

Samaritan's Purse Prepares for Operation Christmas Child and Celebrates Impact of Veteran Outreach

As the season for *Operation Christmas Child* approaches, Samaritan's Purse is preparing to send millions of shoebox gifts to children in need around the world. The ministry, now in its 32nd year, has reached over 232 million children in 170 countries with both gifts and the message of the Gospel. Recent efforts have brought shoeboxes to remote areas like the Amazon rainforest in Peru, while personal stories from Cambodia and Chile highlight how lives are being transformed by faith through these efforts.

In addition to global outreach, Samaritan's Purse also concluded its 14th season of *Operation Heal Our Patriots*, a program supporting wounded U.S. veterans and their spouses. Over 160 couples traveled to Alaska this summer, with many rededicating their marriages and over 80 individuals coming to faith in Christ. The organization continues to provide long-term care through biblical counseling and community support. Samaritan's Purse President Franklin Graham credits prayer and God's work for the success of both ministries and encourages continued support as the holiday season approaches.
