#### **Trustees Report - October 2025**

Glass Smith completed the installation of the Sunshine Shop's first floor windows the week of September 22.

Brad Burke is still waiting on an estimate for steel double exterior doors to the church basement. Cal recently asked him to consider a having only one door equipped with a push bar and the other equipped with two vertical bolts, one at the top and one at the bottom, like the current doors, only to have them both swing outward. Meanwhile, Cal contacted two door manufacturers regarding estimates.

After receiving a message regarding a leak above the entrance door to the Sanctuary from the hallway during the last rain, Cal checked the church roof where it joins the Fellowship Hall, but found nothing visible that might cause the leak. Carl Stark mentioned a leak in the attic above the door that he was aware of when helping with a project there. Cal will contact NY Roofers and have them check it out.

Still no word from the two contractors regarding the repair of the stain glass windows.

ECONOMIC CHALLENGES (picking up from where we left off last month)

D. Graft, Bribery, and Corruption - the UMC opposes these kinds of corruption as breaches of the public trust and deplores leaders who perform or enable such things.

#### ECONOMIC JUSTICE

The UMC holds a covenantal understanding that God's creation is meant to be shared by all and seeks to ensure that individuals, families, and communities not only survive but thrive.

- A. Responsible Consumerism the UMC urges people to reduce waste and promote sustainability of resources. The UMC supports nonviolent efforts to encourage manufacture of goods without exploitation of workers and seeks international cooperation in developing productive economies for the benefit of all humanity.
- B. Farming and Agricultural Production the UMC supports local and family farms. The UMC deplores agribusiness monopolization by corporations that decimate ecosystems for cash crops to be exported. The UMC urges all farmers to use sustainable practices that preserve the food chain and to pay workers fairly.
- C. The Dignity of Work the UMC endorses safe working conditions and equitable compensation for all workers. The UMC opposes child labor, supports unions, and champions work/life balance.
- D. Sabbath and Renewal Time the UMC recognizes the Sabbath as a gift from God for all people. United Methodists are encouraged to honor it by participating in corporate worship with our local congregation.
- E. Corporate Responsibility the UMC believes corporations and business should promote the social and economic health and welfare of society. The UMC calls on corporations and businesses to place people above profits and to observe the highest ethical standards in conducting business. Furthermore, the UMC urges individuals to hold corporations accountable through managed investments and lawful social action.
