster, gum weed, yarrow, goldenrod. We knew all about Dutch clover and sweet clover. Then there were the weeds: dandelions, of course; pig weed, stinkweed, Canada thistle, Russian thistle, bull thistle and sow thistle, as well as mustards- tansy and tumble- and fox tail. Dad was relentless in his quest to eradicate broad-leaf weeds, especially sow thistle on the road allowance. Wind-blown seeds from sow thistles meant weeds in crops and weeds meant competition for nutrients that would reduce the yield of wheat, oats, barley or flax.

When I was in my late teens, I remember his comment about a new weed that arrived on the scene. It was known locally as Mexican fireweed. He mused that if people didn't get on top of it "You've really got something there." Indeed, it was so. It proved to be invasive. Many a fence line was covered from bottom to top with the weed gone out of control, an ugly blemish on the rural landscape. It bothered my dad a great deal that some farmers were so cavalier about weed control. He opined that a weed inspector could come and order them to clean up their property or face a fine. Then they'd have to do something.

Harry was a good steward and a good example. His care and concern for God's good creation still resonates with me to this very day.
