#### INTRODUCTION TO THE DAY

God promises Jeremiah that a "new covenant" will be made in the future: a covenant that will allow all the people to know God by heart. The church sees this promise fulfilled in Christ, who draws all people to himself when he is lifted up on the cross. Our baptismal covenant draws us to God's heart through Christ and draws God's love and truth into our hearts. We join together in worship, sharing in word, song, and meal, and leave strengthened to share God's love with all the world.

# **GATHERING**

# \*CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS

P: In the name if the Father, and of the +Son, and of the Holy Spirit. A: Amen.

P: Almighty God, to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hid: cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you and worthily magnify your holy name, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **A: Amen.**

Almighty God strengthen you with power through the Holy Spirit, that Christ may live in your hearts through faith. **A: Amen.**

# **WORD**

# FIRST READING: JEREMIAH 31:31-34

The first readings for Lent this year focus on the succession of covenants God has made. This final one is a promised covenant. While Jeremiah is best known as a prophet of disaster, this reading comes after the disaster (military defeat, the destruction of Jerusalem, and the exile of Israelites to Babylon), when it would have made sense to despair.

<sup>31</sup>The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. <sup>32</sup>It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt—a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the LORD. <sup>33</sup>But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. <sup>34</sup>No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, "Know the LORD," for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the LORD; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

R: The word of the Lord. A: Thanks be to God.

## PSALM 51

This psalm, traditionally associated with David's repentance after his murderous adultery with Bathsheba, is also a prayer for the renewed relationship promised in the First Reading.

# **SECOND READING: HEBREWS 5:5-10**

Hebrews is written to a community which is complaining that their suffering did not disappear with their baptism. The author encourages them to persevere, with examples of the persistence of the saints and above all of Jesus. Melchizedek was a priest-king of the city which became Jerusalem who blessed Abraham (Genesis 14:17-20). The mysterious "order of Melchizedek," then, was a form of priesthood connected in some way to the Davidic king in Jerusalem, and in some way independent from the covenant with Abraham and Sarah.

<sup>5</sup>Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him,

"You are my Son, today I have begotten you"; <sup>6</sup>as he says also in another place,

"You are a priest forever,

according to the order of Melchizedek."

<sup>7</sup>In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. <sup>8</sup>Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; <sup>9</sup>and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, <sup>10</sup>having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek R: The word of the Lord. **A: Thanks be to God.**

# \*GOSPEL READING: JOHN 12:20-33

Because Lent points us toward Holy Week, the Gospel readings this year collect Jesus' predictions of his own suffering and death. In the earlier chapters of this Gospel, Jesus has denied that his hour had come. Now, when Gentiles first seek him out, the hour has come and he points forward to his crucifixion, speaking of it in ways which echo Moses' lifting up the bronze serpent in the wilderness (we heard this story and Jesus' other use of it last Sunday).

P: The Holy Gospel according to Saint John, the twelfth chapter. **A: Glory to you, O Lord.** 

<sup>20</sup>Now among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. <sup>21</sup>They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, "Sir, we wish to see Jesus." <sup>22</sup>Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. <sup>23</sup>Jesus answered them, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. <sup>24</sup>Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. <sup>25</sup>Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. <sup>26</sup>Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honor.

<sup>27</sup>"Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say—'Father, save me from this hour'? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. <sup>28</sup>Father, glorify your name." Then a voice came from heaven, "I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again." <sup>29</sup>The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. Others said, "An angel has spoken to him." <sup>30</sup>Jesus answered, "This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. <sup>31</sup>Now is the judgment of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. <sup>32</sup>And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself." <sup>33</sup>He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die. P: The gospel of the Lord. **A: Praise to you, O Christ.**

L: God of promise, we give thanks for the saints whose faith inspires us, especially Patrick, missionary to Ireland, whom we commemorate today, and the saints of our congregation who have gone before us, like Edna Harpster and Ada Mayes. Grant us faith to trust in your everlasting love. Hear us, O God. **A: Your mercy is great.** 

L: Accompany us on our journey, God of grace, and receive the prayers of our hearts, through Jesus Christ, our Savior. **A: Amen.**







as we forgive those who trespass against us;


and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.


