INTRODUCING OUR NEW BISHOP:





On May 31st, 2025, the Diocese of Rupert's Land elected Naboth Manzongo to be Bishop of Rupert's Land, and he was installed on September 13th, in a vibrant and packed service.

Bishop Naboth is the first Black Bishop in the Anglican Church of Canada, having been born in Zimbabwe. He has been ordained for 17 years and as been in Canada since 2018.

Bishop Naboth has said that his priorities will be building relationships between the parishes and the Diocese, as well as between the clergy and focusing on the financial challenges that the Diocese faces. He has also spoken about the importance of continuing the work around Indigenous relationships and reconciliation, particularly around the land.

Bishop Naboth speaks eloquently about the need for change and growth in the Diocese, and has a great deal of experience in those areas, both lived and educational.

I look forward to working with him and seeing the improvements that will be implemented under his leadership.

May God bless him and all our Diocese under his leadership.

St. Andrew's applied for 6 families of the 4-5 persons last year, and plans to do the same this year.

A full list of hamper requirements will be posted on the bulletin boards again this year. It isn't too early to start shopping now when various items are on sale! MISSION AND MINISTRY

Mission and Ministry has some changes coming up. Here is a look at what has happened and what is coming up in the next few months:

Bulletin Board—Check out our themed bulletin board located in the foyer of the church for information and updates on the organizations that we are active in. Alongside Hope (formerly PWRDF), collecting stamps, glasses and hearing aids, West Broadway/St. Matthew Maryland are but a few of our ongoing projects!

Foster Child through Plan International Canada—We continue to support our foster child, Hantz-Michael through donations collected at coffee hour. Get to know him by checking out the framed biography on display! Watch in the bulletin for updates on collection amounts.

1 Just City—Under 1 Just City we support the Pimicikamak Wellness Centre as well as other initiatives. The West Broadway location has transitioned into a Housing Resource Hub. This site focuses on assisting folks with access to safe stable housing, with workshops in life skills, tenant rights education and resolution coaching, cultural programming, navigation of the social system, and delivers one-on-one case management and trauma-informed care. With this change we have ceased collecting food items for this site; however, we are supporting the 1 Just City. Please see the back of the Church for details.

Rupert's Land Indigenous Wechetowin Ministry—One of our indigenous community outreach programs we support.

A Rocha—Stay tuned for further information regarding a presentation with ideas and plans for making our Church greener.

Alongside Hope (previously known as PWRDF)—Stay tuned for further updates!

Loving Hands—Our Loving Hands ministry supports West End 24 as well as the West Broadway Youth Program. Early summer we were able to delivery approximately 36 bags to the centre with essential items. At the end of August, Norma delivered 8 boxes of school supplies to the Program.

100 Mile Dinner—Our first 100 Mile Dinner (potluck) was held after the 10am service on September 28th, and what a success it was! We had many interesting dishes made from (mostly) ingredients sourced from with a 100-mile radius of Winnipeg. Many thanks to those who organized, set up, cleaned up, and brought yummy dishes for all in attendance to enjoy!

INUIT CULTURE

Inuit culture is a rich and diverse tradition of Indigenous peoples inhabiting the circumpolar Arctic and Sub-Arctic regions, with a strong connection to the land and sea, and a history spanning millennia. "Inuit" means "the people" in the Inuktitut language and "Inuk" is the singular form of Inuit. Inuit are not First Nations people and Inuit are not Indians. Inuit language is Inuktitut. Inuit are a group of culturally similar Indigenous Peoples.

Traditionally, Inuit were nomadic people and relied on hunting and fishing for survival. Their diet was rich in Vitamin D from fatty fish and marine mammals. Igloos were a crucial part of Inuit culture, serving as shelter during harsh winters. Inuit traditionally used oral communication to pass on stories and knowledge.

Inuit culture places a high value on sharing, respect for elders and cooperation. Art has a long history, including carvings, wall hangings and cave drawings. Inuksuks, stone figures used for navigation and marking places, are a significant symbol of Inuit culture. Clothing was designed to withstand harsh climate, using materials like seal fur. Sled dogs were essential for transportation and hunting, not pets. Inuit culture is closely tied to the natural environment and Inuit beliefs are based on animism, the belief that everything has a spirit. Inuit communities have produced world-renowned musicians and artists. Inuit leaders have helped advance the global struggle for Indigenous self-determination.

International Inuit Day, also known as International Circumpolar Inuit Day, is celebrated annually on November 7th to recognize and celebrate the rich cultures, languages, and identities of Inuit people, and to amplify their voices. The day serves as a platform to celebrate the unique heritage of Inuit communities across the circumpolar region, which includes Canada, Greenland, Alaska, and parts of Russia. International Inuit Day was established by the Inuit Circumpolar Council (ICC) in 2006, and the date of November 7th was chosen to honour the birth of Eben Hopson Sr., the founder of ICC. It is a time to recognize the contributions of Inuit in Canada and around the world, and to raise awareness about the challenges they face, including climate change and the preservation of their culture and way of life.

The majority of Inuit in Canada live in four regions, collectively known as Inuit Nunangat, which are Nunatsiavut (Norther Labrador), Nunavik (Northern Quebec), Nunavut, and the Inuvialuit Settlement Region (Northwest Territories).

The Government of Canada recognizes the importance of working with Inuit to build healthier and more prosperous communities, protect the Arctic environment, and support a strong and dynamic northern economy.

Manitoba Inuit Association (MIA) is the representative organization for Inuit living in Manitoba. MIA provides dynamic Inuit-specific programs and services that embody Inuit principles and values, and ensure opportunities to strengthen connections to Inuit culture, language and community living in urban and rural/remote areas of Manitoba.

Thousands of Inuit come to Manitoba every year for training, health care, advanced education, or to seek further opportunities. Hundreds of Inuit have made Manitoba their permanent home, and every year, the number of Inuit moving south increases. Reporting to an Inuit Board of Directors, the Manitoba Inuit Association represents Inuit living in Manitoba by providing Inuit-specific services such as training, employment, education, health and wellbeing, and cultural and community connections.
