The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: he leadeth me beside the still waters. He restoreth my soul:

Often, when I consider this portion of Psalm 23, I picture a shepherd with his staff, sitting under a shade tree, as he watches over the sheep on the green, grassy hillside which is surrounded by, or fenced in by bramble bushes and large rocks, and leading down to a stream of clear, cool, fresh flowing water. And sometimes I think of the hymn "The Ninety and Nine" when the shepherd leaves the ninety-nine to seek the one that was lost. I guess the stray sheep got through the opening in the bush.

Not only can the sheep find the opening to go out, but sometimes, other animals, prey animals, wolves for example, find the opening to come in to attack the sheep.

A while back, I wrote this poem:

Hole In The Fence (Psalm 23:1-3)

WHATS THE POINT?

It's not hard to find the "Mission Statement" for our church. It's on the outside of the building for all to see-very public.

"To know Christ and to make Him known"

Simple and direct, isn't it? "How are we doing that?" was Rev. Allyson's question at the start-up session of Bible Study (or as it is now called, 'Small Groups'). "How many of us are guided by this mission statement and take it seriously," I wondered. The "Great Commission", from Jesus is to make Him known. "Go into all the world and proclaim the Gospel to the whole creation" (Mark 16 v15). He was talking to ordinary folk, lay people, about spreading the word.

A mission statement is a concise declaration of an organization's fundamental purpose, goals and reason for its existence. I checked with Joan Carr, the former editor of The Gathering, to see if there was ever a mission statement for this newsletter and her reply was that it started during Covid "to connect with people who are unable to participate in the life of the church for whatever reason- infirmity, illness or for whatever"... and she added that it eventually began to include church members who were uplifted by the articles. This was a comfort to me, as those of us on the writing team are lay people, trying to share our faith with readers in the hope that it will encourage you and help your faith and knowledge to grow. Perhaps the newsletter could do more to support the church's mission and be part of the outreach. It is posted on the church website for others to read. Maybe you could reach out and give a copy to a friend.

How can we share our faith beyond our gathering group as the disciples did? Does it come easily to us or is it something we are reluctant to try? I must confess I do not score very high on the scale of 'witnessing' or giving others the reasons for my belief. If somebody asked me about it, I might manage to sound confident without being too preachy, but no one has ever questioned me about why I believe what Scripture says, and Paul urges us to always be ready to give reasons for our faith. I may know Christ, but how do I make Him known to others-people who are questioning, hurting and need comfort, who are unfamiliar with Jesus and His saving grace (or what that even means?)

The New Bible Study series, *The 9 Arts of Spiritual Conversation*, *Walking alongside People Who Believe Differently*, is aimed at helping us to share our faith with anyone by adopting certain behaviours; noticing, praying, listening, asking questions, loving, welcoming, facilitating, even before we share! So, I am looking forward to learning how to improve and add to my communication skills, probably change my attitude and instead of just wishing I could get up enough courage to engage people about what they believe, to be an active and not a lazy disciple of Christ. In the Alpha program I was profoundly affected by the personal stories of participants who described how they changed from being disinterested in the message of the Bible and anything religious, to people with a new outlook on life and a love for Jesus. Don't we all know people who have not got themselves right with God, may ignore Scripture, never come to church to worship and are wondering what heaven is all about? They may be busy doing life in the world with little sense of purpose and some might be wondering "What is the point of it all?" This is where the people of Zion can fulfill the mission.

It is worth while learning how to be open to allowing God to use us for His purposes beyond worshipping, praying, volunteering, serving, giving. If we let Him, He will work through us to make Jesus known to others and we will be able to confidently add "making Him known" to our list of activities.

