

First Reading: Exodus 18:13-26

¹³ The next day Moses sat as judge for the people, while the people stood around him from morning until evening. 14 When Moses's father-in-law saw all that he was doing for the people, he said, "What is this that you are doing for the people? Why do you sit alone, while all the people stand around you from morning until evening?" ¹⁵ Moses said to his father-in-law, "Because the people come to me to inquire of God. ¹⁶ When they have a dispute, they come to me, and I decide between one person and another, and I make known to them the statutes and instructions of God." 17 Moses's father-in-law said to him, "What you are doing is not good. 18 You will surely wear yourself out, both you and these people with you, for the task is too heavy for you; you cannot do it alone. 19 Now listen to me. I will give you counsel, and God be with you! You should represent the people before God and bring their cases to God. ²⁰ Teach them the statutes and instructions and make known to them the way they are to go and the things they are to do. ²¹ You should also look for able men among all the people, men who fear God, are trustworthy, and hate dishonest gain; set them as officers over thousands, hundreds, fifties, and tens. ²² Let them sit as judges for the people at all times; let them bring every important case to you but decide every minor case themselves. So it will be easier for you, and they will bear the burden with you. ²³ If you do this and God so commands you, then you will be able to endure, and all these people will go to their homes in peace."

²⁴ So Moses listened to his father-in-law and did all that he had said. ²⁵ Moses chose able men from all Israel and appointed them as heads over the people, as officers over thousands, hundreds, fifties, and tens. ²⁶ And they judged the people at all times; hard cases they brought to Moses, but any minor case they decided themselves.







Reverend Kimberly R Belken Anniversary of 10th Year of Ordination



Kimberly Belken was born in Des Moines, IA. Growing up she was an active member of St. John Lutheran Church where she first started sensing a call to ministry as an 8th grade confirmation student. She moved to Fremont, NE to study at Midland Lutheran College in 1998 where she became involved in the ministry of Sinai Lutheran Church. After graduating in 2002 with a degree in English and Religion, Kimberly worked at Care Corps Homeless Shelter and Hallmark for a few years before taking a job in the accounting department of Nebraska Engineering Company in Omaha, NE. While working at Nebraska Engineering Company, Kimberly went back to school to study accounting and business administration, first at Metro Community College and later at Creighton University.

Despite working in accounting and going to school, Kimberly continued to be active in her congregation in Fremont where she continued to discern that God was calling her to ordained ministry. In 2011, she could no longer ignore God's call and she began seminary at Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg in Pennsylvania. As a student, she

completed field education requirements at St. Paul's Lutheran in Stoverstown, PA and Church of the Covenant in Grafton, WV. She completed a unit of Clinical Pastoral Education (chaplaincy) at Bergan Mercy Hospital in Omaha, NE. She served a one-year internship at Peace Lutheran in Fargo, ND before returning to Gettysburg for her final year of studies. During that final year of studies, she served as interim director of Youth and Family Ministries at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Lutherville, MD.

Kimberly was ordained on August 27, 2015 at Sinai Lutheran Church in Fremont, NE. Her first call was to a pair of churches in east central Nebraska—Calvary Lutheran Church of Swede Home near Stromsburg and Zion Lutheran Church in Benedict, NE. These two small churches taught Kimberly how to pastor and instilled in her a love for rural and small church ministry. When the Benedict church voted to close in 2019, Kimberly took a new call to Salem Lutheran Church in Ponca, NE where she stayed till 2021.

In 2021, Kimberly took a call as a hospice chaplain and volunteer coordinator for Tabitha Hospice in Omaha. Later that year, she began serving as the part-time interim pastor of St. Matthew Lutheran Church in Omaha. Finally, in 2023, Kimberly took a call to Mt. Olivet Lutheran in Perry, IA and Immanuel Lutheran in Ogden. She is immensely grateful to be able to serve two unique congregations that challenge her and help her continue to grow in her ministry skills. She is constantly impressed with the deep faith of the congregation members and their commitment to sharing Jesus' love in a variety of ways. She loves being back in lowa because it means she is closer to her family, her parents George and Jan in Des Moines, sister Katie and niece Nora in Grimes, and sister Kirstin and niece Everly and nephew Jude in Carlisle.

Kimberly is currently pursuing her Doctor in Ministry degree through United Lutheran Seminary in Philadelphia. She has completed her coursework and hopes to complete final paper and project requirements to graduate in May of 2027. In her free time, she enjoys reading, art journaling, crocheting, and practicing Tae Kwon Do at Two Rivers Martial Arts in Clive. She is a member of Friends of the Library in Perry, serves on the board for the Perry Emergency Food Pantry, and is co-chair of the Perry Ministerial Association.

Louis Hoger was born in Chicago in 1944, moved to Mission, Kansas in the 4th grade and graduated from Shawnee Mission High School in 1962. He married Lois Raabe in 1968 in Winfield, Kansas.

Lou served in the U.S. Army for 3 ½ years between his college years and seminary education. He was an Air Defense Radar Technician, repairing the radar at the 9 Nike Missile Sites of the Washington DC-Baltimore Air Defense. He was selected as Soldier of the Year for Ft. Meade, MD, and Soldier of the Year for the Eastern Region of the Army Air Defense Command.

Following his Hospital Chaplaincy, Lou was ordained at Trinity Lutheran Church, his home congregation, on October 26, Reformation Sunday, as a member of the English District of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. He became a charter member of the English Synod of the Association of Evangelical Lutheran Church, a predecessor of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America at his first English District Convention. He joined the Lutheran Church in America in 1979.

After serving as a Hospital Chaplain, Pr. Hoger worked as a Chaplain at Menard Correction Center, Chester, IL from 1975-1980 (Chaplaincy Supervisor 1977-1980). For two years he also served as part time interim pastor of two congregations in Sedgewickville, Missouri for the Southern Illinois Synod of the LCA. 1977-1979.

Following his retirement, he did a three-year interim at Christ Lutheran, Jefferson, and Resurrection Lutheran, Coon Rapids. He continued as a supply pastor and presently at Resurrection Lutheran, Coon Rapids serving 2 or 3 Sundays a month.

CURRENT COMMUNITY MINISTRY: Lou has served as the Site Manager at the Perry Emergency Food Pantry since 2013. The program has grown significantly and includes 60 plus volunteers in 2025, with a budget over \$70,000.

OTHER COMMUNITY SERVICES: The Perry Alano Board, Perry Chamber of Commerce, the Perry Ministerial Association and Perry Lions Club where he is Treasurer and active coordinator of Flags Over Perry project. Lou and Lois are members of Mt. Olivet Lutheran in Perry. You will find him enjoying his coffee hour at Burger King and Courtyard Café Coffee shop with the SORE group, Society of Retired Experts. Lou and Lois were blessed with a daughter, Amy and son Joel (Megan) and 6 grandchildren, Logan, Mason, Natalie, Taylor, Paige, and Lilly.