A WORD FROM EVAN

Much of how you and I define ourselves as people, as Christians, comes from what groups we consider ourselves to be part of. Being a single piece in a greater whole, shapes how we see ourselves and who we feel connected to. Think about how we introduce ourselves to someone we're meeting for the first time. We start, of course, with our name, but then we tell them about which groups we are part of. Usually, we use groups like our families, the organizations we work for or volunteer with, and the city, province, or country we live in. If you happen to have a bit of social courage, maybe you've been brave enough to introduce yourself to strangers as a follower of Christ.

Being able to gather in fellowship, as a group, is a central part of Christian life. We are blessed at Zion to have many special groups which fill our church calendar with opportunities to gather together beyond our Sunday worship service. As we move into fall, many of these groups and their events are starting back up after taking a break over the summer: Zion's youth ministries are back in full swing with the start of a new school year, the ladies of Friends of Faith have had their first outing of the fall, and Bible Study has resumed their regular meetings at the church. The church calendar for October is full of these regularly scheduled events, with the photo directory picture-taking Oct. 14th through 18th and the Atlantic Synod worship service at 7:00pm Monday Oct. 20th adding to the plentiful opportunities to be part of Zion's church family.

Gathering together multiple times a week, even daily, has been a common tradition of Christians since the first days of the church, when believers would gather together in individual homes or in public spaces. We see this in Acts 2, when on the day of Pentecost, all of Christ's followers had gathered in one house: "1 When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. 2 Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting." (Acts 2:1-2, NIV). This habit of gathering continues after Pentecost, both publicly and privately: "Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts." (Acts 2:46, NIV).

If I can persuade you to emulate the early Christians and make time for any of the weekly events on the church calendar in October, I naturally have to recommend you join us for Wednesday choir practice. We would be delighted if you took the plunge and tried a full evening of choir, but if I can't sell you on that idea, perhaps you could try one half-hour every second week for Marcato (lower voices) or Legato (higher voices). If it makes any difference in your decision to give choir a try, I can offer some perks: we have all the binders of music you could possibly want, snazzy blue choir gowns, and the most comfortable seats in the building on Sunday mornings.

I ask also that you take time to remember and pray for those who are unable to attend in person for Sunday worship and weekday events. There are many whose time is not their own to direct, with obligations to family, work, or school. Remember those separated from us by sheer distance, far away from us but not from our love or the love of God. Think especially of those who are prevented from gathering with us by illness or infirmity; pray for their healing and wholeness, that we might one day be together with them again.

"Dry as a Bone"

As I've lived most of my life off the Island, I've been asking long-time residents if they have ever seen it this dry. "Not in my lifetime," many have told me. All I can do is look out my window and measure where the water from Glenfinnan Lake was last year versus this year which is at least 25 feet further off the shore than it was.

But it's not just the shoreline that has changed. I've mowed my lawn a lot less this summer than I thought I would. This doesn't necessarily make me sad, but again, it shows how the lack of rain has affected the grass. We've also noticed our flowers shrinking back and how one little pine tree didn't survive the summer.


Now lack of rain is not new here or anywhere else for that matter. I do dislike using the term "drought," primarily because of what happens in other parts of the world on a regular basis and how our lack of rain holds no candle to it. So, I prefer to use a phrase my grandmother would say, "It's as dry as a bone."

But this too is not new, because I, like you, have seen "dryness" in other areas as well. Let's just call it "spiritual dryness". It happens to us all at one point or another. It comes when we get away from worship, even for a summer. It happens when life is hard and joy is forced to push deeper looking for some relief. It occurs when people are not seeing in us dry bones that can actually dance as Ezekiel dreamed in Ezekiel 37.

When things are dry, when the world seems dry, it is then that disciples of Christ seek the refreshment of the One who renews. It happens when people make the time for worship, become part of Bible Study, attend events with other believers, seek God daily on their own and even be bold to reach out and speak new life into others as we learning now learning in small group.

Maybe most important is to know that God will send rain. The Island will again be refreshed in God's time. And yes, the dryness you might feel, even now, need only last for a season, for in God alone we find the One who offers us, "living water."
